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## **Staff Reports**

## Report of the Rector



AS I LOOK BACK OVER 2016 I have a sense of the Holy Spirit being at work at St. Andrew's, leading us into a new chapter in the life of our parish. Over the last few months, parishioners have been commenting to me about a sense of vital-

ity and excitement in the parish. They have talked about the new programs we have been doing such as Adult Christian Learning and the Turkey Trot. Longstanding parishioners have mentioned that every Sunday there seem to be new faces in the congregation. And certainly, since the beginning of the new program year in September, we have had new people coming to visit St. Andrew's on Sunday in numbers that I have not seen since I arrived in 2013. Forty-five adults and children have joined the parish since September and each Sunday we have others who are "checking us out."

Behind this sense of enthusiasm experienced Behind this sense of enthusiasm experienced by existing parishioners and the attraction of new parishioners, lies the hard work and faithfulness, by lay people and clergy alike, which are recorded in the pages of this annual report. I also believe the energy at St. Andrew's is reflective of a desire and commitment by our parish to be open to how the Holy Spirit is leading us to proclaim afresh the Gospel in our particular context. This openness to grow in our faith and to share Christ's love has been made evident in several important ways. The first is the parish's continued commitment to support the new clergy team. 2016 was the first full year of ministry at St. Andrew's of Margaret Schwarzer, the associate rector for adult formation and membership, and Cat Healy, the assistant rector for youth and family. Both Margaret and Cat have brought new ideas, energy, and programs to the parish. Margaret's new ideas for adult formation, including Taizé style services, outside speakers, the women's retreat and, of course, the Turkey Trot, have all been greeted with

enthusiasm. The church school and young people's programs for which Cat is responsible have been key factors in attracting some of our new families to the parish. And very importantly, both Margaret and Cat have developed many pastoral relationships, which have helped strengthen the sense of connectedness in our parish family.

The second strong indication of the parish's openness to discern how the Holy Spirit is leading us into the next chapter of our life has been the development of the strategic plan by the vestry over the last year. The priority of the plan is to continue to deepen the faith of our existing members and to attract new members to the church. There have been a number of inputs into the development of the strategic plan, which will be used to guide the parish for the next five years. These include the results of the parish survey undertaken at the end of 2015, the collective wisdom and experience of the vestry and clergy, the results of a widespread national survey undertaken by the Episcopal Church, and the vision statement developed by the vestry at the beginning of the planning process. It was interesting to see that the priorities of the vestry's vision for the parish were matched by the priorities identified by the wider congregation in the parish survey. The vision statement is as follows:

Our vision is to grow our parish in breadth and depth by strengthening our worship, community and ministries. Our hope is to deepen the faith of existing members and attract new people to our parish so that they can experience Christ's love. We wish to help people recognize their God given talents and use them to serve God and their neighbor.

Although the scope of the plan is to help guide the parish over the next five years, the very development of the plan has already begun to result in new initiatives to strengthen the parish. To name but a few, these include: a new welcome booklet and a shepherding program for newcomers, organized by the membership committee; the introduction of a monthly informal service on Sundays at 5pm, which will begin in February; a new "faith and practice" series focusing on bringing faith into our daily lives, organized by the adult formation committee; a new vestry position to represent the church school, which is such an important part of our church life; and a new music committee to further enhance our outstanding music program.

Finally, I would like to thank our wardens, Lynda Sperry and Michael Vanin, with whom I have had the privilege of working over the last year. I feel we have been very blessed to have two such talented and hard-working wardens who truly love this parish. In particular, I would like to thank Lynda, who completes her term as warden at the annual meeting, for her dedication and hard work over the last three years. All of us who have worked with Lynda will know that her enthusiasm, follow-through, hard work, and attention to the important details are second to none! Over the last three years, as well as working on a range of very visible ministries, she has worked tirelessly behind the scenes on important matters, such as our relationships with organizations who rent space at

the church, and on personnel, financial, and database issues. Lynda's leadership has been a great blessing to St. Andrew's. I would also like to thank the members of the vestry, who serve as the heads of our different ministries, for their commitment and leadership during the past year, and especially those vestry members who are completing their terms: Will Nystrom (Christian learning), Herb Manning (stewardship), and Matt King (property).

As we look forward to the year ahead I believe that we are richly blessed by God in our lay leadership and the widespread involvement of so many of you in the life of the parish. I feel a sense of hope and excitement as we continue our spiritual journey together into a deeper relationship with God and our neighbor.

# Report of the Associate Rector for Adult Formation and Membership

IN 2016, WE HAVE EXPANDED participation in our traditional education classes while adding new programs, retreats, liturgies, and field trips. In particular, we have created opportunities to deepen the daily practice of our Christian faith

and Christian values, while we have travelled outside of St. Andrew's for events that have increased our capacity to be thoughtful and engaged 21st century Christians.

