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Staff Reports

Report of the Rector



Saint Andrew's must be a missionary, to build up the spiritual life of the community in which it is placed and fill it more with the Spirit of Christ.

THIS WAS THE CHARGE GIVEN

The Rev. Adrian Robbins-Cole to our parish by the Bishop of Massachusetts, at the first service held in our newly completed church on November 30, 1894, celebrating St. Andrew's Day. This year, as we celebrate the 125th anniversary of our church, this annual report bears witness to the continued commitment of the people of St. Andrew's to that vision given to us by Bishop William Lawrence.

As we look back over the last 125 years, there is much to give thanks for as we consider our much-loved church sanctuary and its extensive facilities. All this is a legacy given to us by previous generations of parishioners, starting with the \$650 collected at the Easter service in 1892 for the building of the church. Since those early days when the fledgling congregation met in various locations, first in the upper story of a wheelwright shop that stood opposite Wellesley Town Hall and then in the Town Hall itself, generations of parishioners have maintained, improved, and added to our church building to make it what it is today.

But a church is much more than a building—it is primarily the people of the congregation. The word "church" comes from the Greek word *ekklesia* (hence the English word "ecclesial") which means "assembly of people or congregation." The expansion and improvement of our church building over the last 125 years is an outward sign of the vibrancy of the congregation at St. Andrew's. And that vibrancy continues today as we welcome new members and families attracted by the fullness of the spiritual life and activities at St. Andrew's.

I would like to thank the hundreds of you who are involved in the many ministries of our parish

reflected in this report. Without your faith and commitment of time and talent, St. Andrew's would be just a building rather than a living community.

We shall be celebrating our 125th anniversary this year with a parish party at the Wellesley Country Club on the evening of Saturday, November 2, and with a Festival Eucharist on Sunday, November 24. I hope you will save these two dates on your calendar.

In addition to these celebrations, a major focus for the year will be seeking to inspire and invite newer and younger members of the congregation to become involved in the ministries of the parish. As we celebrate the 125th anniversary, we are not just giving thanks for the past, but are also looking to the future. We want to continue to deepen the spiritual lives of all our congregation and want St. Andrew's to be a witness to Christ's love both today and for many generations to come.

I would like to thank our church wardens, Michael Vanin and David Hamlin, with whom I have had the privilege of working over the last year. It has been very good to welcome David who has served the first year of his term of office. He has brought great wisdom and insight, as well as deep commitment to St. Andrew's

But this year, I particularly want to thank Michael Vanin, for agreeing to step back into the role of warden for an extra year, after Nancy Hancock moved from Wellesley with her new job. Michael is a person of enormous energy and with a commitment to follow-through that has been a great gift of leadership to St. Andrew's. Michael's return has also allowed David to have an overlap with an experienced warden during the first year of his term. Our aim has always been to have overlapping warden terms.

I would also like to thank on our behalf the members of the vestry who serve as the heads of our different ministries for their commitment and leadership during the past year, and especially to those vestry members whose terms will be finished at the vestry meeting: Alan Joachim (finance), Peter Lull (communications), Suzanne Nystrom (membership), and Jenny Sawyer (fellowship).

As we celebrate our 125th anniversary this year, I believe that we are richly blessed by God in our lay leadership and the widespread involvement of so many of you in the life of the parish. I feel a sense of hope and excitement as we continue our spiritu-

al journey together into a deeper relationship with God and our neighbor.

Report of the Associate Rector for Adult Formation and Membership

2018 HAS BEEN A YEAR OF pilgrimages large and small. Our May pilgrimage to Italy brought 21 members of the church to Rome, Assisi, and Florence. We explored the ancient church's faith, buildings, paintings, frescos, and statues

and found our own faith expanding. In the fall, 72 of us registered for the 5K Wellesley Turkey Trot and, despite Thanksgiving morning's bitter cold, 52 of us pounded down Wellesley's streets raising money for cancer research and food security. (We won the "Biggest Team" trophy.) We are especially thankful to an anonymous donor who made sure each member of our St. Andrew's team had a red hat or headband, complete with our church logo, to keep us warm as we ran. In April, we continued our religious field trips, taking members to the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum for a guided tour of a special Fra Angelico exhibit. We have also continued to expand participation in our traditional education classes, Faith & Practice classes, Taizé-style liturgies, and Lenten programs and potlucks. In Lent, we deepened the daily practice of our Christian faith with our Lenten Meditation Guide, which was financed by the contribution of an anonymous donor. I am thankful to be serving our creative and curious church community.

Adult Formation and Learning

With our monthly Bible Circles and Adrian's monthly Men's Bible Study, we continue to have an average of 30 parishioners studying scripture monthly. In 2018, the Gospel of John and selections from Paul's letters were our topics. Our 9am Christian learning series, which meets approximately 28 times per year, has continued to increase in the number and diversity of its members. Classes averaged 27 members per class, and we had over 90 people attend a Christian learning series class. Weekly Lenten dinners and programs were well attended with an average participation of 42 parishioners for each of our evening gatherings. Our Lenten theme was "Forgiveness" and included presentations by a psychiatrist, a local rabbi, and a priest. Our Advent Taizé-style service had an attendance of 75 people and our Holy Week Taizéstyle service had an attendance of 35 people. Our third Blue Christmas Service, with an attendance of 14, was solemn and meaningful. Our Inquirers' Class had four members this year. We also staffed an "Ashes to Go" station by the train station on Ash Wednesday. Cat did a wonderful job as editor of our second Lenten Meditation Guide. We distributed 350 booklets. The guide's popularity resulted in our adding a line item for the cost of the guide into our 2019 budget. Our Book Circle is going strong under the excellent leadership of Betsy Millane.

