

Staff Reports

Report of the Rector



Rev. Adrian Robbins-Cole

IT IS HARD TO BELIEVE how much the world has changed in the year since I wrote my annual report for 2019, the year we celebrated the 125th anniversary of our beloved church building. Since then—for most of 2020 we have been dealing with the impact of the global COVID-19 pandemic.

In my report last year, I spoke of the ways we had celebrated our 125th anniversary. These included our successful capital campaign, which raised \$2.5 million dollars; our wonderful gala at the Wellesley Country Club; and our St. Andrew's Day service, when we gathered in a joy-filled packed church to hear Bishop Laura Ahrens preach about our call to walk in the steps of Jesus.

In a significant way, our 125th anniversary celebrations have been a source of strength for us during the challenges of the pandemic. In addition to the above events, an important part of our anniversary year was the series of notes from our archives about the life of St. Andrew's over the past 125 years, put together by parishioner Sandra Rigney and published each week in our church bulletin. These remembrances and our celebrations highlighted the strength and resilience of the St. Andrew's community through times of challenge including two world wars, the Great Depression, the Spanish flu, and other events. I certainly have been encouraged by remembering the history and example of our parish over the last 125 years. I know from many of you that being part of the St. Andrew's parish family today has also been a source of strength and encouragement as we live through this pandemic. So, there is much to give thanks for as we look back over the life of our parish during the last year. The life of our parish serves as a concrete reminder of Christ's loving presence with us.

Adaptability

The guiding theme of this year has been "adaptability." We have found ourselves having to constantly

adapt to the changing circumstances of the pandemic—whether changing expectations about the safety of meeting in person to worship or the evolution of our technical ability to use social media and other online tools to keep our parish family connected.

I want to thank our staff, many lay leaders, and volunteers for their leadership, adaptiveness, and "can do" attitude, which have helped our parish not only survive, but even thrive during this time.

I am especially grateful for the leadership of our two wardens, David Hamlin and Paige Manning, who have been a source of wisdom, leadership, and support during this very challenging time. We have also been blessed by the technological skills of several key staff members, which have enabled us to quickly adapt and keep adapting to the challenges of moving our church life online. I particularly want to thank Katharine Clark, our parish administrator; Rev. Mia Kano, the assistant rector for youth and family; and Amanda Kern, our junior choir director, all of whom used their technical skills and worked tirelessly to enable our ministries to continue online. They were instrumental in teaching us how to use Zoom, Facebook, and YouTube so that we have been able to conduct worship and continue many other church activities online.

I also want to thank all our other staff members who have also shown such adaptability during this time. I would like to thank Rev. Margaret Schwarzer and Rev. Karen Budney for the way they have adapted their priestly ministry to the online environment. Wardie Mannix, our music director, has shown great flexibility not only in moving the church music program online but also in finding different churches in which to record the music for Sunday services while our sanctuary is closed for renovations. Steve Killeen, our sexton, has looked after our church building during the months of shutdown and had worked very closely with the contractors undertaking the renovations. Susan Jackson, our Christian learning coordinator, has worked with Mia to move our church school programs online. It has been very good to welcome

Joanne Butler, who became our new financial administrator in February. Within weeks of Joanne's start at St. Andrew's, we closed the office and Joanne has learned her new job and ably undertaken the financial administration of the church from her office at home. We are also grateful to Ruth Hubert, our recently retired financial secretary, who has supported Joanne in learning her new role.

Moving online

In mid-February, we became aware from someone in the medical field that the COVID-19 pandemic was very serious and that we needed to prepare for some kind of "lockdown" as had been seen in China. We immediately started preparing to be able to work remotely and conduct services online. This involved, among other things, buying new computers for clergy and staff so that we could work and communicate from home.

Like everyone else, in the early days of the pandemic we thought the lockdown would last only a matter of weeks or maybe a few months. We were hopeful that we would be able to return to in-person services by Easter. But as the weeks progressed, we learned that we were going to be "in this" for much longer than any of us had imagined. We now do not expect to return to regular worship in our sanctuary until the fall.

Parish Life Online

Almost all our church activities now happen online. Every Sunday morning at 10:15 we stream pre-recorded Sunday services via Facebook, YouTube, and our website. The service goes out at 10:15am but is posted on our website, Facebook page, and our YouTube channel so that it can be watched later at the convenience of our parishioners. On Sundays we have church school and youth group online for our young people. There is also a weekly adult education hour at 9am, prior to our Sunday service.

Each weekday we offer Morning Prayer at 8:30am and Compline at 8pm (a short prayer service for the end of the day from the monastic tradition) via Facebook, YouTube, and our website. We have many people who follow our weekday services. In fact, we believe that through our weekday online services we

have more people engaging with the parish than in pre-pandemic times. Through our online services we have also increased the geographic reach of the ministry of our church. We have former parishioners who have moved to different parts of the country including California, Georgia, and Florida, now regularly following our services. We have also picked up a new parishioner in Wisconsin at our services.

Although some of our regular parishioners have said that they cannot relate to following church online, we have added several new regular worshipers through our online services. We also hear from parishioners about friends and family members checking in at our online services from time to time in ways they would not have done prior to the pandemic.

One of the silver linings of the pandemic has been the informal liturgical partnership that St. Andrew's has developed with St. Michael's, Holliston, where Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole is the rector. St. Andrew's and St. Michael's undertake all our online worship together, serving both parishes. Many St. Andrew's parishioners have said how much they appreciate Sarah Robbins-Cole's preaching and presiding at our services and how they get a sense of being part of a larger church through our partnership with St. Michael's.

We have installed a video recording system in our church, so that we will be able to continue offering our services online once we are able to go back to church in person. We had discussed the possibility of streaming our worship prior to the pandemic, but the pandemic has accelerated the speed at which we have embraced this new opportunity.

Like many other churches, we make extensive use of Zoom to meet and keep our other church ministries going. We continue to have an active outreach ministry, which helps those in need both through financial help and by collecting and delivering food to our outreach partner in inner city Boston.

Aside from our online ministries we have undertaken a few other activities to keep connected with parishioners. One well-received initiative, spearheaded by our membership and fellowship committees, was the delivery of pumpkins to households of older parishioners around Halloween. We have also had a few outdoor in-person events such as the Blessing of the Animals, a "Trunk or Treat" Halloween event

for our children in the church parking lot, and two outdoor services of Holy Communion.

The 125th Anniversary Church Renovations

Following our 125th Anniversary Capital Campaign, we had planned to undertake major renovations of our church sanctuary starting in May 2020 and extending over the summer. By May, however, uncertainty around the pandemic led us to postpone the renovations until summer 2021. Then, at the end of the summer, it became clear that a probable uptick in the pandemic during the winter made it unlikely that we would be able to resume regular in-person worship in 2020, as had been hoped. Therefore, we decided to proceed with the renovations during the fall and winter; the work should be finished by February. The renovations include a completely new lighting system, a total renovation of the narthex (main church entrance hall), painting the sanctuary, an air conditioning system including an air filtration system to counter airborne pathogens, the renovation of the children's chapel, and a refurbishment of some neglected areas of the sanctuary.

What has been the worst part of the pandemic?

The worst part of the pandemic has been missing seeing our parishioners in person on church on Sunday and on other occasions. It has been very hard to not be able to worship together in our wonderful, beauti-

ful church sanctuary, to feel the energy in the room of hundreds of people gathered to worship God, and to experience the beauty of our church organ and choir.

What has been the best part of what has happened during the pandemic?

I am very proud of the way our clergy, staff team, and many parishioner volunteers have really pulled together and worked so hard to support each other and hold our parish together during this time. I have also been amazed at how quickly we have adapted to this online environment, embracing new technology and thinking creatively to keep our parish connected. It has been remarkable how we have been catapulted into the digital age. Although I am really looking forward to returning to in-person worship in our historic building, the use of social media and online streaming of our services will continue as a permanent and important feature of the life of our parish once the pandemic is over.

But perhaps most importantly, spiritually, the pandemic has helped us reflect on our priorities and what is important in life—our relationships with each other, helping those in need, and God's presence in our lives.