#### **Adult Christian Learning**

With our monthly Bible Circles, and Adrian's leadership of our monthly Men's Bible Study, we now have an average of 35 parishioners studying scrip-

ture monthly. Our 9am Christian Learning series, which meets approximately 28 times per year, has also increased in the number and diversity of its members. Classes average 20 members per class, and we've had over 70 people attend a Christian Learning class this year. Weekly Lenten dinners and programs are going strong with an average participation of 40 parishioners each week, and our three Taizé-style Services had an average attendance of 45 people each. Our second Blue Christmas Service, with an attendance of 18, was solemn and meaningful.

#### **New Adult Formation Opportunities**

Since January 2016, our adult learning and formation committee has been noticing a growing spiritual hunger in our parish. Parishioners told us they

wanted to engage their faith not only in intellectual ways, but also in daily, practical ways. In our new "Faith and Practice Series", we gather after the 10am service to engage each other in conversation, reflection, and spiritual exercises. Our first two offerings, "Engaging the Lord's Prayer More Deeply" and "How to Visit a Sick Friend" had more than 25 people each. Three more offerings are planned in February, March, and April. In the fall, 61 of us also began Advent by participating in the Wellesley Turkey Trot. Team St. Andrew's raised money for charity, inspired each other to go the distance, and won a prize for the largest team (!). Our April Women's Retreat, and our November "Beyond Words" field trip to Boston College's newly opened McMullen Museum were also well subscribed, collectively bringing 50 people together for retreat or reflection.

#### **Adult Learning and Formation Committee**

Our adult learning and formation committee and I shape the mission of Christian education for adults at St. Andrew's. I am thankful for the service and creativity of all our members who served in 2016: Jennifer Bonniwell, Charlie Curtis, Margarethe Kulke, Ansley Martin, Shannon Monaghan, Will Nystrom, Bob Prensner, Paul Shellito, Laura Stettner, and Michael Vanin. Special thanks go to Margarethe Kulke, who co-leads our Bible Circles, and to our outgoing chair, Will Nystrom. Will's enthusiasm for trying new models of ministry has made 2016 dynamic and vigorous. This year, our vestry approved the addition of a vestry position dedicated to adult education, and our nominating committee has asked Peter Fergusson to fill this position; I look forward to serving with him. Finally, I want to thank our rector, Adrian Robbins-Cole for his ongoing strong support of adult Christian learning. It is wonderful to be a part of his clergy team at St. Andrew's.

#### Wellesley College Ministry

In 2016, our Wellesley College ministry benefitted from a diocesan grant we secured with the Reverend Sarah Robbins-Cole, Chaplain of the Protestant Ministry at Wellesley College. This \$4,150 grant has enabled us to offer a day-long student retreat in the fall and a student mental health training scheduled for February 2017, along with material support for a strong recruitment and welcome to new and returning students. Wellesley women continue to teach in church school, sing in our adult choir, and read at our services. This year's 20 active members receive a weekly blurb from Catherine Healy and me, and we have met students for coffee and conversations, bible study, brunches, prayer, and cookie-making. This year, we are sponsoring a Wellesley student, Anna Page, for ordination, a 2016 graduate was baptized, and a current student was confirmed. Our ministry with and to Wellesley women is going strong.

#### **Membership Committee**

It has been a pleasure to work with Becky Hamlin, chair, and the other members of our membership committee this year. Becky Hamlin's enthusiasm for hospitality has added many new elements to membership work, including an excellent updated "Welcome Booklet", a new shepherding program, and a party (at the Rectory) for newcomers who became active members in 2013 and 2014. Please see Becky's report for more details. I'm thankful to be the clergy liaison for this committee. My main responsibilities lie in contacting newcomers by e-mail or phone, so that they have both a lay and a clergy welcome, and meeting newcomers who have questions. Our chair and I both keep track of the seekers, newcomers, and newly matriculated active members, helping to be sure that everyone is welcomed and that everyone finds a place at St. Andrew's.

## Report of the Assistant Rector for Youth and Family

DEAR ST. ANDREW'S PARISH FAMILY,



This has been a thrilling year for children's and youth ministries at St. Andrew's. I offer my report with gratitude for the amazing work that the Holy Spirit is doing in this place, and with particular

The Rev. Catherine (Cat) Healy thanks for the staff and volunteers who give so much of their time to our youngest parishioners.

Our church school continues to thrive, and remains instrumental in attracting new families to the parish. We are blessed with a diverse crew of 36 church school teachers and youth leaders, including middle- and high-school students, Wellesley College students, young adults, parents, and grandparents. We continue to use the *Weaving God's Promises* curriculum for grades K-5 and the Rite-13 curriculum for grades 6-7, with great success. The church school was also active in outreach in 2016, raising funds for Heifer International during Lent and collecting books for the Blackstone Innovation School library, which is run by volunteers from our sister parish of St. Stephen's in Boston, during Advent.