Our 2018 pilgrimage to Italy was a work-in-progress all year. A six-member team helped plan our itinerary, and we held four classes, including two language classes, for our pilgrims. In January 2019, we will hold a trip dinner to complete our modern pilgrimage. Special thanks goes to Pam Henrikson, Peter Fergusson, Will Nystrom, Mary Scanlon, and Penn Young, members of our Italian pilgrimage planning team. The pilgrimage was so popular that Adrian and I are already planning a church pilgrimage for 2021. (Stay tuned for details in 2019.)

Adult Formation and Learning Advisory Committee

Our adult learning and formation committee and I shape the mission of Christian education for adults at St. Andrew's. Your feedback and interests guide the topics we choose, so please share your interests and questions with me or a member of our committee. I am thankful for the service and creativity of all our members who served in 2018: Peter Fergusson, Margarethe Kulke, Ansley Martin, Shannon Monaghan, Will Nystrom, Jenny Sawyer, Mary Scanlon, Paul Shellito, and warden David Hamlin. Special thanks go to Margarethe Kulke, who coleads our Bible Circles, and to our excellent chair, Peter Fergusson.

Wellesley College Ministry

In 2018, our Wellesley College students sang in our adult choir, taught church school, and served as chalice bearers, lectors, and acolytes. Our weekly blog to students had a roster of 19. We continue to sponsor a Wellesley graduate, Anna Page, for ordination. A 2017 graduate, she is currently attending Duke Divinity School. Cat and I had the opportunity to lead a "Sophia's Table" dinner on Building an Icon in the spring, and I led a program on *Claiming Forgiveness* at Wellesley this fall. The Wellesley College ministry continues to benefit from a diocesan grant we secured through the Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole, Protestant Chaplain at Wellesley College. St. Andrew's ministry with Wellesley women brings energy and enthusiasm into our congregation's life and worship.

Membership Committee

It has been a pleasure to work with chair Suzanne Nystrom and the other members of our membership committee. We continued to share our updated "Welcome Booklet" with seekers, continued our shepherding program, and held a party (at the Rector's home) for newcomers who became active members in 2016. Please see our chair's report for more details. I'm thankful to be the clergy liaison for this committee. My main responsibilities lie in contacting newcomers by email or phone so that they have a clergy welcome, and meeting newcomers who have questions. Suzanne Nystrom and I have both kept track of the seekers, newcomers, and newly matriculated active members, helping to ensure that everyone is welcomed and that everyone finds a place at St. Andrew's.

I am especially thankful for the wisdom and hard work of Peter Fergusson, our adult formation and learning committee chair, and Suzanne Nystrom, our membership committee chair. Their creative and faithful leadership inspires our committee members and helps us all to build a thriving and vital parish. Finally, I want to thank our rector, Adrian Robbins-Cole, for his strong ongoing support of our adult formation and learning committee and our membership committee. It is wonderful to be a part of his clergy team at St. Andrew's.

Report of the Assistant Rector for Youth and Family

Dear People of St. Andrew's,

I WRITE THESE WORDS DURING my last few weeks with you, before I depart to become the rector of the Church of St. Paul and the Redeemer in Chicago, IL. It has been a joy to share in

ministry with so many of you during my three and a half years here, and so I submit this report with a heart full of gratitude for all that the Holy Spirit is doing in this place, and in particular for the staff and volunteers who give so much of their time to our youngest members.

Our church school continues to thrive, and remains instrumental in attracting new families to the parish. We continue to use the Weaving God's Promises curriculum for grades K-5, with great success. In spring 2018, the church school committee undertook a full curriculum review for Rite-13 (grades 6-7). They compared religious education materials from several different publishers and ultimately decided that St. Andrew's will continue to use the Rite-13 curriculum for this age group, supplemented by lessons from Weaving God's Promises for Youth, the middle-school counterpart to our elementary-school curriculum.

The church school was active in outreach in 2018, raising funds for the Salvation Army Pearl Street Cupboard & Café during Lent and collecting gifts for the families of Family Promise Metrowest during Advent.

We are blessed with a diverse team of 37 church school teachers, including young adults, parents, and grandparents. Thanks are due to all who served as church school teachers for grades K-5 in 2018: D.D. Alexander, Veronica Bacon, Emma Barry, Jon Barry, Matt Benfer, Michelle Hughes Benfer, Jackie Borden, Seth Borden, Karin Breedis, Megan Burns, Elke Cardella, Cari Dineen, Marie Dunell, Heidi Emerson, Caleb Farny, Erica Gelser, Pamela Grossetti, Sarah Harris, Amelia Houghton, Ingrid Houghton, Caroline Hudson, Toni Jolley, Mike Mahlenkamp, Steve Mahoney, Kethural

Manokaran, Karen McAdams, Amanda Nugent, Julia Pekowitz, Tim Raeke, Carrie Reepmeyer, Laura Rodormer, Katherine Roer, Martha Sears, Shelley Stoudemire, Coryell Urban, Anna Lee Wahls, and Jessica Young.