Report of the Associate Rector for Adult Formation and Membership

Adapting, Engaging, Supporting

THE YEAR 2020 has been an unprecedented challenge, but there has been creativity and growth at St. Andrew's as well. We have all had to take our programs online and learn to connect over Zoom

and Facebook to maintain safe social distances. I'm happy to report that in this challenging year, virtual events and regular programing have continued to inspire learning, build relationships, and strengthen our faith. We have all engaged this life-changing year with grit and grace. In particular, the excellent partnerships I share with our adult formation committee and our membership committee, and the collabora-

tion our church shares with St. Michael's have been important foundations for our work.

When the pandemic hit, St. Andrew's, Wellesley and St. Michael's, Holliston joined forces. My adult formation committee and I have been happy to share the planning for our 9am Christian learning class with Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole. She has taught fascinating classes and has been a wonderful partner in the work of adult formation. Members of St. Michael's have also participated in our Bible Circles, Inquirers' classes, and Faith & Practice classes, giving both communities a chance to meet one another and share our strengths. Though some real-time events had to be cancelled, our classes taught online this year have largely maintained or increased their size, with new members from St. Andrew's and St. Michael's joining us, and we found creative ways to host Advent and Lenten Taizé-style services. Our membership committee has instigated some great programs and some new initiatives for welcoming newcomers in the midst of this pandemic. You can read about these developments in more detail in the membership committee report. I am thankful to be serving our curious, faithful, and creative church as we weather this pandemic.

Adult Formation and Learning

Online, our monthly Bible Circles and Adrian's monthly Men's Bible Study have continued; we have an average of 30 parishioners studying scripture monthly.

Several new members have joined us this year as some have moved away. In 2020, we studied the Gospel of Matthew (Bible Circle) and began to consider St. Peter and his role in forming our church. We expanded our offerings for an extra month and studied four chapters of Genesis in June. The Men's Bible Study, which meets early Saturday mornings, read the Gospel of John. Our 9am Christian learning series, which meets approximately 28 times per year, has averaged 25 members per class, and we had over 70 people attending a Christian learning series class this past year. Our first two weekly Lenten dinners and programs were well attended with an average participation of 35 parishioners for each of our evening gatherings, but the pandemic halted these offerings in March. This year, our Taizé services went online.

I hosted the Lenten Taizé-style service on Facebook in March and our Advent Taizé-style service premiered on YouTube, Facebook, and our own website in November. I want to offer particular thanks to the members of our Advent Taizé-style meditative working group: D.D. Alexander, Laura Brown MacKinnon, Margarethe Kulke, Liz Parsons, Jenny Sawyer, Cynthia Scott, and Carol Shedd. I also thank Wardie Mannix, Amanda Kern, members of our senior and junior choirs, and Katharine Clark. We all spent hours redesigning the way the beauty of the sanctuary service could be transformed to be meaningful as an online offering.

Our 2020 online Blue Christmas service continued to offer space and support for people who are facing significant loss or challenges during the Christmas season. Mia and I staffed our "Ashes-to-Go" station by the train station and Peet's Coffee shop a few weeks before the pandemic hit. For the fourth year in a row, we combined a little evangelism with a chance to help the early risers of Wellesley get ashes before their workday began. It was a pleasure to serve as the facilitator and editor for the fourth Lenten Meditation Guide written by St. Andrew's parishioners. The guide's popularity resulted in our adding a line-item for the cost of the guide to our 2019 budget. In 2020, we printed 400 copies and 126 people also asked to get daily emails of the guide. In the fall, we offered an online adult Inquirers class for people considering Confirmation or Reception into the Episcopal Church. Fifteen members participated in a four-week intergenerational class with members ranging from their 20s (three) to their 70s. Our November Turkey Trot had approximately 60 members of St. Andrew's participating this year. The event was virtual, in order to maintain everyone's safety, and Jenny Sawyer posted pictures runners sent to her. (Thank you, Jenny!) We could not share a joint learning or worship experience with Temple Beth Elohim this year as planned; the pandemic cancelled our ability to make plans. Similarly, our plans for local field trips were cancelled days before the first one was to take place. Our Book Circle has decided to take a needed break during the pandemic. Betsy Millane and the members of the group will reassess Book Circle once they can get together in normal circumstances again. Finally, our

Italian Pilgrimage of 2018 was so popular that Adrian and I are already planning a church pilgrimage to England. Again, due to the pandemic, the trip will be held in 2023, not 2021.

Adult Formation and Learning Advisory Committee

Our adult formation committee and I shape the mission of Christian education for adults at St. Andrew's. Your feedback and interests guide the topics we choose, so please share your interests and questions with me or a member of our committee. I am thankful for the service and creativity of all our members who served in 2020: Chair Ansley Martin, Laura Brown MacKinnon, Peter Fergusson, Carrie Hawley, Margarethe Kulke, Will Nystrom, Mary Scanlon, Paul Shellito, Carol Shedd, and warden David Hamlin. Special thanks go to Margarethe Kulke, who co-leads our Bible Circles, and to our excellent chair Ansley Martin. Ansley has been a part of the committee since its inception five years ago, and his creativity, dedication, and "can-do" attitude have been essential during this pandemic year. I am thankful for his excellent service and leadership. I also want to welcome our newest member, Laura Brown MacKinnon.

Membership Committee

It has been a pleasure to work with our membership committee in 2020. In particular, I want to welcome Elizabeth Clarke and Sarah Harris who have joined our committee this year. We have continued to share our updated welcome booklet with seekers and continue our work to welcome and integrate new members into St. Andrew's. Children baptized at St. Andrew's continue to receive a special hardcover book which celebrates their baptism with us. Finding new members and welcoming seekers has become harder during the pandemic, but some exciting new initiatives were created this past fall to help newcomers feel welcome and to inspire us all during the pandemic. (Please see the membership committee report for more details.) We held one Newcomer Brunch this year. We were not able to host the spring Newcomer Brunch, Kids' Place coffees, or the Pimm's Party at the rectory to welcome active members of 2019 and 2020 last spring.

I appreciate the opportunity to be the clergy liaison for this committee. My main responsibilities lie in contacting newcomers by email or phone so that they have an immediate clergy welcome. I also meet with newcomers who would like to meet with me to discuss their faith or have questions about St. Andrew's. Our membership committee and I want to ensure that everyone is welcomed and that everyone finds a place at St. Andrew's. I want to thank Becky Hamlin and David Hamlin, our senior warden, most particularly. They have both supported our committee and kept us vital and on-track in this challenging year.

Wellesley College Ministry

In 2020, Wellesley College students have participated in our Inquirers' class, attended Morning Prayer and Compline, enjoyed Lenten potluck dinners and programs, helped lead church school programs, and shared coffee and conversations with me (in person and over Zoom). We continue to have a roster of 19 members of the classes of 2021, 2022, and 2023. Not surprisingly, I have not met any members of the 2024 Wellesley class. The pandemic hasn't made that possible yet. I'm proud to confirm that our sponsorship of Wellesley graduate Anna Page has come to an end because Anna was ordained as both a deacon and a priest this year. Congratulations Anna! The Wellesley College ministry continues to benefit from a diocesan grant we secured through the Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole, Chaplain of Protestant Ministry at Wellesley College. St. Andrew's ministry with Wellesley students continues to bring energy and enthusiasm into our congregation's life and worship.

Finally, I want to thank our rector, Adrian Robbins-Cole, for his strong ongoing support of our adult formation committee and our membership committee. It is exciting to be a part of his clergy team at St. Andrew's.

Report of the Assistant Rector for Youth and Family

JANUARY 2020 BEGAN with the celebration of my ordination to the priesthood. I could not have known then that this huge transition in my life would have nothing on the changes mid-March would bring to our communal life and my role in

serving you and our families. In this report, I hope to outline how our children's and youth ministries adapted and responded to the unprecedented landscape of the 2020 global COVID-19 pandemic. I also want to note I have found that my role as assistant rector has transformed significantly in response to the pandemic and our move to church online. In addition to quickly pivoting our children's and youth formation programs, I have shifted much of my time to providing necessary communications support to our parish administrator and our website designer, as well as technological and social media support to my fellow clergy. Susan Jackson, our Christian learning coordinator, has likewise needed to adapt to new work responsibilities and patterns, which she has done with fortitude and grace. Coryell Urban, who stepped into her church school committee chair and vestryperson for youth formation role in January, has been an invaluable resource, sounding board, and support through all our programmatic change. She has demonstrated exceptional and committed leadership through difficult times. Thank you, Susan and Coryell.

