

First Lesson: Genesis 45:1-15

Joseph could no longer control himself before all those who stood by him, and he cried out, "Send everyone away from me." So no one stayed with him when Joseph made himself known to his brothers. And he wept so loudly that the Egyptians heard it, and the household of Pharaoh heard it. Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" But his brothers could not answer him, so dismayed were they at his presence.

Then Joseph said to his brothers, "Come closer to me." And they came closer. He said, "I am your brother, Joseph, whom you sold into Egypt. And now do not be distressed, or angry with yourselves, because you sold me here; for God sent me before you to preserve life. For the famine has been in the land these two years; and there are five more years in which there will be neither plowing nor harvest. God sent me before you to preserve for you a remnant on earth, and to keep alive for you many survivors. So it was not you who sent me here, but God; he has made me a father to Pharaoh, and lord of all his house and ruler

over all the land of Egypt. Hurry and go up to my father and say to him, 'Thus says your son Joseph, God has made me lord of all Egypt; come down to me, do not delay. You shall settle in the land of Goshen, and you shall be near me, you and your children and your children's children, as well as your flocks, your herds, and all that you have. I will provide for you there—since there are five more years of famine to come—so that you and your household, and all that you have, will not come to poverty.' And now your eyes and the eyes of my brother Benjamin see that it is my own mouth that speaks to you. You must tell my father how greatly I am honored in Egypt, and all that you have seen. Hurry and bring my father down here." Then he fell upon his brother Benjamin's neck and wept, while Benjamin wept upon his neck. And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them; and after that his brothers talked with him.

# **About the Readings**

**Genesis 45:1-15** Today's reading describes Joseph's revelation of his identity to his brothers. Joseph, who had recognized his brothers, had planted a silver cup in his youngest brother Benjamin's food bag (Benjamin was Rachel's other son). When the cup is conveniently "found," Joseph demands that the boy remain as a slave in Egypt. The brothers are filled with sadness because they know that if anything happens to Benjamin, the aged Jacob will certainly die of sorrow. Joseph is so overcome with emotion when he perceives the repentance of his brothers that he reveals to them that he is their long lost brother. He also explains that he knows that his enslavement in Egypt was God's way of ensuring their survival from the famine and thus also making sure that God's promises would be fulfilled.

**Psalm 133** The psalmist offers a blessing for the covenant people that is also appropriate for families trying to live in unity.

Romans 11:1-2a, 29-32 In chapters 9–11 Paul has been wrestling with the problem of the rejection of Jesus by those whose whole history and relationship with God

was a preparation for the Messiah. On the surface this looked like a frustration of God's purpose, but Paul establishes God's sovereignty in the working out of salvation history. Israel, not God, is responsible for its own rejection of the gospel, for Israel has failed to understand the meaning of its own tradition. Paul sees Israel's history as fulfilled in Christ (10:4, 9), but Israel has insisted on righteousness by works (9:31-32). Nonetheless God has foreseen and provided for this, too. Israel's failure is partial, for a remnant has believed (11:5); and it is temporary, for it is not irremediable (11:11). Because of the Jews' resistance, the gospel has been taken to the Gentiles, but this mission's success will lead to the Jews' restoration (11:25-26). For both Jews and Gentiles, "disobedience" will be seen to have been a stage on the way to faith (11:30-32). Paul as usual speaks corporately, that is, of the destiny of groups as a whole rather than of individuals. God's intent is to "be merciful to all" without distinction, for all are in need of mercy.

Matthew 15:21-28 Jesus elevates the importance of behavioral standards that transcend Jewish-Gentile differences. In this way, his teaching sets the stage for the story that follows: Jesus' encounter with a Canaanite woman (vv. 21-28) foreshadows the offer of salvation beyond Israel to the Gentiles. The center of interest is not the miracle but Jesus' attitude toward Gentiles. A distinction is made between Jesus' mission and his response to individual faith wherever found. Matthew emphasizes for his Jewish Christian audience that God has been faithful to Israel but that Gentile faith cannot be denied. The incident exemplifies the form of argument that was common in Jesus' day. The argument was carried on by citing proverbs. The person who cited the best proverb was recognized as the winner. In Matthew's gospel, the focus of

Jesus' mission has 'til now been only to Israel (10:5). So when this woman comes and kneels before him requesting help for her daughter, he first refuses her request by appealing to the commonsense wisdom of a proverb: should the children's bread, one of the essentials of life and thus a symbol for salvation (14:15-21) be given to the dogs? The woman's quick-witted reply exemplifies the kind of verbal acumen admired in the Middle East. She is not satisfied with his reply and responds with another proverb, reinforcing her request by citing a different proverb that re-frames the whole situation: even the puppies get the scraps that are leftovers. Jesus, realizing that in this argument her proverb outdoes his, recognizes her triumph by acclaiming her faith and healing her daughter as she had requested.
