First Lesson: Exodus 12:1-14

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it

raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Second Lesson: Romans 13:8-14

Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, "You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal;

You shall not covet"; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, "Love your neighbor as yourself." Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.

Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us live

honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Ministries to the Homeless



About the Readings

Exodus 12:1-14 Today's reading interrupts the narrative flow of the exodus story to give the community detailed instructions for the celebrating the Passover. This meal is to be an annual memorial recalling the pivotal experience of the community's rescue by Yahweh from their slavery in Egypt. Celebrating the Passover ritual makes the exodus experience present to each generation, who in turn must attune their lives to the covenantal responsibilities that emerged from their relationship with Yahweh. Situated at the start of their year, the Passover ensures that each year will be consecrated by the memory of the community's founding experience of liberation. The reading also connects several important themes: the household, the sacrificial lamb, rescue through blood and the dual character of Yahweh whose presence in our world always means first the judgment of evil and then the rescue of those who cry out for help.

Psalms 149 This psalm is a hymn of triumph celebrating God's mighty deeds in Israel's salvation history and imagining the establishment of justice on earth. It is most probably postexilic. The psalmist does not mention David as the king of Israel, possibly because Israel had already gone through the "death" of the exile and

had already "ascended" up God's holy hill. The martial images of verses 5-9 indicate the execution of God's judgment and the establishment of justice. Praise is still important in this new era.

Romans 13:8-14 Paul concludes this section of moral exhortation (chaps. 12-13) with the principle that underlies his specific directions: love of neighbor. This is the obligation we always owe, summed up in the "royal law" (Leviticus 19:18; James 2:8). For Paul, love of neighbor is the direct overflow of our experience of God's love poured into our hearts. This gift is now to be poured into the lives of those around us. Since the gift we have been given by God cannot be directly repaid, we direct the repayment to others. As we become channels of grace, we discover that we are fulfilling God's law by loving others as God does.

Matthew 18:15-20 Today's reading speaks of discipline within the community of disciples, who are the Church. The responsibility of seeking out the erring member, based on Old Testament precedent, was an early part of the Christian community's behavior. If the member refuses to respond, even to the pleas of the assembled congregation, he is to be treated as "a Gentile and a tax

collector" (v. 17), that is, by inviting him to enter the community through faith. Jesus models this treatment in his ministry by eating with tax collectors and "sinners" (9:9-13) and praising the faith of Gentiles. The authority given to Peter in 16:19 is now given to the whole community of disciples. The words bind

and loose are technical terms for the authority of the rabbi over persons and actions—exclusion from or admission to the community, forbidding or permitting a disputed action, or retention or forgiveness of sin

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Icon of the Week

Mother Teresa of Calcutta

1910 – 1997

Mother Teresa was born in Albania and she left home at 18 to be a missionary, arriving in Calcutta in January 1929. Small of stature but rocklike in faith, she was entrusted with proclaiming God's thirsting love for humanity, especially for the poorest of the poor.

In 1946 on a train from Calcutta to Darjeeling, Mother Teresa received her "call within a call." Jesus revealed, by means of interior locutions and visions, the desire of His heart. "Come be my light ... I cannot go alone." Thus the Missionaries of Charity was established within the Archdiocese of Calcutta in 1950. By 1997, Mother Teresa's Sisters numbered nearly 4,000 and were established in 610 foundations and 123 countries. Numerous awards, beginning with the Indian Padmashri Award in 1962 and the Nobel Peace Prize in 1979, honored her work.

The whole of Mother Teresa's life and labor bore witness to the joy of loving, the greatness and dignity of every human person, the value of little things done faithfully and with love, and the surpassing worth of friendship with God. Hidden from all eyes, even those closest to her, was her interior life marked by an experience of a deep, painful, and abiding feeling of being separated from God. She called her inner experience the "painful night" of her soul. Through the darkness she mystically participated in the thirst of Jesus, in His pain and longing for love, and she shared in the interior desolation of the poor.

Her feast day is September 5.

We think sometimes that poverty is only being hungry, naked, and homeless. The poverty of being unwanted, unloved, and uncared for is the greatest poverty. —Mother Teresa