Church school in 2020 began with our usual special family events, including a well-attended Epiphany Fireside service in the parish hall and Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper. We continued the new tradition of a short Ash Wednesday service for the children in the children's chapel on Shrove Tuesday. Planning for our Youth Sunday event on Sunday, March 21, was already well underway, including new partnerships with the adult liturgical leadership and adult formation Lenten program. With the closure of in-person church, we quickly shifted to a virtual version of the youth-led service that involved videos of readings, prayers, songs, and greetings from church school and

Rite-13 kids, as well as three confirmand video sermons. During Holy Week, we offered Palm Sunday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday services for children on Zoom, as well as a children's Way of the Cross guided home prayer walk.

In fall 2020, church school committee planned for monthly, outdoor, socially distanced in-person events. Fourteen families stopped by for our new September Blessing of the Backpacks event. In October, we held a "Trunk-or-Treat" All Hallows' Eve service in the parking lot for nine families who dressed up themselves and their cars! Considering rising COVID-19 rates, our November Advent wreath making event was quickly transformed into a drop-by event in conjunction with membership and fellowship's St. Andrew's Day celebration. Sixty-seven families came by to pick up their Advent wreath greens among other goodies. Our December event was also adjusted to be a virtual gingerbread decorating afternoon. We celebrated Jesus' birthday party on Christmas Eve with an online service led by our clergy mice.

Thank you to our January and February church schoolteachers, Veronica Bacon, Matt Benfer, Karin Breedis, Megan Burns, Cari Dineen, Bianka Eichelberger, Heidi Emerson, Caleb Farny, Erica Gelser, Pamela Grossetti, Steve Mahoney, Laura Rodormer, Leanne Salvia, Ellen Staelin, Macie Tanaka, Coryell Urban, Anna Lee Wahls, Emily Whittemore, and Jessica Young. Church school stopped meeting in-person with the closure of Wellesley public schools mid-March and at the direction of our bishops. I began to lead half-hour Zoom classes on Sundays at 9am for preschool through fifth grade, with Susan Jackson assisting. While we followed the Bible lesson plan from the church school curriculum, much of the activities and lesson plans from Weaving God's Promises were not applicable to online teaching. I also produced a weekly five-to-eight-minute YouTube video with a Bible lesson and activity prompt, with help from church schoolteacher Anna Lee Wahls. Over the summer, Ramona, the assistant rector mouse, visited and went on adventures with five church school families.

In summer 2020, I developed a new lectionarybased curriculum consisting of month-long units designed for at-home formation, online learning, and an eventual transition to in-person classroom, when possible. During the fall 2020, our church school learning grew into three interconnected components. Each month, Susan Jackson and I created that unit's take-home package, including each Sunday's lessons, activities, and any special materials. About 15 families have utilized the downloadable or physical versions of the home formation unit packages. Additionally, 15 different teachers, older parishioners, and families from St. Andrew's and St. Michael's have stepped up to create an imaginative Bible story and activity video each week to accompany the lessons. Because the curriculum followed the lectionary, some of the sketches and animations by our children were also featured in the online worship services. Between five and 15 children ages four to 11 attended our Zoom classroom on Sunday mornings at 9am, which followed the same unit-based curricular arc.

Amanda Kern's genius and creativity has kept music alive at St. Andrew's. From youth Sunday anthems, to Holy Week songs, to stopping by at church school to sing with us, Amanda's voice, little family, and backyard beauty have been adding joy to our services and classes. Starting in the fall, junior choir began meeting on Zoom at 9:30am on Sundays and children's voices have been appearing in our worship once again. Amanda also developed a video Christmas pageant in collaboration with St. Michael's, using children's images, art, and music to tell the story of Jesus' birth in a new way.

In early 2020, church school jointly hosted a Kids' Place coffee hour with the membership committee, which drew seven young families with toddlers and new babies. In recognition that our virtual offerings were not reaching this group of families, we held an in-person All Hallows' Eve reading in the St. Francis Courtyard that drew three families.

I want to express my sincere appreciation for the six leaders of Rite-13 in 2020, who courageously and seamlessly pivoted from in-person classes to remote learning without missing a Sunday: Toni Jolley, Judy Marth, Jeff McAdams, Tim Raeke, Shelley Stoudemire, and Greg Urban. Our virtual Rite-13 program built off the strong foundation of bonding and classroom co-ownership these leaders developed over fall 2019

and early 2020. In spring 2020, Rite-13 gathered online at 11am on Sundays to check-in and play games together, providing much-needed consistent social engagement for the kids during lockdown. In fall 2020, we introduced the Sparkhouse video-based "re:form Core" curriculum. Both students and teachers have enjoyed how the new curriculum invites discussion about tough questions of faith. We held a socially distanced in-person outdoor event in September with eight kids. Although we had to cancel our in-person community service event for October, our "virtual lock-in" in early November was very successful and attended by 14 kids.

Our 2019-2020 confirmation class experienced a rougher transition from in-person learning to Zoom classroom. Wellesley public schools were closed the day of our synagogue visit; we participated in a much-diminished virtual diocesan pre-confirmation retreat. Our bishops have not held any confirmations since the pandemic began. I want to thank our 15 confirmation students for hanging in with our experimental teaching and for their beautiful video Bible reflections. I am especially proud of our Youth Sunday confirmation preachers: Annie Fisher, Hunter MacArthur, and Carolyn Urban. Most of all, I owe a deep debt of gratitude to our six confirmation leaders, Ryan Daws, Cathleen Dehn, Greg Hunter, Ansley Martin, Keileigh McReynolds, and Rev. Paige Fisher for being incomparable partners in this transition.

Confirmation class 2020-2021 consists of 15 students and four confirmation leaders (Sarah Harris, Greg Hunter, Keileigh McReynolds, and Karen Pekowitz). Because the online nature of this class has necessitated dropping the worship, retreat, and community service components of our usual program, I decided to revive the older St. Andrew's tradition of individual mentorship. With the help of the confirmation parents, I recruited, matched, and trained 14 confirmation mentors from St. Andrew's and other churches who will meet in-person with their confirmands throughout spring 2021.

Our high school youth group moved from meeting twice a month in-person with dinner, to meeting once a week online for a short check-in and hangout on Sunday evenings. In fall 2020 we were able to add in-person outdoor events such as hikes and apple-

picking, attended by four to eight teens. Our youth group advisors, Rob Brandt and Marie Dunell, have proven themselves to be flexible, patient, and loving presences to our teens, whether online or in-person. We said goodbye and thank you to our stalwart acolyte wrangler, Jennifer Olivetti, in May. Without in-person worship or a new parent volunteer, our acolyte program, which engaged 28 high schoolers in 2019-2020, has been put on hold. Our highly anticipated high school summer mission trip to Appalachia in partnership with St. Michael's was postponed to summer 2021, much to the disappointment of our 28 teen and adult participants.

The bright spots of human connection sprinkled throughout this year have been invaluable to me,

from the evenings spent laughing my head off with teens to the mornings of delightful conversations with your children's favorite stuffed animals, and to all the moments I spent filled with awe at the creativity and talent of our children and teachers. There is more change to come, I'm sure. But for now, I rest in the eternal changelessness of God's love and the ways it shines through each of you.

Report of the Music Minister

THE SENIOR CHOIR numbers about 32 singers which, as of June 7, 2020, includes four paid section leaders who are either presently students or recent graduates of music conservatories. Our paid section leaders include tenor, Max Herman who

is an undergrad at NEC; soprano, Laura Cervinsky; alto, Britt Brown, and bass, Blake Jennings. Baritone Frank Rosamond left us in June of 2020.