Children's music ministries at St. Andrew's are also growing and thriving, led by children's music director Amanda Kern. During church school on Sunday mornings, Amanda leads music time for Kids' Place (toddlers and preschoolers), Sing & Play for grades K-2, and JAM for grades 3-5. The junior choir for grades 1-8 has contributed beautiful musical offerings in worship throughout the year, most notably a number from Godspell in May (which they also performed at the Grace Knight Babson showcase) and Rodney, the Church Mouse, a new operetta composed by parishioner Liz Dean, in November. The 2016 Christmas pageant was also a great success. Special thanks are due to Debbie Alexander, Holly Boland, Judith Boland, Liz Dean, and Katherine Roer for all their work on pageant preparation.

Our Rite-13 program for youth in grades 6 and 7 is ably led this year by Wendy Barry, John Breedis, Ingrid Houghton, and Ansley Martin. Rite-13 is enjoying a raucous and joyful year, with highlights including a fall lock-in and a gathering to make apple pies for the Wellesley Food Pantry just before Thanksgiving. Please thank Wendy, John, Ingrid, and Ansley for their faithful, good-humored leadership.

In 2016, St. Andrew's celebrated the confirmations of eleven youth and one adult, as well as the reception into the Episcopal Church of two adults who had been previously confirmed in other Christian traditions. There are 22 eighth-graders enrolled in confirmation preparation this fall, and teaching them is one of the highlights of my role in Christian formation at St. Andrew's. We are looking forward to our spring retreat at the Barbara C. Harris Camp & Conference Center in New Hampshire this spring, and to our confirmation service on October 7, 2017 (location to be announced). I am especially grateful to Anna Page and Emma Carter-LaMarche, the assistant teachers for the confirmation class, and to all the parents who have served as chaperones for our class meetings.

Our high-school youth group, co-led by Marie Dunell and me, continues to meet biweekly for food, fellowship, and conversations about faith. Highlights of this past fall included an overnight tent camping trip, laser tag, and ice skating at Boston Common Frog Pond. The youth of St. Andrew's are active in worship, with 24 youth participating in our acolyte ministry under the capable leadership of Jennifer Olivetti. They are also engaged in both inreach and outreach. In service to the parish, they volunteer their time to assist with church school, Bargain Haul, the Christmas pageant, and the Little Angels' Gift Shop; in service to others outside the parish, they have given their youth group meeting time to write letters to children at El Hogar (the school and orphanage in Honduras sponsored by St. Andrew's) and cook meals for the Wellesley Food Pantry. We look forward to organizing a youth mission trip for spring or summer 2018.

The church school committee shapes the mission of Christian learning for children and youth at St. Andrew's, and to provide many fellowship opportunities for families with children, including an All Hallows' Eve service and potluck in October, Family Cookies & Carols in December, and all-ages events during Holy Week. Susan and I are thankful for the service of all the committee members who participated in 2016: Debbie Alexander, Jennifer Bonniwell, Karin Breedis, Megan Burns, Ingrid Houghton, Jennifer Martin, Karen McAdams, Karen Pekowitz, and Heather Schaefer. We were also thrilled when the St. Andrew's vestry approved the addition of a vestry position specific to children and youth. The nominating committee has asked Jennifer Martin to run for this open position in 2017. We are grateful to Will Nystrom, our

current vestry member for Christian learning, and the Rev. Adrian Robbins-Cole, our rector, for their ongoing support of Christian formation for all ages.

Finally, I would like to offer abundant thanks for the ministries of staff members Susan Jackson and Amanda Kern, whose organization, good humor, and skill ensure that the Christian learning community at St. Andrew's remains an innovative, organized, and joyful place. Thank you, Susan and Amanda!

## Report of the Music Minister

IN JUNE OF 2017 I will complete my tenth year as music minister at St. Andrew's.

The senior choir at St. Andrew's has 28 members, including our five paid section leaders, who are either presently students or are recent

graduates of music conservatories. In June, our tenor section leader, Michael Sansoni, left and we hired Ryan Brock who is a graduate of Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh. We also replaced our bass section leader, Joshua Scheid, with Will Hurwitz who is a senior at The Boston Conservatory. We have three Wellesley College students in our choir this year: Katie Hodges, Alice Palmer and, on a limited basis, Demilade Adeboye. We welcomed congregation member Al Dubé, into the tenor section last spring. As usual, we add to our numbers on special occasions with extra singers from our congregation and professionals whom I hire. The section leaders are essential to maintain the quality of our program as many of our congregation

members travel for work or pleasure, or have family commitments, and therefore can only sing on a limited basis.

Instead of our usual Lenten Choral Evensong we sang for Catherine Healy's Ordination on February 27. Leonardo Ciampa was our guest organist.

During Holy Week the senior choir sang on Maundy Thursday, the Saturday Vigil, and two services on Easter Sunday at 9 and 11. We sang Randall Thompson's *Alleluia* and *This joyful Eastertide* harmonized by Charles Wood. The junior choir joined us at the 9am service. We welcomed a brass quartet on Easter Sunday led by James Mosher and sang G.F. Handel's "Alleluia Chorus" from *Messiah*.