Children's music ministries at St. Andrew's are also growing and thriving, led by director Amanda Kern. During church school on Sunday mornings, music offerings include a singing circle for Kids' Place (toddlers and preschoolers), Sing & Play for grades K-2, and JAM for grades 3-5. The junior choir for grades 1-8 has contributed beautiful musical offerings in worship throughout the year, most notably a number from the musical Godspell in April (which they also performed at Wellesley's Grace Knight Babson showcase) and anthems for Easter Sunday, St. Francis' Day, and St. Andrew's Day. The 2018 Christmas pageant was also a great success. Special thanks are due to D.D. Alexander, Holly Anza, Judith Boland, Liz Dean, and Katherine Roer for all their work on pageant preparation.

Our Rite-13 ministry flourished in 2018, thanks to leaders Debbie Alexander, Katey Goehringer, Ingrid Houghton, Ansley Martin, Jeff McAdams, Shelley Stoudemire, and Jonas Svedlund. Rite-13 enjoyed a raucous and joyful year, with highlights including a trip to 5 Wits (a local adventure program) and a gathering to make apple pies for the Wellesley Food Pantry just before Thanksgiving. Please thank the members of the Rite-13 team for their faithful, good-humored leadership.

In 2018, St. Andrew's celebrated the confirmation of 19 youth, as well as one adult reaffirmation of baptismal vows. There are 25 new eighth- and ninth-graders enrolled in confirmation preparation this fall, and teaching them is one of the highlights of my role in Christian formation at St. Andrew's. I am grateful to the adults who have served as small group leaders for this year's confirmation class: Holly Anza, Cathleen Dehn, Greg Hunter, Ansley Martin, Keileigh McReynolds, and Karen Pekowitz.

Our high school youth group, co-led in 2018 by Marie Dunell, Ansley Martin, and myself, continues to meet biweekly for food, fellowship, and conversations about faith. The youth of St. Andrew's are active in worship, with 35 youth participating in our acolyte ministry under the capable leadership of Jennifer Olivetti.

St. Andrew's is proud to be sponsoring Anna Page in the ordination process in the Diocese of Massachusetts. While a student at Wellesley College, Anna was active at St. Andrew's and a dedicated volunteer with our parish youth ministries. Anna is now in her second year of full-time seminary study at Duke Divinity School. She is a chaplain candidate with the U.S. Army and, at this writing, is preparing to interview for candidacy for Holy Orders, the final step in the Episcopal Church's ordination process before ordination itself.

The church school committee shapes the mission of Christian learning for children and youth at St. Andrew's and provides many fellowship opportunities for families with children, including an All Hallows' Eve service and potluck in October,

Family Cookies & Carols in December, and all-ages events during Holy Week. I am thankful for the service of Jennifer Martin, the vestry member for youth formation, and for all the committee members who participated in 2018: D.D. Alexander, Karin Breedis, Megan Burns, Becca Daws, Cari Dineen, Ingrid Houghton, Heather Schaefer, Elizabeth Svedlund, and Coryell Urban.

Finally, I would like to offer abundant thanks for the ministries of staff members Susan Jackson and Amanda Kern, whose skill and good humor ensure that the Christian learning community at St. Andrew's continues to fill the hearts of our youngest members with the knowledge and love of Christ. Thank you, Susan and Amanda!

Report of the Music Minister

IN JUNE OF 2018, I COMPLETED my eleventh year as music minister at St. Andrew's.

The Senior Choir numbers about 33 members including five paid section leaders who are either presently students or recent graduates of mu-

sic conservatories. I hired a new baritone section leader this fall, Frank Rosamond, who is a graduate of Southern Methodist University, Dallas, TX and is presently at the Opera Institute, Boston University. He joins soprano, Laura Cervinsky; alto, Britt Brown; tenor, Sully Hart; and bass, Blake Jennings. The paid section leaders are essential in maintaining the quality of our program as so many of our congregational members travel or have family com-

mitments and, therefore, can sing only on a limited basis.

We also have three Wellesley College students in our choir: Lizzie Hudson, Anna Purcell, and Ciara Cheli-Colando. We add to our numbers on special occasions with extra singers from our congregation and professionals or "ringers", as they're called, as needed from the Boston area.

We have been experimenting for the last few years with a 5pm informal service with music. David Wade, guitar, and I played together on Sundays, January 28, February 11, March 11, October 14, and November 25.

Here is the list of choral events from the last year:

• *March 4* for Lenten Choral Evensong, we sang the *Agnus Dei* by Samuel Barber. Frederick Jodry was our guest organist.

- April 1 Easter, we sang at 9am, with the Junior Choir and at 11am. We had a brass quartet led by James Mosher for both services. The choir also sang on Maundy Thursday and the Great Vigil of Easter, Saturday evening.
- *May 6* Our Rogation Day service led by Joey Sullivan on bodhran, Elizabeth Alexander on fiddle, and Torrin Ryan on penny whistle.
- *June 3* was our last choir Sunday.
- *September 6* Choir resumed after the summer break. Our first Sunday was September 9.
- *November 1* Iain Massie played the pipes for us on St. Andrew's Day, and the Junior Choir joined the Senior Choir in a South African anthem called *Hope for Resolution*.