The highlights of this year include Mia Kano's ordination on January 12, 2020, and our Lenten Choral Evensong on Sunday, March 1, 2020. Quite coincidentally, the Wellesley Cable Channel asked to video our Lenten Choral Evensong and we were able to use our musical selections on upcoming Sundays after the church was shut down on March 12, 2020 due to COVID-19.

We are, at present, still closed and have been presenting services online since then. As can be expected, this was a particular blow to our music program given that singing is deemed a "super spreader." Since March 12, we have recorded all our hymns and choral anthems for our services.

Special recognition goes to Katharine Clark and

Amanda Kern who have made this technological feat possible. Their tireless efforts to bring the music we have recorded to our online congregation, resulting in some very beautiful services, is beyond words. We simply could not have done it without them. Special recognition also goes to Peter Lull who has spent countless hours recording hymns and choral music. Thank you, Peter.

Another facet of our adaption to online services was dealing with the copyright issue. We are now members of OneLicense and, with the indispensable help of choir member Liz Dean, who has been painstakingly cataloguing every piece of music we sing and play, we are in compliance with the laws.

In June of 2020, I completed my 13th year as music minister at St. Andrew's.

Because the wardens and Adrian Robbins-Cole decided to go ahead with the church renovations, I have been without an organ to play since the organ was wrapped on September 4, 2020. Before that time, I practiced every day throughout the pandemic except for Sundays. Since then, I am indebted to Village Church, Wellesley College, Old West Church in Boston, and Church of the Redeemer in Chestnut Hill for permitting me to practice on their instruments. The Church of the Redeemer has also allowed the section

leaders and me, along with our team, to record anthems for our services.

Our senior choir has done a brilliant job of holding together in this difficult time. We started back right after Labor Day with regular Zoom choir rehearsals every Thursday evening from 7:30pm to 8:15pm and have had as many as 20 participants. I distributed hymnals and copies of *The New Church Anthem Book* to all our members. I also continue to reach out to mem-

bers who are unable to come to our Zoom rehearsals in hopes of keeping us together until we can meet again in person.

Report of the Parish Administrator

I WAS READING *The Murmur of Bees*, by Sofia Segovia, which is set against the backdrop of the 1918-1919 Spanish flu pandemic, last February. So, when the news of the coronavirus ramped up later that month, I was already thinking about pandemics and

what can happen. I began looking at all our technology and thinking about how we could all work from home for an extended period. After my repeated attempts to contact our tech consultants proved unsuccessful, I ultimately hired a new one, PCDoctectives. PCDoctectives added LogMeIn to all our machines. We took inventory of the equipment, wrote a spreadsheet, analyzed and prioritized our needs. LogMeIn also gave us the ability to log into our work computers from home. As we flipped the calendars to March, I began purchasing new laptops and docking stations, microphones, lights, and tripods for people to record and use to "go live." I helped everyone sign up for a Zoom account and thus we started working from home.

At the beginning we were guided by the diocese for protocols and best practices. We spent a good deal of energy on office and workplace safety and tried to organize safety rules around having services in the building. Steve Killeen and I jumped into finding and purchasing Personal Professional Equipment (PPE) supplies early. I am glad we have them, even as we have not had a lot of call to use them since we are all still working (mostly) at home. In April, I worked with Boston Light & Sound, Inc. to move forward

with the changes needed in our audio system to add video broadcasting capabilities in hopes of using the system when we returned to church in the fall. Their work was done between May and August.

In March, I began to work with our web designer on plans for new webpages that would fill the bill for hosting and viewing live services. I also noted those pages that would need changes as time moved on. We were also thinking about how we might present Easter to the congregation via the web, even though we did not yet know what we would be doing. We were running multiple tracks of plans based on many "what-if" scenarios and we were learning new skills. We each had such different roles, and I was thinking about who had to do what and when so we could build a remote service from the ground up. We also had to think as a team of three, with Mia Kano and Amanda Kern, on how to allow enough time to learn video and sound editing.

As spring progressed it became clear that we needed to rethink the logistics of church, and the staff started meeting daily on Zoom to coordinate our work. We all learned Google Calendar, Docs, and Sheets (through Google Drive); Dropbox; and Facebook. A few of us also learned some Adobe products—Premier, Rush, Photoshop, Acrobat—YouTube; and Vimeo. (There are others I am forgetting I am sure.) I signed us up, in various combinations, for all the licenses to these (new-to-us) online cloud services/apps/programs (not always inexpensive and most often by monthly subscription). I spent a lot of time looking for training videos for all the things we were

going to need to keep everyone working from home. Mia made PowerPoint presentations to train the other clergy to "go live" on Facebook in the spring of 2020. This was our first transition for Sunday services. The plan was to transition to recorded services for Holy Week and Easter: that would be our second transition.

In the past, for this kind of training work, I would have invited people into my office to watch me do the thing we needed to learn, and then I would have looked over their shoulders as they repeated the process. But that is not possible now and that makes trainings like this exponentially more difficult for teaching and learning. And the learning curve on some things has been steep, with some of us learning faster than others.

All these new systems for coordinating our work have changed our workflow. For instance, because all the music now had to be recorded, we needed to set up schedules for recording that included staff and parishioners with safe standards and protocols to follow. Once the music was recorded, everything had to be uploaded from phones, cameras, or laptops (multiple kinds of learning here as each device has its own interface) to Dropbox, named, and sorted into files by date. Then we began assigning the editing tasks for both sound and video. As you can imagine, that pushed out the timeframe we were accustomed to working within when we were all in the office together—from making final decisions a few days before a service to weeks before a service.

This kind of scheduling change affected all our work. Because our disciplines are interdependent, each staff member's work is usually dependent on another staff person's work; workflow scheduling has a domino effect. We all had to start thinking much further in advance than we wanted or were used to, moving the work onto the next step and the next person to touch the project. We also had to become better communicators via more systems as we could no longer walk down the hall to ask a question. Since we use

Office 365 fully and completely now, we use Teams as well as texts, phone calls, emails, Zoom, and screen sharing often to "look over each other's shoulders."

For a period, we stopped scheduling all our volunteers because of COVID-19. Some are now working remotely, others are coming in to do typing, and still others are taking things home to do, but this in general is a great loss for us. First, we love having them in the building, willing and able to do almost anything we might need in a pinch, as well as tasks that get done on a regular weekly basis. Second, they improve the atmosphere and morale in the office bringing great cheer to staff, other volunteers, and callers both on the phone and at the door. Many of the volunteers help to maintain church records and I still worry about these tasks. We are keeping records on Google Drive right now and we must move them into the books. The longer this goes on, the bigger this project gets. So, I am devising a system to get everything into the hard bound books for last year as I write this.

I still find myself needing to help solve equipment issues and printing issues, etc. that are in people's homes now and not just at the church. These are tasks that would normally—relatively speaking—be easy in person, and now they can take days instead of hours working on the phone or remotely. Thankfully, this happens much less now that we are all settled in our routines.

I pray that a new normal emerges and that hope springs eternal. I pray that we can continue to shine our lights into the world and illuminate a path of encouragement and unity, individually and as a church community.

AS WE ENTERED 2020, we were happily remembering our 125th Anniversary celebrations and feeling blessed by your tremendous generosity, which led to the success of both our 125th Anniversary Capital Campaign and our annual stewardship appeal. We were looking ahead to another fulfilling year as a parish, both spiritually and programmatically. We planned to strengthen our parish through an Episcopal program called RenewalWorks, were anticipating Mia's ordination, and Adrian's sabbatical. Among many other events on the horizon, under the excellent leadership of Jim Blackwell and the property committee, we were preparing for our sanctuary and narthex renovations. Wow, does that seem like a long time ago! It is a good reminder that our plans may not be God's plans.

Thankfully, we were able to celebrate Mia's ordination in early January. It was a very special service filled with faith, love, and joy. Additionally, St. Andrew's sponsored Anna Page's April ordination at St. Michael's Church in Raleigh, North Carolina. Blessings to both Mia and Anna for long and happy priesthoods.

