Please call Wellesley Fells Taxi before 8pm Saturday to make your reservation for a ride to church on Sunday. The fee is 25 cents, with Church Women United in Wellesley assuming any additional costs for this service. 1976

A magnificent example of an investment grade antique is this cherry bonnet top high boy, with original brasses. It was made in Connecticut about 1780, and sold in 1876 for \$25. Today it's worth \$22,000. 1976

There will be a fire drill between 11:15am and 11:30am this morning. The alarm for the drill is very loud.

With thanks to David Howard, we now have available a wheelchair ramp for use at services. If anyone wishes to attend service and use the ramp, arrangements will be made to have it in place upon arrival. 1976

Your "purchase" of one of the 88 keys for \$10, or one of three pedals for \$25, will help meet the estimated \$1,000 goal.

Emily Ewe and Ralph Ram, two sheep visiting us, symbolize the Christmas giving project of the Church School and Mission Committee. Join in giving a living gift of a sheep. They provide wool and food, and the receiver of the sheep through Heifer Project International is obligated to give away the first offspring, thus multiplying the gift. 1976

A special note to all home preservers: Mistletoe Mart's culinary department depends solely on donations, so please keep this in mind when you are putting up relishes, jams, jellies or other favorite recipes. You'll be called in the fall, so save a jar or two (or more!) for the Culinary Corner. 1977

The Worship Committee thanks all parish members who responded to the appeal for funds to pay for the new prayer books. Over 100 individuals and families gave gifts to cover the cost of over 500 copies of the Proposed Book of Common Prayer for use in the church. 1977

On February 19, the Rector read a letter from Bishop Coburn informing us that persons wishing to contribute to a fund to help victims of the blizzard [1978] should make checks payable to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief and marked "Massachusetts Red Cross Blizzard Relief."

The St. Andrew's Patch and Paint Society (SAPPS) are regrouping. The date is Thursday, May 20, at 7pm and every Thursday thereafter until the work is completed. Let's finish off our repainting program. 1978

Good news! The project to refurbish the interior of our church is close to becoming a reality. The main nave, chancel, transept chapel, and narthex will be reconditioned. Thanks to generous individual donations and a very substantial contribution from The Women of St. Andrew's, much of the required money is already in hand, but not all. Stickers representing shares in this project are being offered for sale at \$25 each. It's hoped many parishioners will purchase at least one stickers/share. Renovations will be done during the summer without interruption of the services. To date \$3,765 has been raised for this work. Other contributions to the Decorating Fund are invited. 1978

The new logo on the St. Andrew's Call masthead was designed by Bill Zorigian. It depicts St. Andrew's Cross over the universe. The sea reminds us that St. Andrew was a fisherman before being called by Christ to be a disciple. The logo will be used on parish stationery and Sunday leaflets. 1978

The Worship Committee will be sponsoring a survey designed to give us some guidance in our long-range planning for music and worship. This week a telephone committee will call parish members asking them to answer a few simple questions, we hope you will be willing to give the brief amount of time it will take to answer the questions. Questionnaires will be available at the coffee hour following the 10am service today. We do care what you think and your opinions do count. 1978

First Lesson: Amos 7:7-17

This is what the Lord God showed me: the Lord was standing beside a wall built with a plumb line, with a plumb line in his hand. And the LORD said to me, "Amos, what do you see?" And I said, "A plumb line." Then the Lord said, "See, I am setting a plumb line in the midst of my people Israel; I will never again pass them by; the high places of Isaac shall be made desolate, and the sanctuaries of Israel shall be laid waste, and I will rise against the house of Jeroboam with the sword."

Then Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, sent to King Jeroboam of Israel, saying,

"Amos has conspired against you in the very center of the house of Israel; the land is not able to bear all his words. For thus Amos has said, 'Jeroboam shall die by the sword, and Israel must go into exile away from his land.'" And Amaziah said to Amos, "O seer, go, flee away to the land of Judah, earn your bread there, and prophesy there; but never again prophesy at Bethel, for it is the king's sanctuary, and it is a temple of the kingdom." Then Amos answered Amaziah, "I am no prophet, nor a prophet's son; but I am a herdsman, and a dresser of sycamore

trees, and the LORD took me from following the flock, and the LORD said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel.' 'Now therefore hear the word of the LORD. You say, 'Do not prophesy against Israel, and do not preach against the house of Isaac.' Therefore thus says

the LORD: 'Your wife shall become a prostitute in the city, and your sons and your daughters shall fall by the sword, and your land shall be parceled out by line; you yourself shall die in an unclean land, and Israel shall surely go into exile away from its land.'"

You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth, the gospel that has come to you. Just as it is bearing fruit and growing in the whole world, so it has been bearing fruit among yourselves from the day you heard it and

truly comprehended the grace of God. This you learned from Epaphras, our beloved fellow servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on your behalf, and he has made known to us your love in the Spirit.

For this reason, since the day we heard it, we have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you

grow in the knowledge of God. May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.