- *December 9* We had 32 singers for our tenth annual Advent Lessons & Carols. Erica Johnson was our guest organist.
- *December* 24 We had an Intergenerational Choir at the 5pm service and our Senior Choir sang at the 10pm service with a string quartet led by Harold Lieberman.

Wardens' Report

COMING OFF BACK-TO-BACK successful stewardship campaigns and approaching the celebration of our 125th anniversary, I recognize that there is a direct link between the congregation's love for St. Andrew's and the overall

financial commitments we make to our beloved church. The stewardship campaign helps us keep the doors open, the lights on, and the programs intact with three excellent clergy. The 125 year festivities will be a celebration of our past but also a salute to the future.

Speaking of the future, since our last report St. Andrew's has added 60 new families, many with young children. This growth is neither accidental nor random but results from our collective dedication to spreading the good word of St. Andrew's... either overtly or subtly. You may not think of it this way, but each of us is an ambassador of St. Andrew's on Sunday of course, but also throughout the rest of the week as we go about our daily lives.

Whether it's the richness of the Sunday service, the wonderful music programs, or the formation opportunities for all ages that anchors you here, we must acknowledge that St. Andrew's is a special place centered in a town that values spirituality across all houses of worship. This was clearly evidenced in the Wellesley Townsman article (October 24, 2018) "Holy spaces in a secular time: Amid declining national attendance rates, Wellesley's houses of worship defy the odds."

To what can we attribute this good news and growth of St. Andrew's Church? As I reflect upon the past three years of my term as warden (plus the extra year as a fill-in), certain measurements are easy to quantify (average Sunday attendance, the number of new families, increased attendance at the 9am and 11:30am Christian learning offerings). As encouraging as these numbers are, I am more interested in the "why" than the "what." Why do new families join St. Andrew's and seamlessly weave themselves into the fabric of our Christian lives?

As with most organizations, it starts at the top. Adrian sets the vision and the wardens and vestry execute that vision. It is here that I would like to thank David Hamlin for graciously accepting the nomination for warden. His many talents and areas of expertise are helping our parish to thrive, and he will be an essential source of wisdom and guidance for the newly-elected warden, Paige Manning. We are on good footing and it has been a pleasure to work alongside David these past several months.

Our clergy and vestry have made it a priority to make our strategic plan a living document. Our strategic plan was completed in 2016 and was revised to include six-month progress against short-term and long-term goals, adding new priorities last September. We instantly recognized that we live in a time that is rapidly changing; these changes are having dramatic impacts on all aspects of the life of our country, including religious and church participation. This environment heightens the need for strategic assessment; it is crucial that we remain nimble, while not diminishing the importance of

taking a deep breath to consider who we are and where we want to go next.

That direction begins with St. Andrew's mission (what we do), our vision (where we are going), and our values (what guides our decisions):

- **Our Mission** We are an Episcopal church that celebrates and shares the transforming love of Christ.
- **Our Vision** To grow our parish in breadth and depth by strengthening our worship, community, and ministries.
 - □ Our hope is to deepen the faith of existing members and attract new people to our parish so that they can experience Christ's love.
 - □ We wish to help people recognize their God given talents and use them to serve God and their neighbor.
- Our Values: We are guided by Jesus' Great Commandment to love God with all our heart and to love our neighbors as ourselves.
 - □ We strive to be an open and inclusive church.

- □ We believe we are called to nurture future generations in the faith.
- □ We place a high value on the community life of our church.
- We believe in the importance of worship in meeting the spiritual needs of our parishioners.

It has been one of the great joys of my professional and spiritual life to have served as warden for nearly four years. I have grown as a person, and I hope I have left behind in my wake a realization that all who come before us are the giants of St. Andrew's . . . we are only standing on their shoulders to see the new horizon . . . and as far as I can tell, the future looks brighter than ever.

I think this quote from Acts 16:5 says it perfectly: "So the churches were being strengthened in the faith, and were increasing in number daily."

Vestry Committee Reports

Report of the Vestryperson for Adult Formation

CHRISTIAN LEARNING AND ADULT FORMATION saw satisfactory overall growth during the church year (2017-18). Such results are testament to Margaret's energy, leadership, and vision.

Three areas within the Committee's remit returned particularly strong results: The Learning Series, Turkey Trot, and the Pilgrimage to Italy.

Learning series Attendance has increased 90% between 2016 and 2018. Publicity is partly responsible but also to be noted are clusters of subjects over two (and sometimes three) successive Sundays and good presentations. This year over 70 parishioners between the ages 15 to 90 attended one of our sessions.

Turkey Trot Participation has doubled since 2016 with 52 parishioners joining in the 5K run on a very cold Thanksgiving morning in 2018, winning for St. Andrew's the trophy for top participation.

Pilgrimage Twenty-two parishioners and two clergy (Margaret and Cat) took part in a 12-day pilgrimage to Rome, Assisi, and Florence in May 2018.

Enthusiasm was strong. Effective organization ensured a well-planned itinerary. When our most recent pilgrims shared their experiences in two of the learning series in October, 74 people attended. There are reliable indications that visiting the holy places enriches the spiritual life of participants. Another pilgrimage is planned for 2021.