The Wellesley College Choir sang at our 10am service on April 17th. Joey Sullivan led our Rogation Day Procession in May on the celtic drum, joined by Liz Alexander on fiddle. The last Sunday for the senior choir was June 5.

The senior choir began rehearsal, as usual, September 8, the Thursday after Labor Day. Our first Sunday, was September. 11. Iain Massie played the pipes for us on St. Andrew's Day. Liz Dean, a member of our senior choir, composed an operetta for tenor, soprano, and junior choir, called *Rodney*, *the Church Mouse*, which was performed during the 10am service.

Our ninth annual service of Advent Lessons and Carols took place on Sunday, December 11. We had 30 singers in our choir that evening. Thomas Handel was our guest organist.

The junior choir, once again, sang at our 5pm service on Christmas Eve joined by an intergenerational choir and our section leaders led by our junior choir director, Amanda Kern. The senior choir, with 26 members, sang at the 10pm Christmas Eve service with music by Bob Chilcott and Harold Darke. A string quartet, led by violist Harold Lieberman, played preludes and postludes and accompanied hymns and our communion anthem.

Jonathan Ambrosino tunes and maintains our organ regularly, as does Tony McKenna our three pianos.

Our junior choir director, Amanda Kern, continues to be an invaluable asset to this congregation becoming more involved with the church school and directing the junior choir. Not only is she beloved by the children she most ably directs, but she also willingly lent her beautiful soprano voice to the senior choir on many occasions.

## Wardens' Report

AS ST. ANDREW'S approaches its 125th anniversary, we are happy to report that our parish is as strong as ever. This is clearly evidenced by the participation in our myriad of program offerings, Sunday attendance, and growth of adult

and youth ministries as well as the vibrancy of fellowship, outreach, and the all-important stewardship support.

In past annual reports, the warden's letter included a glimpse of our plan to grow our church by offering a range of services that attract and retain parishioners and by nurturing future generations in the faith. Subsequent to setting that plan, the vestry attended several full day workshops/retreats where we refined our mission and values. This eventually led to conducting a parish-wide survey in 2015 and initiated the strategic planning process in 2016.

What we heard from parishioners in the survey was an affirmation of the aspects of worship that are most important, how to better serve our greater community, and to solicit ways to improve our overall experience at St. Andrew's.

## The objectives of the strategic planning process were:

- To identify strengths, weaknesses, and opportunities in the parish
- To set out a strategic vision to provide guidance to the staff and ministries of the parish for the next five years

## The strategic plan drew on a range of inputs and activities:

- The parish survey with over 270 responses
- Vestry retreats held in February 2015 and March 2016
- The development of a clearer mission, vision, and values statements for the parish
- Substantial vestry and ministry input and feedback throughout the period
- The input of the new clergy team
- The recent diocesan strategic plan and national Episcopal church survey

The parish survey was used as a tool for discussion by the vestry and clergy which identified these priorities as the highest ones for St. Andrews:

- Attracting and welcoming new members
- Maintaining existing clergy and staff levels
- Retaining and engaging the empty nester community

- Improving programs for teenagers
- Providing more meaningful adult formation opportunities
- Adding an informal 5pm worship service
- Providing a greater variety of fellowship events
- Providing more engaging outreach opportunities

## The carry forward from the survey are these tent poles on which our strategy rests:

- Our Mission What we do
  We are an Episcopal church that celebrates and shares the transforming love of Christ.
- Our Vision What guides us
   Our vision is to grow our parish in breadth and depth by strengthening our worship, community, and ministries. Our hope is to deepen the faith of existing members, and attract new people to our parish so that they can experience Christ's love. We wish to help people recognize their God-given talents and use them to serve God and their neighbor.

In addition to the results of the survey and how those results have worked themselves into our 2017-2022 Strategic Plan, I offer the following evidence that St. Andrew's is thriving:

- 1. Attendance
- Total 2016 Sunday attendance was a robust 12,241 which translates to an average of 235 per Sunday
- Easter services saw just shy of 800
- Christmas services participation was very healthy with over 1100 in attendance:
  - □ 3pm children's service (250)
  - □ The adult services showed an increase of 20% over 2015: 5pm (650) and 10pm (250)
- Alternate 2016 services:
  - □ Taizé-style (about 100 participants)
  - □ Blue Christmas (25 participants)
  - These alternate services are not only growing in attendance, they are beginning to work themselves into the fabric of the St. Andrew's worship experience. They are now expected and revered.
- 2. *Membership* Under Becky Hamlin's able leadership, we have seen a marked increase in new and active "members" (34 new families in 2016).

3. Stewardship/Legacy Herb Manning stepped in to spearhead the 2017 campaign. The committee set the goal of raising \$900K which seemed to be an easy one to attain given the 2016 pledge total of \$860K until the realization that about \$100K was lost to moves and deaths of generous parishioners. As of the writing of this report, we are happy to report that 95% of the \$900K has been raised and we are past 90% of the 300-family pledge goal. The ability to make pledges and/or gifts online is now thoroughly ingrained into our culture.

