# **History from our Archives**

It has been suggested that the services would be more seemly if the congregation would rise with the choir to sing the hymns and chants, rather than straggling up to their feet at various times during the playing of the introduction. The congregational singing as a whole is fairly good, but there has been a tendency of late to let the choir carry the whole burden. The choir is present only to lead the singing, and it would make for the increased reality of our services if the congregation would join more heartily in the singing of the chants and responses of the services. 1937

The first Men's Supper will be on Tuesday night, October 25, with Dr. Harvey Spencer in charge of the proceedings, and promises an interesting program, details of which are not forthcoming. Last year the Men's Club, priding itself on its lack of organization, voted itself out of existence, and decided to carry on without even a name. But whether or no it exists on paper, it exists actually, and

last winter proved itself valuable not only to its members but to the parish as a whole, and it deserves the interest and loyalty of a far greater number of the men of the parish. 1938

On Armistice Day, as has been our custom in the past, there will be intercessions for Peace throughout the entire day. A schedule is being drawn up by the St. Andrew's Guild so that there will be at least one person in the Church at all times. It is hoped that every member of the parish will make the effort to spend at least a few minutes in the Church on his or her knees asking God to establish the Peace of the world that has such shaky foundations at the present. 1938

The question of covering more of the kneelers in the church has been raised and one offer to start a fund for that purpose has been made. The Vestry does not feel that the church is in a position at present to finance such a project out of regular funds and is

hereby making an appeal for special gifts for that purpose. Those who have used both the covered and uncovered kneelers will realize the desirability of this appeal.

The Choir is greatly in need of a new piano for its rehearsals. If anyone has a grand piano (an upright will not do as the choirmaster must be able to see his choir while he plays) and is looking for a new home for it, the choir will be glad to provide. There is also a request for large rugs for the dining room in the Parish House in order to deaden the noise during the sessions of the Church School. 1938

School. 1938

January 1940, the parish will welcome to the Guild House a refugee family who have fled the persecution of "Der Führer" because of their religion. The family is being sponsored by the Canterbury Club of the College who beg a kindly welcome for these strangers in our midst, and ask the cooperation of us all in finding employment from them. The man will be available for odd jobs and the wife is an expert seamstress and milliner. They may be reached on the Guild House telephone. Their presence is a witness to Christian charity that can rise above unworthy suspicion and fear, and will show that to some extent we have not fallen prey to "blindness of heart; to envy, hatred, and malice, and all uncharitableness."

January 1940, we are at a stage in the world's history that is testing men to the utmost...

Those words are apt to us today whether or not our Lord had in mind the crisis through

which the world is passing the moment. If we are Christians, if we truly believe that God is working his purpose out, even though it stretches our faith to the limit, we dare not let go our faith, we dare not give up the hope that out of this carnage, He will bring some new truth, some new good. We must indeed take heed to ourselves that we do not lose ourselves in a panicky orgy of despair, that we do not give up hope before our time of testing comes, that we do not defeat the very purposes of God by loosing our grasp on essentials, that we do not let the barrage of scare headlines in the newspapers, and the emotional outpourings of the radio drive from us all stability and the power to think clearly.

Appeals have already come from Churches whose lands have been overrun for American Churches to take over their work in the Mission Field, and the Church of England is looking to us to carry on much of her work throughout the world. The setting up of the great army cantonments in our own country offers a field of service for the Church that it dare not disregard. Already two clergy from neighboring parishes have left to enter the Chaplaincy service. In our own parish the work carried on by the staff increases daily. More and more people are turning to the Church in search for the "peace that the world cannot give" and the strength to meet the demands of a world that moves on at an ever increasing pace. To keep pace, the program of the parish is enlarged, and our plant is being used more and more. 1940

From now on, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ

God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

All the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to Jesus. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them."

So Jesus told them this parable: "There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to

his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But

the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe—the best one—and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate.

"Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.' Then he became angry

and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found.""

# **About the Readings**

**Joshua 5:9-12** Today's reading is excerpted from the account of the events that ceremonially ended the exodus period and opened the way for the conquest of the promised land. The crossing of the Jordan echoes the crossing of the Red Sea. Then the people are circumcised, so that they might celebrate the Passover. The nature of the "disgrace of Egypt" (v. 9, their slavery to the Egyptians? the skepticism about God's ability to provide and protect them in the wilderness?) is not clear. The celebration of the Passover marks the end of the exodus just as it had marked its beginning. The people are now ready to change their wandering way of life into a more settled life of farming in the promised land. The change is signified by the cessation of the manna.

Psalm 32 This psalm reveals how sin and its consequences have broken down the relationship with God. It divides naturally into six sections that trace the pattern of reconciliation: verses 1-2 are an introduction; verses 3-4 express the weight of guilt; verse 5 is a confession of sin; verses 6-7 offer sound advice; in verses 8-9, God speaks; in verses 10-11,

the psalmist rejoices in his changed status before God.

**2 Corinthians 5:16-21** Paul presents the new reality of human existence "in Christ"—it is a new creation! Old attitudes and relationships with one another based upon a human perspective have been superseded. In the midst of the old creation, Christians, by faith, now live on the terms of the new creation in the new community inaugurated by God through Christ. God does not keep track of sins, but rather offers forgiveness. The Christian's ministry is to announce reconciliation for all. Reconciliation and life in the new creation are possible because of the atonement effected in and by Christ. He who was innocent of sin, nonetheless was "made...to be sin" (v. 21); that is, Christ became the offering for sin and was made one with the sinfulness of humanity. Christ stands in the place of humankind, alienated from God, so that humankind may be made one with God again.

Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32 Like many of Luke's best-loved stories, this is both an account of human relationships and a parable of God's relationship with humanity. It has been called the parable of "the two lost sons," for both are self-centered, each in a different way, and both misunderstand their relationship to their father. But the parable is also called "the parable of the waiting father," for it is the father who takes the initiative, watching for his wayward son and having compassion on him as soon as he is seen. The father invests him with the clothing that marks

his restored status as a son, not a servant—as one who is free (servants did not wear shoes) and in authority (signified by the ring). The elder son, out of hatred, fear of loss or self-righteousness, is angry at his father's response. Again the father takes the initiative and comes out to him. However, the elder son perceives his sonship as servitude, an exacted obedience for the sake of reward. He acknowledges real relationship neither to his father (whom he does not greet) nor to his brother, "this son of yours."