Seven other areas covered in our responsibility enjoyed heartening support: Bible circle, Lenten dinners, experimental liturgies, religion and the arts, confirmation preparation, and Faith and Practice. In different ways they fill important areas in the life of the parish. Their success reflects topical interest and the sound selection of chairs for each by Margaret. In one additional area, planning continued for the reciprocal invitation to Temple Beth Elohim now scheduled for evensong on Sunday, March 3, 2019. One area assigned to Christian learning and adult formation remained inactive: retreats.

Report of the Vestryperson for Communication

THE COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE continued to make progress this year, highlighted by production of a St. Andrew's welcome video, hosted by Adrian, for our website.

Welcome Video In an effort to bring our presence to a wider audience online, this spring we hired a videographer to visit St. Andrew's and collect footage for a video to post online. The video runs close to two minutes and features Adrian sitting in the nave and talking about our church and how we welcome people into our community, with scenes featuring parishioners socializing in the parish hall and shots of the congregation and choir during a service.

Technology Plans We have several initiatives that we would like to pursue, but, due to their complex-

ity and the resources required, we plan to execute them in 2019. We would like to film additional brief videos to put onto our website so we can present other aspects of our church life—music, altar guild, Sunday school, outreach, etc. and create podcasts to record the audio portion of our services which can then be loaded online for people—both parishioners and the public—to listen to the St. Andrew's experience. We are also exploring how to capture video of services to make these available on the internet, but this idea will need to wait until planned lighting improvements to the altar area and sound system improvements are implemented so we can ensure an excellent audio-visual experience

St. Andrew's Website We have put a good deal of time and resources into improving and refreshing

content on the church's website. It continues to be a robust and valuable resource for events, program offerings, church news, and access to sign-ups and giving opportunities. The website also allows users to find Sunday leaflets and sermons. This maintenance is a time-consuming endeavor, mostly handled by parishioner Rob Brandt and parish administrator Kate Clark.

Social Media Our clergy continue to provide fresh content on our social media accounts— Twitter, Instagram, and Facebook—in order to engage both parishioners and the wider community into the life of our church. We have also used Facebook to post many photos of parish events.

Other Communications Work In addition these areas of focus, the year also included ongoing activities, whether recurring or a one-time problem to solve:

- The Call We continue to produce The Call featuring columns from each of the clergy and the wardens, as well as articles on people and issues of interest to the parish. We would like to thank Dan Dent for his great work in producing this important communication tool. Dan generated ideas, wrote copy, edited, and generally guided production of The Call.
- Ads/Signs Two signs were created to advertise our Christmas Eve services and placed outside the church along Route 16 to invite the community to join in our celebrations. We also placed ads in the two town newspapers (The Wellesley Townsman, Hometown Weekly) and on their websites as well as online at the Swellesley Report, the What's Up Wellesley Facebook group, and the Wellesley Patch website for our special

- events: Lenten Evensong, Easter, Bargain Haul, Lessons and Carols, and Christmas Eve.
- Articles Communications also managed to get media coverage for several of our more public events: Ashes to Go article covered Cat and Margaret's outreach to the community on Ash Wednesday; Margaret Zusky wrote an article to promote Bargain Haul; and the very popular Blessing of the Animals received nice photo coverage in the local paper.
- e-Pistle This email goes out every Friday as an electronic version of the weekly Sunday bulletin.
- 125th Anniversary Work has been progressing throughout the year in preparation for the church's major anniversary in 2019. A book is being worked on to commemorate the event. Many thanks to Sandy Rigney for her leadership in archive searching and organization of the material.
- Communications has begun collecting snippets from the archives to share in the Sunday bulletins in 2019 to provide parishioners some historical insights into our backstory in the lead-up to our celebration in November.

The committee contacted *Wellesley/Weston Magazine* about doing a feature story on St. Andrew's history and celebration to run next summer. Interviews have already been conducted and the story is now being written.

The Communications committee met regularly in 2018, with frequent attendees including our three clergy members (Adrian Robbins-Cole, Cat Healy, and Margaret Schwarzer), Rob Brandt, Kate Clark, Dan Dent, Lee Eichelberger, Betsy Millane, and Sandra Rigney.

Please introduce any new people you have met to the exit greeter as you leave the church. We will be ready with a packet of materials about St. Andrew's and what we offer throughout the year.

Our committee also organized successful newcomer brunches in the spring and in the fall to help welcome newcomers. The brunch is a great way to provide new members the chance to get to know our clergy, vestry, and membership committee members.

In the spring, the committee hosted a party for new active members who have joined in the last few years. We thank Adrian and Sarah for opening their home for this event. We find this event is a big hit! This event ensures that these members still feel connected and part of our growing parish.

The committee organized two Kids' Place coffees which provided an opportunity for families

with babies and toddlers to gather after the 10am service. They loved being able to connect with each other and have playdates for their small children.

The membership committee has also purchased baptismal books for any child being baptized at St. Andrew's. We hope they will serve as a lasting reminder of this blessing they have received.

Lay Pastoral Care Committee Report

THE PASTORAL CARE TEAM is made up of lay people and the St. Andrew's clergy. It plays a central role in the provision of pastoral care at St. Andrew's and is a wonderful example of the partnership

between lay people and clergy at St. Andrew's. Team members visit parishioners in their homes and in hospitals, nursing homes, and other residential communities. Visits are an important way

to bring the prayers and spiritual support of the St. Andrew's community and to make the love of Christ present to those who are facing a medical or pastoral emergency or are unable to attend church on an ongoing basis.