Legacy Society contributions received in 2016 include two large gifts: \$75,000 from the estate of Margaret and Charles Fager and a \$200,000 bequest from the estate of Norman Dorian.

4. *Church School* St. Andrew's educational programs for our younger parishioners remain very healthy and as a sign of the importance of youth programs and church school educational programs, a new vestry position was formed, and approved by the vestry. This will add continuity and leadership while focusing on attracting new families while retaining our commitment to the Christ's teachings of our youth.

The total population in 2016 was 170 broken down in the following categories: Nursery @ 21, Elementary @ 91, and Rite-13 @ 58.

- 5. *Youth* We see an increasing number of participants in youth programs.
- Youth group boasts 23 participants
- Acolytes (grades 8-12) has 24 students enrolled
- Confirmation prep has 22 students enrolled
- 14 Wellesley College students participate in a variety of ministries, including choir members, lectors, lay Eucharistic ministers, church school teachers, and confirmation leaders
- 6. Adult Education
- **Bible Study** An average of 35 parishioners a month engaging in these programs (more than double those who participated in 2015)
  - □ *Bible Circles* Tuesday morning and Wednesday evening attendance averages around 20 parishioners
  - ☐ *Christian Learning Series* 9am Christian Learning averages 20 people per class

- ☐ *Men's Bible Study Group* Our men's Bible Study began this fall and continues to meet on the first Saturday of each month at 8am with an average of 16 in attendance.
- **Faith and Practice** This new and well received program has seen an average of 25 parishioners in 2016

#### • Other programs of note

- □ 30 parishioners attended the field trip to the Boston College Museum exhibit *Beyond Words*
- ☐ The visit to Temple Beth Elohim, scheduled for January 20, 2017, quickly reached capacity of 30 parishioners.

#### 7. Financial Management

- With Alan Joachim as head of finance, Arnout Eikeboom as treasurer and cast of seasoned and new members on finance committee, St. Andrew's finds itself in a very healthy situation. Fiscal year 2016 concluded with revenues being slightly ahead of plan while expenses were managed conservatively.
- Kevin McClintock who manages the St. Andrew's endowments funds (year-end balance of \$3.3 million), boasted a total return of 7.04% for 2016 (ahead of benchmarks).

#### 8. Music

- The St. Andrew's choir maintains its high standards with 28 participants involved in 2016.
- For the second year in a row, the 5pm Christmas
   Eve service invited non-choir participation into the intergenerational choir

#### 9. Buildings and Maintenance

- St. Andrew's was fortunate not to have a reoccurrence of the 100+ inches of snow that fell in 2015.
   However, many of the repairs arising from 2015 storm damage were deferred to 2016 mostly due to contractor's demand and scheduling issues.
- 10. *Outreach* The focus of this ministry is to coordinate the mission work taking place outside the church, putting Christian faith into action. The focus for 2016 was to commit support with two additional directives:
- Committing substantial financial resources at the local, urban, and international levels

- Supporting missions where parishioners can actively participate evidenced by the overwhelming generosity of our lenten campaign to support for El Hogar. We donated over \$14,000 to that program.

   St. Andrew's was the largest group to participate in this worthy cause
- Advent wreath making was followed by a pot luck supper (the first of four over the course of the calendar year)
- Reading Mavens' Book Club (*first Monday of each month at 7pm.*)
- Men's Book Club celebrated its eighth season (*first Wednesday of the month at 7:30pm.*)
- 12. *Communications* In 2016, we continued our migration to delivering more content electronically. Examples are
  - □ e-Pistle
  - ☐ The St. Andrew's website refreshed and redesigned, will debut in early February, 2017, making it easier for parishioners to find past sermons, a parishioner directory, past issues of The Call, ways to give of time and talent, and much more
  - ☐ St. Andrew's Facebook is more active and includes an ever-increasing amount of content activity
- However, St. Andrew's has not given up all printed material:

- The Call is transitioned to be an informational magazine featuring stories of interest and notable profiles
- Parish directory: This is the first update since 2012. Parishioners can access directory information from the St. Andrew's website

AS 2016 DRAWS TO A CLOSE, our St. Andrew's church family has been blessed with many new families attending our services each Sunday. We have welcomed over 34 new families who wish to receive regular communications from our parish. Many have become actively involved in church school, church committees, and other church activities. I encourage you to look around each Sunday and make a point of introducing yourself to some of the many new faces sitting among you.

The membership committee has continued to find "Welcome Greeters" for each Sunday before the 10am worship service. If you get a call to "Welcome Greet" I hope you will say "Yes"! It is a fun way to see familiar faces and welcome everyone to worship.

Committee members also serve as "Exit Greeters" to meet and talk with visitors in the narthex after the 10am service. I am sure you recognize us with our big "Welcome" buttons and clip board. Please be sure to help us meet and greet new friends and families by introducing them to us as you leave church. We will be ready with a packet of materials about St. Andrew's and what we offer throughout the year.

Our committee also organized "Newcomer Brunches" in the spring and in the fall to help welcome all the newcomers who have requested information about our parish. The brunch is a great way to provide them the chance to get to know our clergy, vestry, and membership committee members.