On the personnel front, after 20 years of service as our parish financial secretary, Ruth Hubert made the decision to retire. We planned to celebrate Ruth's outstanding service to St. Andrew's in the spring of 2020, but now hope to have Ruth join us at a Sunday service when we are back worshipping in person. After a thorough search, led by Frank Hunnewell, vestryperson for personnel, we hired Joanne Butler to replace Ruth as the financial administrator. Joanne hit the ground running in February. In partnership with Harry Condon, our treasurer, and David Osborn, vestryperson for finance, the parish's finances have

been carefully and thoughtfully managed during this challenging year.

By late February, we were beginning to think about the coronavirus and make what we viewed as necessary adjustments, such as not passing the peace, being more careful at Lenten suppers, and making changes to communion. Adrian was well ahead of the curve in recognizing the need to adapt to the rapidly changing situation. By early March we were beginning to prepare for the possibility of being remote. Thanks to Kate Clark's forward thinking technology leadership, the clergy and staff had the hardware and software to start working from home as we locked down. While it was by no means easy, for the most part the transition to remote work and worship was pretty seamless. In our families the younger generation is an invaluable technology resource. This turned out to be the case at St. Andrew's as well: Mia's expertise allowed us to effectively use social media and communication platforms for education and worship.

The clergy and staff quickly fell into a routine of daily Morning Prayer and Compline. Sunday services were joint with Sarah Robbins-Cole's parish, St. Michael's, Holliston. This was a brilliant outcome that benefitted both parishes while providing all of us the opportunity to see Adrian and Sarah lead worship together. Many parishioners commented that the interaction and dialog between them made worship more meaningful and personal. Zoom coffee hours after services became a great way to catch up with others in our parish.

Early in the pandemic, among the many issues the vestry grappled with was whether to apply for the US Government's Paycheck Protection Plan (PPP). Ultimately, after prayerful consideration, the decision was made that we should not apply due to the strength of our parish finances.

For the first time in many years, much to the consternation of those of us with donation piles, we cancelled Bargain Haul. Not only was St. Andrew's deprived of a meaningful revenue source and a wonderful week of fellowship, but those in the community who depend upon the bargains each year were let down.

In May, out of an abundance of caution and concern about worker safety and supply chain disruption, we made the difficult decision to delay our construction project.

Then, as Governor Charlie Baker began to discuss loosening gathering restrictions we started planning for a safe reopening. St. Andrew's is blessed with many physicians, so we convened a doctors advisory group consisting of Judith Boland, Richard Ehrlichman, Eliot Heher, Paul Shellito, and David Steele. Their expertise and guidance was invaluable in thinking through how we could worship together safely. We determined that with social distancing the sanctuary could hold about 60 people. St. Andrew's also had to submit a reopening plan to the diocese for approval, which was granted. However, due to the daunting logistics and concerns about parishioner safety we ultimately determined that reopening was not prudent.

While the clergy and staff were able to take some well-earned time off, in addition to continuing daily worship, the summer was spent preparing for the fall. Adult education, youth education, Bible study, youth group, Rite-13—essentially everything we do as a parish—needed to be reviewed and when necessary, revised. We also began planning for what would normally be our fall regathering Sunday service, this year to be held on Luisa Hunnewell's lawn and followed by a socially distanced "bring your own" picnic. However, Governor Baker's order limiting outdoor groups disappointingly necessitated cancellation.

In August, as it became clear that we would be remote well into 2021, we decided to start our renovation project. One silver lining to the delay was it allowed us to research air conditioning (with air purification) for the sanctuary and were able to add it to the project. We are excited to be able to use this closure time productively as well as to support the local economy.

Since we had to cover and protect the organ, Wardie Mannix with Peter Lull's assistance, recorded hymns and anthems for all services through December. Wardie has also been conducting and recording anthems with the section leaders masked and singing 20 feet apart. Throughout the year, Amanda Kern, Wardie, and the section leaders have worked hard to

create beautiful and original music for our worship services.

In September Paige Manning expertly worked on a lease amendment and extension for the Montessori School that protects St. Andrew's as their landlord, should any coronavirus issues arise.

Each vestry ministry approached the fall thinking outside the box to engage and connect the parish as much as possible. Please read each report as there has been a lot of activity, including pumpkin deliveries, #St.Andrew'sStrong bracelets, and Walktober. Worship continues to include many readers from both parishes as well as some creative biblical skits and animations. In October, we held two outdoor communion services, with no more than 32 people, advance sign-up, and single serving wafers and grape juice packages.

Our stewardship campaign, "Rising to the Challenge: we are all in this together," to support the parish's mission and ministries in 2021, was St. Andrew's first remote effort. With Hugh MacArthur very capably at the helm, the stewardship committee went into overdrive to ensure we met our goal of \$1,050,000. Many of you recorded meaningful stewardship testimonials to help this effort. Abundant thanks to all who have pledged, and we strongly encourage others to join in; it's never too late to pledge your support for St. Andrew's!

Planning for Advent began early, and as we write this, we have just celebrated Advent II. Margaret is planning the Taizé-style and Blue Christmas services, Amanda is organizing the Christmas pageant, and we are distributing consecrated wine and wafers for use at the 5pm Christmas Eve service.

In closing, we want to thank all vestry and committee members for their dedication this year. Finally, we want to sincerely thank Adrian, Margaret, Mia, Kate, Wardie, Amanda, Joanne, Steve, and Susan for their herculean efforts to keep St. Andrew's not only functioning, but thriving and growing in new and innovative ways during 2020.

Report of the Vestryperson for Adult Formation

WE BEGAN 2020 continuing the strong work established by our outgoing vestryperson, Peter Fergusson, Rev. Margaret Schwarzer, and our dedicated adult formation committee. Over the last five years I have witnessed how this committee has organized, developed, and expanded the programming and offerings for our parish. Yet it has been the nimbleness, creativity, and accountability of this group in the face of the challenges presented by the global pandemic that have been most impressive. As we forged ahead to adapt and sometimes re-invent our programming, the results were offerings that continue to engage, inspire, and connect with our parish.

Before the gathering restrictions were enacted mid-March, programming continued per usual. Our Christian learning series focused on Christianity and the Arts while our Faith & Practice sessions dove into the topics of "Good Grief" and "Your Body is a Temple." We held two of our Lenten series programs and dinners, one on "Sacrifice: Ancient Practice and Modern Discipline of Fasting" and the other on "Suffering: A Jewish Perspective". I would like to thank the Green Team for their guidance and help in providing a more environmentally friendly approach to the Lenten events.

As we switched to a virtual format, unfortunately we had to eliminate events such as the college coffee meetings, Wellesley College retreats/workshops/programming, and a field trip to the MFA, as well as

suspend planning for our pilgrimage to England in 2021. Other events, including the Taizé-style service and the Turkey Trot, had to be reimaged.

However, our regular Christian learning programming continued to thrive in a virtual format. Whether it was the Christian learning series, Bible Circle, or the Men's Bible/book clubs, interest and attendance reflected pre-pandemic levels and grew in some areas. One significant change involved our collaboration with Rev. Sarah Robbins-Cole and St. Michael's Episcopal Church. We enjoyed the shared responsibility and engagement between the two parishes in the offerings for the Christian learning series, Bible Circle, and adult confirmation classes. We welcome this inspired collaboration for the foreseeable future

As a committee, we charge ourselves with constantly assessing and evaluating our offerings to ensure their quality, relevance, and interest to a broad reach of our parish. This year has been an unusual one, but this committee never ceased to approach the challenges with inspired vigor and enthusiasm. Thank you: Laura Brown MacKinnon, Peter Fergusson, David Hamlin, Carrie Hawley, Margarethe Kulke, Mary Scanlon, Carol Shedd, and Paul Shellito, for your dedicated service. Thank you, Rev. Margaret Schwarzer for your wisdom and perspective; you are our backbone.

Report of the Vestryperson for Communication

AS COVID-19 TIGHTENED ITS GRIP on the world in early 2020, St. Andrew's priorities shifted quickly to focusing on the safety of the church's clergy, staff, and parishioners. Accordingly, church operations, worship services, programming, and events pivoted to the digital space, requiring the immediate and systemic adoption of electronic communications across the St. Andrew's community. Although St. Andrew's had made great strides in elevating our understand-

ing and application of technology and digital communications in 2019, moving 100% of the church's daily functions, governance, interactions and, especially, worship to a virtual arena required significant diligence and adaptability. Communications became more important than ever as the congregation became dependent on dissemination of information and opportunity to worship with no in-person interaction and very limited printed materials.