Another very important element of the work of the team is the sending of cards expressing our love and support to parishioners who are facing difficult situations, or to celebrate with them a joyful occasion like the birth of a child or an anniversary. The team meets on a monthly basis in to support one another and to plan visits for the coming month. The team also plans the sending of cards. The meeting is a very important way for the clergy to learn about parishioners who might be in need of clergy pastoral care from the lay members of the team. In a parish the size of St. Andrew's, it is not always easy for the clergy to be aware of all the pastoral challenges facing parishioners.

Report of the Vestryperson for Outreach

THE PRIMARY OBJECTIVE of the St. Andrew's outreach ministry is to help our congregation put our Christian faith into action. We endeavor to bring to the congregation outreach opportunities that positively impact the communities they seek to serve and allow us to build mutual relationships with those communities. As the 2017–2022 strategic plan set forth, the outreach committee continues to strive to meet the goals of disciplined structure for appropriation of funds, supporting programs that are not limited to financial aid only but allow for direct participation by our parish, and balancing our support between local, urban, and international partners. Below highlights our outreach work for 2018:

Metrowest/Local outreach partners and activities

- 1. Family Promise Metrowest
 - Our relationship with Family Promise Metrowest (FPM), a cooperative, interfaith partnership helping homeless families through safe transitional shelter, meals, and case management, continues to be a positive opportunity to live our faith.
- Volunteers from St. Andrew's and Village
 Church hosted families for one week during the
 months of March, June, October, and November.
 Our volunteers provided meals, interacted with
 the families in the evenings, and stayed overnight at Village Church.
- On Saturday, April 7, 11 St. Andrew's members participated in the annual "Walk Away Home-

- lessness" fundraising event. Our efforts raised over \$8,550 with two anonymous donors giving over \$7,000.
- The annual "Keep the Promise" gala in November was attended by five parishioners.
- In December, the church school committee organized a "Family Promise Angel Tree" to provide Christmas gifts to the Family Promise guests.

Debbie Osborn (taking over for Caren Parker) and Heidi Harper are St. Andrew's coordinators for FPM and have attended FPM coordinator meetings every other month this year at the day center. They have also organized hosting weeks and advertised events. St. Andrew's has a dedicated group of approximately 35 who have provided countless hours of service to our homeless neighbors in 2018. Our outreach budget gave \$2,400 this year to Family Promise Metrowest, with an additional \$2,500 given to FPM as part of the dispersal from the newly created outreach grant monies.

2. Salvation Army/Pearl Street Cupboard & Café
Our longstanding partnership with the Salvation Army (SA) in Framingham and the Miracle
Kitchen has been organized by Tim Phillips for
many years. In 2018 the Miracle Kitchen, a hot
meal program run through Salvation Army,
closed its doors. The needy who were served by
the Miracle Kitchen were directed to the Pearl
Street Cupboard & Café, overseen by United
Way. Tim Phillips met with the SA leadership
and after his report to the outreach committee, it

was decided that we would continue to support Salvation Army and the Pearl Street Cupboard & Café.

- The fourth Tuesday of every month, six
 St. Andrew's volunteers signed up to serve a hot meal at the Pearl Street Cupboard & Café in Framingham.
- St. Andrew's 2018 parish-wide Lenten focus centered on Salvation Army and the Pearl Street Cupboard & Café. The theme "Love Thy Neighbor as Thyself" provided the backdrop. Mite boxes were distributed for alms giving, and travel toiletries were collected (and continue to be collected) for the Salvation Army. The Church school contributed by having a bake sale, and weekly testimonials and facts about Salvation Army were distributed in the weekly bulletin.
- On March 4, Major Walter Rivers, Jr. from the Salvation Army Framingham spoke during the 10am service and met with several parishioners after the service to discuss the goals and activities of the Salvation Army.

Through Tim Phillips's leadership, St. Andrew's continues our "hands on" ministry to support the efforts of the Salvation Army Framingham. Our outreach budget gave \$3,000 to SA with an additional \$2,500 from the dispersal of outreach grant monies. The monetary donation from the Lenten focus was \$9,519.

3. Wellesley Food Pantry

St. Andrew's outreach continues to support the efforts of the pantry in helping our neighbors who are experiencing food insecurity. Peter Lull is the point person for the Wellesley Food pantry and is also the president of the pantry.

- Margarethe Kulke organized the annual SOUPer Bowl Sunday pantry collection and on Sunday, February 4, the many items collected were delivered to the pantry.
- On Saturday, October 20, during St. Andrew's
 Day of service, eight volunteers, under the direction of Cynthia Scott, cleaned and organized the
 food pantry.
- Peter Lull participated in the annual Ride for Food to benefit the food pantry and raised \$2,400 to support the WFP.

• Every month, Liz Parsons and Margarethe Kulke took St. Andrew's donations to the pantry.

The Wellesley Food Pantry received financial support from St. Andrew's in the sum of \$4,000 this year. \$2,500 of that amount came from the dispersal of grant money.