In 2016 we started a "shepherd" program to match newcomers with current parishioners, who act as an ongoing resource and connection to our parish. ## Report of the Vestryperson for Outreach

2016 BEGAN WITH RENEWED SPIRIT and focused energy. The clergy and vestry heard from our membership in a parish wide survey what was important to them at St. Andrew's. The outreach committee and newly formed steering committee initiated some new short and long term planning goals based on survey feedback. Outreach at St. Andrew's is rich in its commitment and leadership, here are some examples of *our congregation securing the well being of others* (Timothy 6:19):

Outreach approached 2016 with goals of being more accessible and integrated within the entire life of the church. During Lent the outreach committee, led by Steve Taylor and Mary Scanlon, organized the "St. Andrew's Lenten 'Friend A Child' Program." Our clergy encouraged parishioners to take on spiritual discipline, such as prayer, reading the Bible, and almsgiving, to deepen our faith. St. Andrew's families and individuals were invited to support our outreach partner El Hogar in Honduras and its 107 elementary students who have been abandoned or are desperately poor. The "Friend A Child" program for El Hogar was the most financially successful individual project that has been held on the organization's behalf in North America. Our congregation's generous Lenten collection culminated in Rev. Matthew Engleby's

visit as guest preacher on June 12, 2016. The Rev. Adrian Robbins-Cole, Michael Vanin, warden and outreach committee members presented Engleby, the Executive Director of El Hogar, a check for \$14,073.54 during his visit.

As the year progressed, the outreach committee and its many volunteers continued to support El Hogar as well as other important long-standing local/Metrowest and urban/Boston ministry commitments. Our urban partner St. Stephen's has ongoing volunteer opportunities. Volunteer requests for youth, families, and seniors are reported monthly in the partner newsletter B-Connected. For many years, Jack and Jill Whiting, long-standing outreach committee members, have coordinated shopping for holiday meals and Christmas gift boxes, which include baked goods from parishioners. Once again this year, several volunteers assisted the Whitings transporting 70 bags of turkeys and groceries to St. Stephen's, so that others could have a healthy holiday meal, and delivered the Christmas gift boxes in early December. These included knitted items organized by Donna Kell and our enthusiastic, hardworking St. Andrew's knitters. The "Holiday Dinner and B-SAFE Program" donations amounted to approximately \$5,000 in 2016. This seasonal collection also provides St. Andrew's

with funding to support B-SAFE, the Bishop's summer enrichment program for 120 children ages five to 15, each summer. For one week (July 11-15) over 50 volunteers, led by Cam McCormick and Karen Pekowitz, shopped, cooked, and transported lunch to students and staff at St. Stephen's and on Friday provided buses for a fun-filled field trip to Cochituate State Park. Our own Men's Book Group prepared a delicious field trip lunch that wrapped up another successful B-SAFE week.

Locally, in the Metrowest area St. Andrew's participates in several on-going ministries. This fall, through "Thanksgiving Faith in Action," parishioners generously put their faith into action by supporting two of the parish's major outreach partners who help local people in need: the Wellesley Food Pantry and Health Care Without Walls. During the month of November over 20 bags of groceries and housekeeping items were collected for the Wellesley Food Pantry and delivered by our members. In addition, St. Andrew's volunteers did a detailed cleaning of the Wellesley Food Pantry during our inreach and outreach service weekend, in preparation for the annual Scout food drive. Health Care Without Walls has been part of St. Andrew's outreach focus for many years, particularly due to the leadership and commitment to this relationship by parishioner Donna Kell. This organization provides free medical care in Boston, laboratory tests, prenatal care, and over-the-counter medications to women, children and families and assists patients in navigating the health care system in Boston. St. Andrew's has long supported Health Care Without Walls through the "Sox Box" and knitting ministry. Many, many white socks were collected during "Thanksgiving in Action"—essential items to the homeless and individuals with diabetes.

During Advent, our outreach parish efforts turn towards the Alternative Gift Fair organized by Ann Johnson. This annual event offers parishioners the opportunity to buy holiday "gifts" in the form of

contributions to selected charitable organizations that include our outreach partners and additional organizations that focus on a wide variety of needs. During the month of December, the Mitten Tree is in the parish hall and a "warm coat" drive continues through early January.

Other vital St. Andrew's outreach ministries include: Family Promise Metrowest and the Salvation Army "Miracle Kitchen." Every fourth Tuesday of the month, volunteers coordinated by Bettina Eikeboom serve and/or make dinner for the needy in Framingham. During the upcoming Lenten season, outreach committee members and volunteers led by Caren Parker and Heidi Harper will coordinate raising the awareness and support of Family Promise Metrowest. FPM is a growing vibrant organization with strong partner ties in surrounding communities that help provide transitional shelter to homeless families and "support ongoing needs of adults while working toward independent living."

