First Lesson: Exodus 14:19-31

The angel of God who was going before the Israelite army moved and went behind them; and the pillar of cloud moved from in front of them and took its place behind them. It came between the army of Egypt and the army of Israel. And so the cloud was there with the darkness, and it lit up the night; one did not come near the other all night.

Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea. The Lord drove the sea back by a strong east wind all night, and turned the sea into dry land; and the waters were divided. The Israelites went into the sea on dry ground, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left. The Egyptians pursued, and went into the sea after them, all of Pharaoh's horses, chariots, and chariot drivers. At the morning watch the Lord in the pillar of fire and cloud looked down upon the Egyptian army, and threw the Egyptian army into panic. He clogged their chariot wheels so that they turned with difficulty. The Egyptians

said, "Let us flee from the Israelites, for the Lord is fighting for them against Egypt."

Then the Lord said to Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea, so that the water may come back upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots and chariot drivers." So Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and at dawn the sea returned to its normal depth. As the Egyptians fled before it, the Lord tossed the Egyptians into the sea. The waters returned and covered the chariots and the chariot drivers, the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed them into the sea; not one of them remained. But the Israelites walked on dry ground through the sea, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left.

Thus the Lord saved Israel that day from the Egyptians; and Israel saw the Egyptians dead on the seashore. Israel saw the great work that the Lord did against the Egyptians. So the people feared the Lord and believed in the Lord and in his servant Moses.

Second Lesson: Romans 14:1-12

Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of quarreling over opinions. Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgment on those who eat; for God has welcomed them. Who are you to pass judgment on servants of another? It is

before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand.

Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. Those who observe the day, observe it in honor of the Lord. Also those who eat, eat in honor of the Lord, since

they give thanks to God; while those who abstain, abstain in honor of the Lord and give thanks to God.

We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he

denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart."

About the Readings

Exodus 14:19-31 This reading recounts the most exciting and dramatic event in the exodus story. It also demonstrates as no other event both God's power over our world and God's care for the covenant people. Having departed from Egypt, the Hebrews joyously begin their trek to the new land. Pharaoh, however, changes his mind about letting them go and leads his army and chariots in pursuit. Pinned between the sea ahead and the Egyptian chariots behind, the Hebrews cry to God for help. God comes to their aid first by sending a cloud to hide them and then by empowering Moses to part the waters of the sea. The Hebrews are "saved" by passing on dry ground through the wall of waters. When the Egyptian army follows, they bog down in the mud and, when the waters return to normal, are all drowned.

Psalms 114 This hymn of praise recalls God's care for the people on their exodus journey through the wilderness to the promised land. Extraordinary events illustrate God's power over nature, in particular over sea and river, and signify God's presence in their midst.

Romans 14:1-12 Today's reading is from a longer section (14:1-15:13) dealing with those who maintain various practices

(such as abstinence from certain foods and the observance of special days) and those who do not. Paul's counsel centers around the motive for the behavior. Life and death are equally subject to Christ's Lordship. By his death, resurrection and complete obedience, Jesus is Lord over all. As Lord, he deserves our service and worship. The choice to eat or to abstain, as every choice, must be made in light of Christ. Christ alone will judge the person's acts and intentions.

Matthew 18:21-35 Today's gospel reading concludes the discourse on discipline in the Church. Matthew presents the material as Jesus' response to a question by Peter. The servant's debt is huge. His promise of repayment is impossible to fulfill, thereby representing humankind's position before God. God's response to limitless debt is limitless forgiveness. The scene is repeated between the slave and his fellow slave, except that the debt is small and repayment feasible. But the wicked slave's response is totally different. The master's question (v. 33) is also posed to the Christian community.



Icon of the Week

St. Hildegard of Bingen

1098–1179

St. Hildegard was the tenth child of a noble German family. She was promised to the church and raised from the time she was eight years old in a hermitage that later became a Benedictine monastery.

From childhood she had mystical visions, which she kept to herself until her teen years. Her writings speak of the divine feminine and the dignity of women. She believed that every woman who gave birth helped clothe God with humanity. She composed music for her nuns to sing and spoke of Christ as God's song. She taught that music recreated the original harmony that once existed between God and humankind, and that the human soul was a musical instrument on which God played music.

She carried out four preaching missions in northern Europe, an unprecedented activity for a woman. She practiced medicine, focusing on women's needs; published treatises on natural science and philosophy; wrote a liturgical drama, *The Play of the Virtues*, in which personified virtues sing their parts and the devil, condemned to live without music, can only speak. For Hildegard, music was essential to worship. Her liturgical compositions, unusual in structure and tonality, were described by contemporaries as "chant of surpassing sweet melody" and "strange and unheard-of music."

Her feast day is September 17.

God of all times and seasons: Give us grace that we, after the example of your servant Hildegard, may both know and make known the joy and jubilation of being part of your creation, and show forth your glory not only with our lips but in our lives; through Jesus Christ our Savior, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Website Donation Page Changes

You will soon notice some changes to our website as we continue to integrate Realm with our systems. Some of the new changes on the website will be seen on the following pages:

- **The home page:** The blue "donate" button on our webpage currently takes

you to a Vanco site to donate. Soon it will take you directly into our Realm system. There you can directly pay your pledge or make a donation for any of our ministries (flowers, discretionary, St. Stephen's etc.). The new interface will be easier to navigate and you can easily set up recurring donations either directly from your bank account or on a credit card. Non-parishioners will also be able to donate through this site without being given access to our directory.

- **Give/2024 Stewardship:** Under the updated Stewardship page, you will see a link to pledge to St. Andrew's for the upcoming 2024 campaign. After signing in, the link will take you directly to your personal account where you can pledge directly. From your account you will be able to see how much you have pledged, your balance, and print out a statement of your donations. This will need a Realm login.

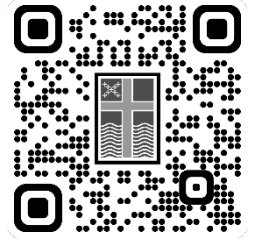