Urban/Boston outreach partners and activities

- 1. St. Stephen's Episcopal Church
 St. Stephen's Church in Boston's South End
 has been our sister parish for a very long time.
 Through our continued partnership with this
 - Through our continued partnership with this inner-city parish, we have been enriched by our relationships with many of the leadership and staff of St. Stephen's.
- Cam McCormick and Karen Pekowitz organized our week of volunteering for the B-SAFE summer enrichment program which occurred the week of July 9–13. Over 45 volunteers put dozens of hours into preparing and serving food to the camp. The week culminated in a field trip to Lake Cochituate. The cost for the week was around \$4,100 and was covered by the outreach budget and the in-pew collections during the 2017 holiday season.
- A new opportunity to serve the youth of St. Stephen's began in the fall of 2018. Cam McCormick organized a monthly meal preparation for the B-READY program. Beginning in September, and continuing the first Sunday of the month, volunteers made and delivered casseroles after the 10am service. The expenses were covered by in-pew donations.
- In November, Jack & Jill Whiting organized the Thanksgiving food bags that were given to St. Stephen's. The Whitings and several volunteers shopped for the turkeys and food, organized the bags, and on November 20, 85 bags were brought to St. Stephen's. The monetary support for this effort came from the in-pew donations which were approximately \$4,000 this year.
- At the time of this report, the Whitings are preparing the Christmas baskets that are given to the seniors at St. Stephen's. This year 45 baskets will be for men and 15 for the women. The

financial support again comes from the in-pew collections.

Besides the contributions to the B-SAFE/B-READY programs and the holiday gifts to St. Stephen's, several parishioners have participated as mentors to the youth of St. Stephen's. Throughout the year, they have traveled into Boston to help students with homework after school and to support and encourage their academic achievement.

Last but not least, St. Andrew's has a "Mitten Tree" in the parish hall during Christmas time. The donations of hats/scarves/mittens will be brought to St. Stephen's in the new year. St. Stephen's received \$13,000 in financial support as well as \$2,500 from grant dispersal money this year.

2. Health Care Without Walls

Health Care Without Walls (HCWW) was founded by Dr. Roseanna Means and provides free medical care to homeless women and families. St. Andrew's has supported the efforts of this ministry for many years. Donna Kell oversees the Sox Box and the knitting ministry which both provide assistance to HCWW.

- As of December, the Sox Box has provided 1,227 pairs of white cotton socks, which are needed by the homeless to keep their feet as clean as possible and free from infection.
- So far this year 180 hats and scarves and 25
 pair of mittens, all handmade, were donated to
 HCWW. Also, many infant hats, blankets, and
 sweaters will be donated to Bridges to Moms, a
 program offered by HCWW.

Healthcare Without Walls received a total of \$3,000 from outreach to support their ministry to the homeless.

3. Knitting Ministry

The St. Andrew's Stitches, organized by Donna Kell, comprise approximately 20 parishioners who regularly offer their handiwork to support our outreach efforts. The stitches meet monthly at the church but complete a lot of their work from home. The group celebrated its 13th anniversary this year by extending its reach to Rwanda. In July, parishioners Alan Joachim and Joanna Horobin brought fifty hand-stitched

- infant hats to a medical clinic where Joanna's daughter, Hannah, serves in the Peace Corps. The stitches provide many pieces including
- 35 neck warmers and 25 mariner hats will be included in the Christmas boxes sent to St. Stephen's in December.
- Comfort shawls that are knit and distributed by our clergy and pastoral care team.

The knitting ministry received \$600 in budgetary support as well as money donated during the Alternative Gift Fair (amount not available)

4. common cathedral

common cathedral, also known as Ecclesia Ministries, is an outreach ministry to homeless people in the Boston area. In April and then again in October, six to eight parishioners made 100 sandwiches and transported them, along with fruit and chips, to Brewer Fountain on Boston Common. After serving the meal, we worshiped together on the Common. This past year St. Andrew's provided \$2,700 in financial support and reimbursements for this ministry.

International outreach partners and activities

1. El Hogar, Honduras

For 40 years El Hogar has been transforming the lives of children who are crippled by extreme poverty. El Hogar provides a home and education to those children who would otherwise have little hope of a future. Becky and Steve Taylor, members of St. Andrew's, have been the spokespeople for this vital ministry for many years.

- Many new initiatives are happening at El Hogar.
 There is currently a capital campaign to fund a new school building, A new executive director,
 Tim Monroe, was named and Becky Taylor is now the board president.
- In May, a fiesta fundraiser was held in Concord, MA with four St. Andrew's parishioners attending. Also, in May, Steve and Becky facilitated an adult education class about El Hogar.
- Becky wrote an in-depth article for The Call highlighting and updating all the new projects.

As this article is being written, a summer service trip from St. Andrew's is in the formative

stages with a group to go to Honduras the week of August 3, 2019. St. Andrew's provided \$20,000 in financial support in 2018 with \$15,000 of that money going to matching funds to support their capital campaign.

There remain several activities that are not part of the three divisions above. Several outreach committee members attended the Global Mission Summit at St. Paul's Cathedral in Boston in April. The "plug into St. Andrew's" day on Sunday, September 23 offered the chance for parishioners to learn more about our outreach efforts. The Alternative Gift Fair (AGF), which occurred on Sunday,

December 9, provided parishioners the opportunity to support our outreach partners by making a donation in someone's name as a gift. The AGF was again organized by Ann Johnson with assistance from Cam McCormick, Peter Lull, and the rest of the outreach committee who provided visuals and information about St. Andrew's outreach partners. The many and varied opportunities to put our faith into action are what makes St. Andrew's such a vibrant and caring community. 2018 has been a busy and exciting year for our outreach ministries and we look forward to 2019 and some new initiatives!