Our own Rev. Margaret Schwarzer closed a sermon this past fall with these words that I believe capture the spirit of outreach at St. Andrew's:

May each of us be brave enough and faithful enough to recognize that our own well-being depends upon our ability to help secure the well being of others. May each of us be brave enough to take hold of the *life that really is life.* (Timothy 6:19)

In 2016, our St. Andrew's community with its "boots on the ground" approach to outreach remained committed to their generosity of faith, time, talent, and treasure. Our congregation, through their actions, showed time and time again that our own well being does depend upon our ability to help secure the well being of others. Thank you to our parishioners for your volunteer spirit and the love that supported our individual outreach efforts all year long.

## Report of the Vestryperson for Personnel

IT IS THE MISSION of the St. Andrew's Parish Personnel Committee to support the clergy, wardens, and vestry concerning all aspects of the employment relationship with parish staff, both paid and volunteer, including compensation, benefits, job descriptions and other features of their work with the parish. This support includes assistance with such issues as routine work performance reviews. The committee also regularly reviews the parish budget for personnel, including scrutinizing of costs for compensation, health and other insurance, and other benefits. The committee also advises concerning compliance by parish volunteers with requirements for background checks for working with children and young people.

Following a busy year in 2015 with the hiring of two new clergy, the committee's work in the past year was closer to the norm, with reviews of some job descriptions, preparation of employment memoranda for all staff, and review of the personnel budget prior to its adoption by the wardens and vestry. The committee also provided advice as requested; and continued its work on updating of the parish Personnel Handbook.

This year was also an occasion for reviewing the committee's role as part of the parish survey, which was completed in the middle of the year. The com-

mittee chair also supported the wardens in conducting a job performance review for our rector, the Rev. Adrian Robbins-Cole.

For the upcoming year, the committee is considering updating its designation to bring it into greater consistency with personnel practice in the broader employment world by a name conversion to become the Human Resources Committee. The committee also expects to continue work on updating job descriptions as needed, including for vestry members.

Pat MacKinnon, after many years of tireless service, has retired from the committee, and we thank her for her dedicated service. We are grateful for Pat's wisdom and depth of familiarity with the parish and all phases of its operation. We are now hoping to identify one or more new candidates to join us for the coming years. In particular, parishioners with experience in the human resources field who would like to expand their service to St. Andrew's are encouraged to speak with the chair about serving.

## Report of the Vestryperson for Stewardship

WE KICKED OFF our annual stewardship campaign for 2017 in October with the theme of "Strengthening our Spiritual Home," reflecting our desire to secure and continue the strong progress we've made the past two years at St. Andrew's. In this time we restored the third clergy position, and we welcomed Margaret and Cat to our clergy team. We have been blessed with the new energy and ideas they each bring to our parish and our missions, in particular adult education and formation, and youth programs.

The approach for 2017 continued and built upon the two prior campaigns, "Great Expectations" for 2015 and "Moving Forward Together" for 2016. Through our annual stewardship mailing, emails, and oral and written testimonials, we sought to both educate parishioners about the importance of our role as stewards, and to inspire generous support for our parish and our missions. Moving oral testimonials during Sunday services were given by parishioners Margarethe Kulke, Jeff McAdams, and George Stathis, along with remarks and encouragement from Adrian, Warden Michael Vanin, and me.

As in prior years, we focused on three key messages:

1. Please pledge

- 2. Please pledge more
- 3. Please pledge on time

The final tally for our previous campaign, for 2016, is 294 pledges totaling \$868,118. To account for modest inflation and to build upon our progress, our goals for 2017 are to obtain at least 300 pledges from families and individuals, for at least \$900,000. As of January 9, 2017 we are approaching these goals with 276 pledges for \$881,415. As pledges are still being received for 2017, we are hopeful that our goals will be met.

I want to thank every member of the St Andrew's community who contributes time, talent, and resources every year to make our parish the vibrant, warm place it is today. I would also like to thank the other members of the stewardship committee, who played such an important role in making our campaign so successful: Connie Barnes, Dan Dent, Allen Jones, Ann Johnson, Jeff McAdams, Anne Prensner, George Stathis, and our wardens Lynda Sperry and Michael Vanin. I would also like to extend a special thanks to the Rev. Adrian Robbins-Cole and Ruth Hubert and Arnout Eikeboom of the Treasurer's office for their collective efforts, counsel, and leadership.

