The architect's drawings and paintings of the new plans for our building program are on display in the Old Parish Hall. We hope you will take the time to see them. The cross over the altar, the organ, the chairs and the lighting fixtures in the transept chapel are all temporary and changes will be made in the next two or three weeks. Needlepoint cushions are to be made and placed around the altar rail. 1963

Because of the crowded conditions during this building year, children will not be transferred from one class to another unless a parent for urgent reasons requests the change. Some classes are already filled to the capacity of the room and admission to these has had to be closed. 1963

Typing table and chair in good condition to be used by the many faithful volunteers who work in the church school office. Sitting on a telephone book on a folding chair is not very good on the volunteer's back! 1964

Several ships of the U.S. Navy will be docked in Boston during the Easter period. Articles still in the Lost and Found Department will be left on a table outside the Dining Room this week. Any not claimed before Saturday, will automatically be put in the Rummage Sale. 1964

The Flower Fund was established over eighteen years ago and has solved many problems in planning for memorial flowers in a growing parish. One advantage in the plan is that it makes provision for several persons to be remembered each Sunday. The generous response brings many names making possible a glorious array of flowers and plants. Besides flowers for Sundays on

the main altar, the Flower Fund provides them for the transept chapel, the children's chapel, and for many special weekday services that occur throughout the church year. When there is a surplus it is used to beautify the church in many ways, thus making each memorial a part of a permanent one. Our fine achievement in the needlepoint cushions that now surround the new altar was made possible by the devoted work of many women of the parish both in and out of the Altar Guild, but the considerable sum of money given toward the purchase of canvas, wools, etc., was the contribution of the memorial givers, through the Flower Fund.

The Rummage Sale has a special place in the lives of St. Andrew's women. The fellowship of the parishioners has been truly rewarding; the considerable earnings have each year been given to worthy causes, many needy families have been clothed and provided with a few luxuries otherwise not available to them. Many workers always are needed to make the sale a success. We welcome volunteers: please don't wait to be called. If you can give a few hours or a day, please let us know. No experience necessary! On-the-job training provided!

This year, because of construction at the church and the fire hazard, we cannot accept rummage until the week before the sale. Realizing this will be inconvenient to some people, we ask all of you to help by saving your best discards. For the uninitiated—besides useful and sensible articles, we sell

everything from "Grandma's Opera Cape" to last year's shocking pink patio pillows.

An impressive and colorful ceremony of dedication took place at the late morning service on Sunday, May 31, 1964. Following the confirmation service and sermon by Bishop Lawrence, a processional of clergy, led by a crucifer and consisting of our assistant, our rector and our bishop, in single file, approached each part of the church building, each object or article to be dedicated, and stood while the bishop offered appropriately selected prayers. During the dedication of the new altar vestments, six acolytes held up the vestments for all to see. The ceremony concluded with the benediction pronounced by Bishop Lawrence's grave and moving voice, a blessing deeply felt by everybody who had taken part in the services.

Our attendance is not what it should be. In the Offices of Instruction, our "bounden duty as a member of the Church" is set forth, "to worship God every Sunday in his Church." To make this a little more explicit, the Confirmation Certificate at All Saints, Worcester, adds this line, "unless prevented by a reason which would also keep me from school or work." This leaves no room for flimsy excuses. For love of God and to gain strength and guidance for the week ahead, let us resolve to attend regularly in this spirit. It would be a splendid goal to set for the Advent Season. 1964

1. *Informational.* Data on meetings, Services, special events, and information which our parishioners should have from week to week.
2. *Educational.* Church news beyond the parish, missionary happenings, General Convention, Ecumenical points of interest, special pronouncements by our Church through its National Council and other official sources. By and large, Episcopalians know far too little about their Church. One cannot expect loyalty based on ignorance. An intelligent Churchman is much more likely to be a devoted one.
3. *Inspirational.* This is most important. The clergy will write frequent messages dealing with personal religion, the Church Year, prayer and worship, religious verses in the court, a touch of humor now and then, and short "quotes" which carry a spiritual message.

About the Readings

Proverbs 8:1-4, 22-31 The author personifies wisdom as a woman, focusing on her participation in creation. There was no time when God's wisdom did not exist. This poetic description offers a way to understand Jesus as the "wisdom of God" (1 Corinthians 1:24, 30), through whom "all things came into being" (John 1:1-3) at creation. Wisdom's main joy is found among humans, for they are the crown of God's creation.

Psalms 8 This hymn expresses amazement at the God-given dignity of the human being. If the awesome heavens majestically reveal God's power and care, then God's attentiveness to mortal human beings is astonishing. Human value is rooted in God's decision to impart "glory and honor" and to make humans the stewards of creation.

Romans 5:1-5 Paul uses two equivalent metaphors to describe God's saving action in Christ: justification, the ending of a legal dispute, and reconciliation, the termination of a state of enmity. Christ's sacrifice reveals God's justifying, reconciling love for us. The

work of salvation begun in Christ's ministry, death and resurrection is now operative through the Holy Spirit. Whereas justification marks the beginning of this process, salvation marks its future completion. We enter more fully into salvation by participating in Christ's risen life and by anticipating a share in God's glory.

John 16:12-15 Jesus warns the disciples of his impending death and of persecution to come. Yet his death is described as a return home to the Father. Thus he tells them that it is to their advantage, for only then can he send them the Spirit. Jesus' death will bring the promised Advocate—the Spirit of truth, who will lead the disciples into an ever-deeper understanding of Jesus' revelation. Like Jesus, the Spirit will not speak out of a separate authority. The Spirit will glorify Jesus, as Jesus did the Father, by revealing him to people. Through the inspiration of the Spirit, the mission of the disciples will be one with that of Jesus.