Report of the Vestryperson for Property

THE FOLLOWING IS A SUMMARY of this year's property activities. Although 2018 was a relatively quiet year for property, we continued with planning, normal maintenance, and several improvements to church facilities.

- Church A new walkway and storm drainage system were installed at the rear of the building. A magnificent new gas stove has been installed in our kitchen. The main entrance ramp and the Denton Road walk were repaired to assure handicapped accessibility and safety. A magnificent new gas stove has been installed in our kitchen, along with new furniture for the Rite-13 room.
- Rectory, 24 Princeton Road Tree damage repairs were undertaken. Estimates have been obtained for replacing heating and air conditioning equipment and a portion of the rectory roof in 2019.
- 7 Denton Road The driveway and existing walks were repaved. New walks were added at the front

entrance to this two-story rental property. Cat and Heather are very happy with these improvements. All major building components, such as the heating, mechanical, and roofing systems, are in good condition and undergo normal maintenance. More planning took place to ensure appropriate asset care and maintenance in a fiscally prudent manner.

The last major refurbishment of the worship spaces

was in 1995. A detailed study of the sanctuary, narthex, and children's chapel was conducted involv-

ing designers and contractors to determine needs

for upgrades. Utilizing this report, we can prioritize

repairs for future.

Again, we are grateful to the care and attention that Steve Killeen gives to the maintenance of our physical assets. He not only keeps the facilities sparkling but manages our projects and provides welcome insight

into capital planning. Thank you, Steve.

Report of the Vestryperson for Stewardship

THE 2019 STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE came together in the spring of 2018 to begin planning for the 2019 campaign. The campaign theme was "Investing in our Spiritual Lives," and our goal was to increase pledge revenue by approximately 4.5% and household participation above 300. We set a lofty target

of \$1.025 million in pledges. Through Thursday January 3, 2019, we are excited to say that we have exceeded our dollar volume goal of \$1.025 million and are approaching our household goal of 300—tremendous results!

Our strategy included tactics that have worked well in the past, but also included some new and different ideas. Some of these are listed below:

- Campaign of four weeks, versus five weeks in the past.
- Video of the verbal testimonials sent out each week—great touch here.
- A more comprehensive education session around ways to donate
- Continuation of the visual thermometer in the narthex and bulletin board downstairs
- Stewardship greeting on kickoff Sunday
- Stewardship hosting coffee hour on Commitment Sunday

I would like to thank everyone in the St. Andrew's community who makes a pledge, as your participation is key to making the church what it is today. I would also like to thank the members of the stewardship committee for their time and talent: Connie Barnes, Dan Dent, David Hamlin, Ann Johnson, Hugh MacArthur, Herb Manning, Jeff McAdams, Anne Prensner, George Stathis, and Michael Vanin. Peter Lull, thank you for the excellent videos each week—these were a cool, modern touch and a great add to the campaign. Report of the Vestryperson for Worship

THE WORSHIP COMMITTEE acts as the liaison between the clergy and parishioners of St. Andrew's Church to address any needs or issues with respect to our worship services. The group meets quarterly with the clergy to give support and advice with the planning and coordination of worship details. Extra attention is always given to the major celebrations of Christmas and Easter, as well as other special services, but all details are considered as issues arise, such as improving the flow of communicants at the communion rail or increasing parishioner engagement in the singing of psalms and hymns. The committee includes the ministry heads for ushers, acolytes, music, altar guild, flower guild, and lay Eucharistic ministers, as well as the wardens.

In 2018, our clergy led a total of 473 services held at St. Andrew's, including 240 celebrations of Holy Eucharist, 216 prayer services, 13 baptisms, four weddings, and 13 funerals. Twenty parishioners were confirmed or received on October 7 at a service presided over by Bishop Gates. Other special events included Epiphany Fireside, Ashes To Go, Lenten Evensong, unique services during each evening of Holy Week, Blessing of the Animals, All Hallows' Eve, monthly informal music services on Sunday evenings (with potluck dinner), St. Andrew's Day (complete with bagpiper), Taizé-style services (with chanting), and Advent Lessons and Carols.

Total attendance on Sundays was 11,787. A grand total of 16,675 individuals worshipped at St. Andrew's in 2018, when including all services held during the week. Especially notable were the atendance numbers over Holy Week and Easter, totaling 1547, and the 1304 who worshipped at Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services, including 660 at the 5pm service alone.

Our worship leaders devote precious time and talent to St. Andrew's. Everyone knows that our music and flowers are always spectacular, but all our worship ministries make substantial contributions, with large teams of volunteers of all ages. The various ministries welcome your inquiries, as well as new members. I am most grateful to all of them for their service in enriching our worship experience so beautifully.

and schedule the LEMs: Adams Carroll, responsible for weekly reminders, distribution of the readings, prayers and substitutions; Liz Dean, care and maintenance of our vestments; and Kate Clark, who makes sure we have the weekly service information and recognition in the bulletin.

Memorial Rose Garden Report

In addition to thanking Wardie for her skillful and faithful care of the roses, the administrators thank everyone in the congregation who has contributed to the creation and maintenance of this beautiful garden. We welcome all members of the congregation to learn more about it.