## Report of the Vestryperson for Worship

THE ST. ANDREW'S WORSHIP COMMITTEE supports and advises our clergy in the coordination and planning of worship experiences. The committee which is comprises ministry heads—including leaders of altar and flower guilds, music, Lay Eucharistic ministers, acolytes, and ushers—meets quarterly with Adrian, Margaret, and Cat to organize upcoming church services. We also make time to discuss parish feedback after Holy Week and Christmas. We note even small details, such as the need for an extra usher or chalice bearer, which

will help with smooth management of the larger crowds. In 2016, we also discussed appropriate responses to the parish survey as related to worship. In general, we try to strengthen and preserve traditions that are cherished at St. Andrews, while continuing our efforts to provide choices that support the changing needs of families. With three clergy in place, St. Andrew's has been able to offer a third communion station on Sunday mornings. This change involved coordination from the altar guild, acolytes, ushers, and chalice bearers, but it

helps move the service along in a more timely fashion. In order to increase opportunities for youth participation, a new role was created for acolytes and we now have a fifth acolyte processing in with the Gospel. Our youth joined the intergenerational choir at two services this year, singing at the Blessing of the Animals service and on Christmas Eve. The new Taizé and Blue Christmas services, well received in 2015, saw increased attendance. This year, Margaret and Cat offered "ashes to go" at the Wellesley train station on Ash Wednesday as an option for those who cannot get to church. In addition, the clergy are planning to start offering a monthly informal service on Sundays at 5pm. They have brainstormed this fall and are excited to try different formats.

In 2016, a total of 428 services were held by St. Andrews clergy, including 239 celebrations of Holy Eucharist, 159 prayer services, 13 baptisms, and 18 funerals. Total attendance for Sunday Services for 2016 was over 12,000. 1,456 people attended services over Holy Week and Easter and 1,215 came to St. Andrew's to worship on Christmas Eve or

Christmas day. Two highlights for 2016 included Cat's Ordination with Bishop Alan M. Gates on February 27 and the presentation of a children's operetta, *Rodney the Church Mouse* by Liz Dean, at the 10am worship service on November 20.

Our worship leaders are devoted, energetic, and talented people who generously give their time to St. Andrew's. They work together with our clergy to provide weekly and special services for the members of our congregation and are always looking for more volunteers to join their teams. I am grateful to all those who serve these worship ministries for their dedication and willingness to serve.

### **Altar Guild Report**

THE LITURGY BEGINS AND ENDS with the work of the altar guild. We prepare for all weekly services, as well as special services: weddings, funerals, baptisms, Christmas, Holy Week, and Easter—and also prepared the ordination of the Reverend Catherine Healy to the priesthood in 2016. The altar guild maintains the vessels, linens, and altar hangings used in our worship services.

We met six times in 2016 to review business matters, sign up for extra duties during the busy liturgical seasons of Christmas and Easter, and develop camaraderie. As is customary during our annual Ascension Day Eucharist in May, we remembered all past members who have died.

Members of the altar guild are assigned to weekly teams, with each team responsible for all services occurring within the assigned week. The heads of week are responsible for coordinating and supervising the weekly teams: Week 1, Laura Brown MacKinnon; Week 2, Liz Tecca; Week 3, Becky Hamlin; Week 4, Pam Henrikson; and Week 5, Donna Kell.

In January, Debbie Lorenz's remarkable twoyear term as director came to a close and she transitioned her responsibilities to Cynthia Scott as director and Laura Brown MacKinnon as assistant director. Dell Beggs stepped down as secretary and her post was assumed by D.D. Alexander.

Becky Hamlin stepped down in 2016 from years of serving as wedding coordinator, and her post was assumed by Linda Reineman. Debbie Lorenz served as linens coordinator and will transition her responsibilities to Jean Childs for 2017.

Margaret Blackwell served as training coordinator, assisted by Debbie Monti and Donna Kell in training new members. Having completed the training, Bonnie Akins, Blair Glennon, and Paige Manning are to be commissioned as new mem-

bers of the altar guild in January 2017, and Grace Hoffman was welcomed as a new trainee.

### Lay Eucharistic Ministry Report

THE ST. ANDREW'S TEAM of lay Eucharistic ministers is a devoted group of Eucharistic ministers and readers who enrich the liturgical experience for our parish at Sunday services, during Holy Days, and at other liturgical events, by reading Scripture, leading Psalms and Prayers of the People, and distributing wine at Communion. There are more than 450 such assignments every year, and it is a tribute to the dedication and cooperative spirit of this fine team that it is a rare event when an assignment is missed, or cannot be filled.

We currently have 32 regular members plus 13 substitutes. We are always happy to add new members, and have a continuing need to do so. Last year, for example, six members changed from regular to substitute status because of other commitments. If you are interested in serving in this rewarding ministry, please contact Anne Prensner (our coordinator for recruitment), Al Bornemann,

or any member of the clergy for more information. Our greatest need is for chalice bearers at 10am and combination reader/chalice bearer at 5pm, but volunteers for any assignments are always welcome. Training is simple and readily available on an individual basis.

The organizational changes made late in 2015 were continued successfully throughout 2016. In this regard, I would especially like to thank Adams Carroll for his handling of weekly service notices and related scheduling communications, Liz Dean for her meticulous care and maintenance of vestments, and Anne Prensner for her recruiting efforts.

Liturgical procedure changes were minimal in 2016. With the resumption of use of the transept altar for Communion at the 10am service in late 2015, some experimentation and minor changes—designed to reduce confusion around the main altar and expedite movement to the transept—were

made in 2016. These modifications affected the procedure for reception of communion by the Eucharistic ministers and were, I think, largely transparent to the congregation.


