St. Andrew's Church Launches Parish

Paper: With this first issue of *Soundings*, St. Andrew's Church brings to its parishioners their own newspaper to be published and distributed the first of each month. To paraphrase a hackneyed quotation, *Soundings* is of the parish, for the parish, and by the parish. The job of the staff is chiefly to write and compile news items concerning the church and its family and get the news to the people of the parish. Why *Soundings*? There's news being made at St. Andrew's all the time. People are finding God. People are coming into new spiritual life. We believe you want to know about these things and thus the reason for *Soundings*.

Soundings: Acolytes The young men whom you see serving at the altar of St. Andrew's are members of the Acolytes Guild, who have promised to perform these duties faithfully and reverently, and to strive in their thought and actions to make their lives worthy of this honor. In addition to the instructions which are necessary to have the service

proceed in good order, each server is given a handbook, which explains the meaning of his service, and the personal preparation which is necessary. Meetings are held from time to time to interpret the Prayer Book services. 1953

Spring Cleaning? If you have any of our church library books at home that are ready to come back, we'd be delighted to have them. 1954

Soundings: Denton Road West Parking The parking and traffic situation on Denton Road West, troublesome for a long time and becoming worse with the growth of our Church School and Parish, has reached a condition which makes us heed requests of our neighbors that we exercise due control. Accordingly, we are employing an extra police officer on Sunday mornings, who will have the authority to designate parking locations and direct traffic circulation on this private way. He will strive to cause as little inconvenience as possible and we hope the net

result will be an improvement acceptable to parents, parishioners in general, and to our Denton Road neighbors. We shudder to think what delay and confusion might arise should fire apparatus or ambulance be summoned to this area. February 1954

We will have the new parking lot at the corner of Washington and Cottage Streets suitable for permanent use as soon as possible. In the meantime it may be used to the extent surface conditions permit.

Back in the fifties, St. Andrew's generated a friendly and joyous atmosphere of togetherness. Parish life flourished. As Tobe Johnston [Rector] said, "St. Andrew's was known as the singingest, eatingest church in town." There were groups for everybody and everybody joined a group. The Rector exuded confidence and total optimism in a future without bounds. The church was bursting at the seams. The coffee hours were mobbed and "money dropped like manna from heaven." The ushers were bringing in as many chairs as the fire department would allow. People sat on the chancel steps, on the cushions in front of the chancel rail, and stood along the walls. The church school was so crowded that two sessions, at 9am and 11am, were introduced. Nearly one thousand children were enrolled.

At Communion it is suggested that those who receive the wine directly from the Chalice take the base of the Chalice between their thumb and forefinger to guide it to their lips; and those who receive by intinction hold the wafer and dip it in the wine.

First Lesson: Acts 11:1-18

Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, "I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. As I

looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we

were. The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved.' And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. And I

remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."

About the Readings

Acts 11:1-18 Peter defends his unprecedented decision to baptize the Gentile Cornelius to critics who reflected the early Christian opinion that Jesus was for the Jews alone, and that faith must be accompanied by a strict adherence to the Jewish law. Peter explains the baptism as a God-inspired act. God led Peter to recognize that the believing Gentiles' were included in the kingdom because God granted them the same gifts of the Spirit that the Jewish believers had received (2:1-11). To withhold baptism would have been to oppose God. With this bold act, the Church understood that God's impartiality demands the unity of Jews and Gentiles in the life of Christ.

Psalms 148 Psalm 148 summons all creation to praise God. First from the heavens—by angels, sun, moon, stars and celestial waters—and then from the earth—by sea monsters, seas, weather, rocks, trees, animals and people—the praises of God resound.

Revelation 21:1-6 Once the first creation has disappeared and the wicked have been driven off to punishment, all that remains is to wonder at God's eternal magnificence, reflected in the new

creation. Because of its association with brutal storms, raging waters and myths of primeval chaos, the sea no longer exists. Such violence is not compatible with the peace of the world to come. God then provides a new Jerusalem—a holy city because God dwells in it—that suggests the intimate union of God with the chosen people. "The home of God among mortals" fulfills God's promise to "be with us" (Exodus 3:12) and Jesus' assurance that "I will be with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

John 13:31-35 For John, "glory" means a visible revelation of God's presence and holiness. Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection manifests God's glory in the fullest sense. The cross is not a humiliation but a glorification and the revelation of God's plan for salvation. The love commandment is new, not as a commandment, but in that Jesus' love becomes the model for all love and the basic obligation of the new covenant. God's unconditional love has been revealed in a new way in Jesus. Jesus is more than the standard for Christian love; he is its source. His love is both affective and effective, bonding the Christian community and bringing salvation.