- Clergy and staff were provided with laptop computers to ensure they were equipped for remote communications.
- The clergy, staff, and vestry quickly adapted to virtual meetings, utilizing video conferencing programs such as Zoom. Digital tools such as Dropbox and the Adobe creative suite optimized file sharing and development of creative communication materials.
- The church website quickly became an epicenter of information for parishioners. With help from talented volunteers, especially Rob Brandt, parish administrator Katharine Clark leveraged the site to provide immediately accessible updates on virtual services, programs, and activities, and a virtual calendar presented in an easy-to-understand, weekby-week schedule that was updated daily.
- Daily email communications from the clergy supported the online calendar and added additional context while providing parishioners with a sense of connectivity. The number of social media followers and relevant/relatable content increased across all platforms.
- All services were successfully transitioned to the virtual space, including Sunday worship, morning prayer. and compline, and parishioners were able to easily link to services through multiple channels including the website, YouTube, and Facebook. Christian learning for children, youth, and adults; choir rehearsals; beloved special events such as the Christmas pageant; and social activities like coffee hours also converted to remote platforms.
- A new video recording system was installed in the sanctuary so St. Andrew's will be able to stream services even after returning to in-person

services, providing parishioners with a choice of how they worship while continuing to increase the parish's reach.

Virtually connecting the St. Andrew's community with the clergy, services, programs, and each other has provided a safe haven for all parishioners, but especially for those who were most vulnerable to the virus. The reach of electronic communications has attracted new members and enabled former parishioners to reconnect with St. Andrew's; weekday online services have more people engaging with the parish than before the pandemic.

Along with St. Andrew's online communications success, we leveraged offline opportunities to invite more people in the surrounding community to worship with us. Printed ads in local papers announced special services, and a big new banner outside the church provides an open invitation to join our vibrant congregation online.

In early December, the *Wellesley Townsman* published a story about St. Andrew's and how the church is finding its way in the online space. Based on an interview with the Rev. Adrian Robbins-Cole, the article addressed the challenges related to connecting with parishioners during a pandemic and highlighted the many successes St. Andrew's has experienced with our new digital communications strategies.

Other than a brief break at the outset of the pandemic, the communications committee met monthly in 2020, with frequent attendees including our three clergy members (Adrian Robbins-Cole, Mia Kano, and Margaret Schwarzer), Rob Brandt, Katharine Clark, Dan Dent, Lee Eichelberger, Peter Lull, Betsy Millane, and Sandra Rigney.

Report of the Vestryperson for Human Resources

2020 WILL BE REMEMBERED as a year of a global public health and economic crisis with simultaneous social and political upheavals in the United States. You can be proud that during this challenging year the clergy and staff of St. Andrew's Church demonstrated almost super-human resilience—adjusting, improvising, and collaborating in ways previously unimagined. They took care of us and of each other under the most challenging circumstances, and St. Andrew's is stronger as a result.

Early in the year we were recruiting and interviewing candidates for the position of financial administrator, a position held by Ruth Hubert for many years. We were thrilled when Joanne Butler accepted our offer and started work on February 1. The plan was for Joanne to work side-by-side with Ruth until her formal retirement on March 31, providing two full months of overlap. We are grateful to Ruth for the support she provided, and continues to provide, helping Joanne understand our financial procedures and absorb the institutional knowledge Ruth had accumulated during her time at St. Andrew's.

In mid-March everything changed when the global COVID-19 pandemic struck, and the entire church staff shifted to working remotely, which continues today.

I'm sure that elsewhere in this annual report for 2020 others will describe in greater detail the incredible work the church clergy and staff undertook to respond to the pandemic. Nonetheless, the HR committee would like to acknowledge here the extraordinary resilience that everybody demonstrated.

Adrian, Margaret, and Mia (in a wonderful new collaboration with Sarah Robbins-Cole of St. Michael's in Holliston) quickly brought all our worship services online through Zoom, Facebook,

YouTube, and the church website. New morning prayer and compline services were added. All of this and more was facilitated by the amazing work of our parish administrator, Katharine Clark, who fearlessly navigated all the technological challenges as St. Andrew's and many parishioners were thrust into a brave new world of virtual experiences on our laptops and cellphones. Wardie Mannix and Amanda Kern are keeping us connected to our beloved musical traditions, which form an integral part of our Sunday services. Susan Jackson brought our church school offerings into an online and virtual environment. Although our buildings are closed, Steve Killeen is on site every day keeping everything secure and in customary good order. With the narthex and sanctuary renovations now underway, his presence and knowledge of our infrastructure has been a tremendous help.

Fortunately, our solid financial condition has allowed us to maintain full compensation and benefits for all our clergy and staff throughout the year. While we considered taking advantage of the federal government's Paycheck Protection Program, as did many other places of worship, the vestry decided that our financial condition made that unnecessary, and that those resources were better used by organizations less fortunate than we.

As noted in this report last year, Adrian had asked us to consider a new policy to reimburse our clergy and staff for the work-related use of their personal cell phones. After the pandemic struck, this became all the more necessary, and members of the committee developed a reimbursement policy that was implemented retroactive to February 1. We are now working on the 2021 HR budget.

This concludes my three-year term as your vestryperson for HR. I would like to thank Adrian for his thoughtful, determined, and effective leadership. We are in good hands. I would also like to thank the other members of the HR committee: Meg Harris, Nancy Kohl, Michael Mahlenkamp, Paige Manning, Paul Merry, Terri Rawson, and Michael Vanin.

THIS YEAR, AS THE PANDEMIC HIT our country in early March, tracking new members attending St. Andrew's came to an abrupt halt. Up to that point, we had eight new families who requested to be added to our database and who wished to receive regular communications from our parish. We did reach out to them in early spring. Over the course of the year, we have had at least five requests from individuals attending our worship services online who asked to be added to our mailing list and/or made a financial contribution to St. Andrew's.

Sadly, since we are no longer meeting in person for worship, there has been no need to have welcome greeters for each Sunday, nor exit greeters.

On March 1, right before we closed our doors, we were able to host a Kids' Place coffee for families with babies and toddlers. They loved being able to connect with each other and have playtime for their small children.

We cancelled our spring and fall newcomer brunches, which normally help welcome newcomers to the parish. We also cancelled the Pimm's party at the rectory set for May.

Membership was able to work with fellowship in the fall to create COVID-19 Coventry Cocktails—

Zoom gatherings of small groups to help us stay connected. We are pleased to say we have nine groups of at least six "windows" per group. They will meet three times over the next few months with the first occurring between Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Membership created "#St.Andrew'sStrong" silicon bracelets to give to all members of the St. Andrew's family. These bracelets are a constant reminder that we are in this pandemic together and we look forward to having a ceremonial "cutting off the bracelets" when we are able to worship together again safely.

Membership also partnered with altar guild and fellowship to create "Communion to Go" packages for the Christmas Eve 5pm service. The membership committee helped package the wafers and wine and helped distribute to any parishioner requesting a delivery.

A big thank you to the membership committee for their steadfast work and enthusiasm during 2020. The committee includes Connie Barnes, Elizabeth Clarke, Amanda Curtis, Sarah Harris, Francie Hawkey, Carrie Hawley, Lakey MacArthur, Suzanne Nystrom, Anne Prensner, and Ginny Snow. David Hamlin is our warden representative and Margaret Schwarzer is our clergy representative.

Lay Pastoral Care Committee Report

THE PASTORAL CARE TEAM is made up of lay people and the St. Andrew's clergy. It is an example of the partnership between lay people and clergy and plays a central role in the provision of pastoral care at St. Andrew's. Typically, members visit parishioners in their homes and in hospitals, nursing homes, and other residential communities. However, since March, pandemic safety protocols have meant that it has not been possible to visit parishioners. Nor has it been possible for the team to have its monthly in person meetings.

