It has been thought desirable to convey to the habitual worshippers at St. Andrew's Church a clear idea of the responsibilities which rest upon them for its support, and also to formulate a plan in which they can take a personal interest for the discharge of these responsibilities.

If an income of about \$1500 per annum can be assured to the Treasurer, there need be no anxiety about the finances.

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You are asked to communicate confidentially to the Treasurer...your intention to enroll yourself in one of these classes, agreeing

to pay either by the week, or by the month in advance, as you may elect, the sum fixed for one year, the first payment to be made on the first Sunday in January [1906] next.

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The rummage sale, held on Thursday afternoon and evening, proved as successful as usual. This sale is now regarded as a regular affair and looked forward to each year. The attendance this year included a large number of village people as well as a large number from neighboring towns.

### Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 13:1-13

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It

does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a

child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part;

then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

In the synagogue at Nazareth, Jesus read from the book of the prophet Isaiah, and began to say, “Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.” All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, “Is not this Joseph’s son?” He said to them, “Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, ‘Doctor, cure yourself!’ And you will say, ‘Do here also in your hometown the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum.’” And he said, “Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet’s hometown. But the truth is, there were many widows in Israel in the

time of Elijah, when the heaven was shut up three years and six months, and there was a severe famine over all the land; yet Elijah was sent to none of them except to a widow at Zarephath in Sidon. There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian.” When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. They got up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. But he passed through the midst of them and went on his way.

# About the Readings

**Jeremiah 1:4-10** Today's reading describes Jeremiah's call to be a prophet according to the typical pattern of the Old Testament: call, hesitation and divine affirmation. Like Moses, Isaiah and Ezekiel, Jeremiah pleads his incapacity to serve as God's prophet. He claims that he is too young but is overruled. The Lord will put the words of God in Jeremiah's mouth. Jeremiah's job is to stand firm, not to tremble before the hostility of his audience but to speak clearly the judgments of God. God makes no promises about the ease of his mission; in fact, Jeremiah is guaranteed a battle. Nevertheless God's presence is with Jeremiah, undergirding his obedience with divine strength.

**Psalms 71:1-6** This lament expresses both the vulnerability of old age and its advantage of confidence based upon long experience (vv. 5-6, 17). He cries out for vindication, mingling expressions of his plight, of supplication and of trust, and vows to give thanks for God's deliverance (vv. 22-24).

**1 Corinthians 13:1-13** Today's reading sets Paul's praise of love within the context of the meaning of spiritual gifts.

The Corinthians struggled with the value and exercise of spiritual gifts within the community. Greater honor was given to those who possessed the more extraordinary gifts (v. 27). Paul insists that no spiritual gift, no matter how powerful, is a true measure of a person's spiritual maturity. Without love, the gifts are worthless. Instead, God's unmerited love to us and from us to others (in Greek, *agape*), is the essential gift of divine life and is the necessary context that gives all the spiritual gifts value.

**Luke 4:21-30** Jesus' sermon in the synagogue at Nazareth and the public's reaction to it foreshadow the meaning of his ministry, its rejection by Israel and the mission to the Gentile world. The people apparently want Jesus to do for his hometown what he has done elsewhere, perhaps to validate Jesus' own claim (4:21). He reminds them of other occasions when God directed ministry outside the nation. The reaction of the people points back to the temptation (4:9) and forward to the crucifixion that took place outside the city.

## Choral Evensong

On **Sunday, March 3, at 5pm**, the St. Andrew’s Senior Choir will sing a Choral Evensong. Our featured work will be Benjamin Britten’s exquisite *Rejoice in the Lamb*, a staple of the choral repertoire.

Britten wrote this piece in 1943 to a poem entitled *Jubilate Agno* by the 18th century poet Christopher Smart. Boswell writes of Smart: “My poor friend Smart shewed the disturbance of his mind, by falling upon his

knees, and saying his prayers in the street, or in any other unusual place...”

Concerning this unfortunate poet, Christopher Smart, who was confined in a madhouse, another respected contemporary noted: “I did not think he ought to be shut up. His infirmities were not noxious to society. He insisted on people praying with him; and I’d as life pray with Kit Smart as any one else.”

Our organist will be Thomas Handel. We will also sing Charles Villiers Stanford’s *Magnificat* and *Nunc dimittis in G major*.