But the work of the team has continued with individual lay members of the team being active in their pastoral ministry either by phone or by Zoom. Lay members have also kept the clergy informed of pastoral situations they learn about.

We are looking forward to being able to fully resume the important work of the lay pastoral care team, including in-person visits, when conditions allow.

Report of the Vestryperson for Outreach

THE PRIMARY OBJECTIVE of the St. Andrew's outreach ministry is to help our congregation put our Christian faith into action. The COVID-19 pandemic has certainly impacted every aspect of our outreach efforts. The need is greater than ever in our neighboring communities as well as around the globe and we have had to adjust our "hands on" mentality to protect others and ourselves. Our last in-person outreach meeting was March 10, 2020. From that point on we have slowly but steadily adapted to Zoom interactions and virtual fundraising efforts. St. Andrew's monetary assistance has been a lifeline for many of our outreach partners. Ten percent of the pledge payments received from our capital campaign in 2020 will be distributed to El Hogar, St. Stephen's, and Family Promise Metrowest equally. Below highlights our outreach work for 2020.

Metrowest/Local outreach partners and activities

- Family Promise Metrowest
 Our relationship with Family Promise Metrowest
 (FPM), a cooperative interfaith partnership helping
 - homeless families through safe transitional shelter, meals, and case management, continues to be a positive opportunity to live our faith.
- Volunteers from St. Andrew's and Village Church hosted families in person the week of March 1.
 After that date it was decided that the homeless families would be sheltered in a hotel. Fundraising began in earnest to continue to provide case management and supportive services for the families.
- The annual "Keep the Promise" gala was held as a virtual event on December 5, with a live and silent auction as well as raffle tickets and music.
- Debbie Osborn and Heidi Harper are St. Andrew's coordinators for FPM and have attended FPM coordinator meetings every other month this year via Zoom. Our outreach budget gave \$2,400 this year to Family Promise Metrowest. A yet-undetermined amount received from the Alternative Gift Fair will also be given to FPM.
- 2. *Salvation Army/Pearl Street Cupboard & Café*Our longstanding partnership with the Salvation

Army (SA) and Pearl Street Cupboard & Café has given our parish monthly volunteering opportunities. Unfortunately, this year the Pearl Street Cupboard & Café has been closed and is offering meals-to-go only. Our outreach budget gave \$3,000 to Salvation Army Framingham.

- 3. Wellesley Food Pantry
 - St. Andrew's outreach continues to support the efforts of the pantry in helping our neighbors who are experiencing food insecurity. Peter Lull is the point person for the Wellesley Food Pantry and is also the president of the pantry. The pantry was temporarily located in the Unitarian Universalist Church during renovations to the site at the Hills Church.
- Margarethe Kulke organized the annual SOUPer Bowl Sunday pantry collection and on February 2 the many items collected were delivered to the pantry.

The Wellesley Food Pantry received financial support from St. Andrew's in the sum of \$1,500 from the budget as well as money collected through the Alternative Gift Fair. As of this writing, the AGF money has not been totaled.

Urban/Boston outreach partners and activities

- 1. St. Stephen's Episcopal Church
 St. Stephen's Church in Boston's South End
 has been our sister parish for a very long time.
 Through our continued partnership with this
 inner-city parish, we have been enriched by our
 relationships with many of the leadership and
 staff of St. Stephen's.
- Cam McCormick and Karen Pekowitz organized our week of volunteering for the B-SAFE summer enrichment program which occurred August 3 to 6. Sixty grab-and-go lunches were prepared each day for the campers and 50 bags of non-perishable groceries were delivered August 7 to support St. Stephen's Youth Programs.
- St. Andrew's support of the B-READY program, which provided hearty macaroni and cheese casseroles for the after-school program at St. Stephen's,

has been transformed into the B-LOVE program. Cam McCormick organized a sign-up to allow parishioners to drop off non-perishables every Tuesday at the home of the Harpers. The donations are picked up on Wednesdays by a volunteer from the Church of the Redeemer in Chestnut Hill. The program has been a huge success with many St. Andrew's parishioners donating faithfully each week.

- In November, Herb Manning organized the Thanksgiving food bags that were given to St. Stephen's. The Mannings and several volunteers shopped for the turkeys and food, organized the bags, and delivered 80 bags to St. Stephen's.
- The Whitings prepared the Christmas baskets given to the seniors at St. Stephen's.
- 2. Healthcare Without Walls
 - Healthcare Without Walls (HCWW) was founded by Dr. Roseanna Means and provides free and compassionate medical care to homeless women and families. St. Andrew's has supported the efforts of this ministry for many years. Donna Kell oversees the Sox Box and the knitting ministry which both aid HCWW.
- Donna Kell continues to purchase white cotton socks, which are needed by homeless people for health reasons. She drops them off periodically throughout the year.
- The St. Andrew's Stitchers work at home to make beautiful homemade hats/scarves/blankets for Healthcare Without Walls clients and also for the Christmas baskets for St. Stephen's.
- A virtual baby shower was hosted by St. Andrew's parishioners in support of the Bridges to Moms initiative this past summer. Many shopped online to provide much needed baby supplies for homeless mothers, which were distributed by HCWW.
- 4. common cathedral

common cathedral, also known as Ecclesia Ministries, is an outreach ministry to homeless people in the Boston area. Through Cam McCormick's leadership, a monthly sign-up was created to provide a "grab and go" lunch for the ministry once a month. Cam has also organized our participation in a "warm clothing/sleeping bag" drive for the unhoused people served by Ecclesia Ministries.

El Hogar, Honduras

For more than 40 years, El Hogar has been transforming the lives of children who are crippled by extreme poverty. El Hogar provides a home and education to those children who would otherwise have little hope of a future. Becky and Steve Taylor have been the spokespeople for this vital ministry for many years. As the Taylors have moved geographically, Bianka Eichelberger has offered to be the liaison. Bianka was one of eight who traveled to El Hogar in the summer of 2019 from St. Andrew's.

- Many new initiatives are happening at El Hogar.
 There is a new executive director in Honduras, Denise Vargas, the first native Honduran to have this leadership role.
- On October 24, El Hogar hosted "Esperanza, a Celebration of Hope", an online fundraising event that provided participants with information and insight into the mission of El Hogar. Many at St. Andrew's took part and donated generously. St. Andrew's provided \$5,000 in financial support from the budget as well as money (not determined yet) from the Alternative Gift Fair.

A yearly event that deserves mentioning is the Alternative Gift Fair (AGF), which occurred virtually in 2020. The AGF provides parishioners the opportunity to support our outreach partners by donating in someone's name as a gift. The AGF was again organized by Ann Johnson with assistance from Cam McCormick and Katharine Clark who made the event virtual and seamless.

New Initiative

In 2019 the outreach committee developed a tool to encourage wider parish involvement. Through diligent and thoughtful work, the Outreach Grant Application was created. Thirty thousand dollars was set aside to be awarded to organizations that met certain criteria set forth by the members of the committee. Due to the pandemic this grant opportunity was put on hold. The \$30,000 set aside for this effort will be distributed equally among our outreach partners.

The many and varied opportunities to put our faith into action are what make St. Andrew's such a vibrant and caring community. 2020 has been a challenging year for our outreach ministries, but I am grateful

for the generous response of our parish and thank the outreach committee members for their coordination of our efforts: Al Dubé, Zebby Dubé, Bianka Eichelberger, Joanna Horobin, Donna Kell, Margarethe Kulke, Peter Lull, Herb Manning, Laura Brown MacKinnon, Anne Manners, Cam McCormick, Debbie Osborn, Caren Parker, Mary Scanlon, Jack Whiting, Jill Whiting, Penn Young, and our warden representative, Paige Manning. We will miss Carol Jankowski,

a decades-long member of the committee and enthusiastic volunteer across our outreach ministries, who died in 2020.

We continue to strive to put our faith into action and trust in God's unwavering love for our strength and perseverance in the year ahead.

Report of the Vestryperson for Property

STEMMING FROM ST. ANDREW'S 2019 capital campaign are three significant 2020 changes:

- A property committee was established to provide oversight especially for capital projects.
- A capital campaign property refurbishment fund is set up.
- Upgrades to the sanctuary, narthex, and children's chapel

We are grateful to Jim Blackwell for quarterbacking the sanctuary and narthex renovations. His work involves often-daily communications with our architect/consultant, our contractors, and St. Andrew's leadership. The work ranges from developing strategic coordination of subcontractors and cost oversight to selecting tile samples and paint colors.

The scheduling of the renovations, originally planned for the summer months, changed because in spring it was uncertain if there would be mandated

shutdowns or supply chain interruptions. Instead, renovations started in the fall and early winter, a period when the church was closed to parishioners. Another COVID-19 induced change, a positive one, was the addition of air treating technology, called bipolar ionization, which mitigates and reduces the spread of viruses.

Thank you, Jim Blackwell, Laura Brown MacKinnon, Carrie Hawley, Frank Hunnewell, Michael Mahlenkamp, Randy Parker, and Sam Schaefer—members of the property committee.

Again, we are grateful to Steve Killeen for the care and attention that he gives to the maintenance of our properties. Our dramatic renovation project rightly steals the limelight, but projects coordinated by Steve, such as water leak remediation, roof repair, upgrading of our church parking lot, and managing renovation traffic are essential.

Renovation Report

IT WAS EXCITING to restart the renovations to church worship spaces after the seven-month COVID delay. After the property committee and the vestry gave their approval to proceed in early September, our core team of Adrian; Jim Blackwell; Steve Mahoney, vestryperson for property; Bill Foley, construction manager; and Tala Klinck, architect, resurrected the project. All subcontractors were available, which made it possible to start back to work in October. By the time you read this report the project will be almost complete.

Renovations to the narthex have been designed to make the church's main entrance feel more welcoming and give it a more formal character. A new tile floor has been installed. New coat closets, cabinetry, and wood trim have been added. The narthex entrance door has been replaced through a gift to the church.

New lighting designed by parishioner Carrie Hawley, principal at HLB Lighting, has been installed in the narthex and the sanctuary. The sanctuary has been painted, had floors sanded, pews repaired and refinished, and kneelers recovered. The last item will be new carpeting. The children's chapel, with a new wood floor, has been repainted and the altar was refinished.

Air conditioning has been installed in the sanctuary and the children's chapel.

UV-C ion disinfection technology, designed to eliminate 99% of pathogens such as COVID-19, has been incorporated in new ceiling fans and our forced air system. Many institutions are adding these technologies in response to the pandemic.

Final costs are expected to be very close to our October estimates (attached). Special thanks go to the property committee for their counsel during the final planning. Steve Killeen, our intrepid sexton, as always has been a major help with this project.

Report of the Vestryperson for Stewardship

THE 2021 STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE came together in the spring of 2020 to begin planning for the 2021 campaign. Given the stresses and uncertainty the COVID-19 pandemic was placing on all of us, we decided our power as a community was a strong way to battle back. The theme of the campaign was "Rising to the Challenge: We are all in this Together," and our goals were to raise \$1,050,000 and have participation from 300 households.

Our strategy relied on some successful past guides, including beginning the campaign in October and keeping it to a crisp four-week frame. Due to COVID-19, we had to reimagine or fully rethink other elements of the campaign to work in the virtual world. These elements included:

- Integrating St. Andrew's campaign with St. Michael's since we were functioning as one virtual parish in services
- Pre-campaign survey to understand what inspired the parish and to understand any potential issues
- Kick-off video interview with Adrian Robbins-Cole and Sarah Robbins-Cole to introduce the campaign and theme
- Conversion of all testimonials, numbering more than 20, to video

- Weekly email blasts of video testimonials, thermometer showing progress, and reminders to pledge
- Video updates from the stewardship committee on progress

As we wind down our campaign, I am pleased to report that we have raised nearly \$1 million and appear to be on track toward our goal of \$1,050,000. We will continue to get gifts and pledges through January.

I would like to thank everyone in the St. Andrew's community who makes a pledge or a gift as this helps us to make the church and our parish what they are today. I am grateful to be part of such a wonderful group. I would also like to thank members of the stewardship committee for their time, talent, and energy in making a very different campaign a success: Connie Barnes, David Hamlin, Ann Johnson, Allen Jones, Herb Manning, Madison Riley, George Stathis, Michael Vanin, and Justin Wahls.

Finally, a call of appreciation and gratitude to Adrian for his support and participation throughout the entire process, all the meetings, and helping to develop the strategy.

Report of the Vestryperson for Worship

Lay Eucharistic Ministry Report

ST. ANDREW'S LAY EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS (LEMs) include readers and chalice bearers. They are a dedicated group who make an important contribution to our worship services. The pandemic year of 2020 brought changes to this service as to all other parts of our life as a parish. Until the last in-person Sunday service on March 8, our 25 active chalice bearers continued to serve, as well as the 26 readers we had as of that time. Starting March 15, when we moved to virtual Sunday services, we recruited online readers, and now have close to 40 volunteers. In addition, we also have ten to 15 substitutes to fill in when needed for readings or chalice bearing. In a normal year, there are over 400 LEM assignments, willingly fulfilled due to the dedication and cooperative spirit of the LEM volunteers.

Many of our active eucharistic ministers and readers have served St. Andrew's loyally for several years: one for over 40 years, 11 for more than 20 years, and another seven for over ten years. Several people play a key role in helping organize and schedule the LEMs: Adams Carroll, responsible for weekly reminders, distribution of the readings and prayers, and substitutions; Liz Deane, for the care and maintenance of our vestments; and Katharine Clark, who makes sure we have the weekly service information and recognition in the bulletin.

Many thanks to all our capable, collegial members of this ministry for their help and their willingness to serve. We all look forward to serving again in person.

Report of the Vestryperson for Youth Formation

2020 WAS DEFINED BY THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC, which required significant flexibility and creativity in youth formation. We are incredibly grateful for Rev. Mia Kano's leadership during this challenging time; she recognized the need to quickly pivot to virtual lessons and events, while also reaching out to families to understand their individual needs. Susan Jackson continued to support the church school as programming shifted from onsite to virtual. We are also very thankful for our passionate committee of D.D. Alexander, Megan Burns (ex officio), Becca Daws, Cari Dineen, Leanne Salvia, Heather Schaefer, and Elizabeth Svedlund, who continued to meet monthly, via Zoom, and dedicated many hours of their time to figuring out new ways to engage St. Andrew's youth in a rapidly changing environment. Despite the challenges posed by COVID-19 and the resulting restrictions on in-person gatherings, we continued to offer meaningful programming and special events.

Our initial response to the pandemic was to recreate our existing programs virtually, as much as possible, but as it became clear that gathering restrictions would extend into the fall, we shifted our efforts to developing longer-term solutions that were flexible enough to be implemented in person or virtually. Our committee focused on making virtual events engaging and assessing what worked or did not. In May, Rev. Mia Kano organized meetings with youth formation lay leaders for Rite-13, confirmation, and youth group to gather feedback on their experiences teaching virtually. She also created a summer advisory group comprised of parents, church school teachers, and church school committee members to garner a deeper understanding of what church school families needed spiritually.

As a result of those conversations, Rite-13, confirmation, and youth group continued, via Zoom, into the fall and planned regular in-person, masked and socially distant activities. A common theme among church school-aged families was the strain of the pandemic on parents as they tried to navigate remote schooling and childcare needs; thus, flexible, handson activities, in addition to Zoom church school, were appreciated. Rev. Mia Kano continued to provide weekly church school lessons via Zoom and created a home formation curriculum of weekly activities and lessons that could be picked up at the church monthly.

Feedback from families indicated a hunger for in-person gatherings and worship. The church school committee was able to host several in-person events in the fall, including a "Blessing of the Backpacks," a toddler story-time, and an All Hallows' Eve trunkor-treat and service in the parking lot. Due to rising COVID-19 infections, plans for an outdoor advent wreath-making event had to be pared back on short notice and a December gingerbread house event that was originally planned to take place outside was moved to Zoom.

A detailed report of specific programming has been submitted by Rev. Mia Kano.

Also of note, as we moved into the fall, our church school committee transitioned to a smaller group, which was reflective of the increased demands on parents.


