On the Day of Pentecost, we ask you to wear something red in observance of the day when the Church came into being. Red balloons will be released following the services. After the service the Parish Picnic will be held on the lawn of the Hunnewell family home. Bring your own lunch. Cola will be provided. Stay for games and lawn activities. 1984

Dedicated new Gospel Book on May 19, 1985 with following prayer: "O heavenly Father, whose blessed Son taught the

disciples in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself: Accept this Gospel Book which we dedicate here today, and grant that we may so diligently search your holy Word that we may find in it the wisdom that leads to salvation; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen." 1984

On the closing of the Sunday school for the summer, each child received a card from Mrs. Wiley. It was to be taken to St. Mary's morning service each Sunday, signed by the Rector, and returned on the first meeting of the Church School in September, as evidence of attendance during the summer months. 1985

A highlight of the annual Diocesan Historian's Meeting at Christ Church, Quincy, on May 10, 1986, was the Rector's welcoming greeting, with its wit, which threw the assembled historians into gales

of laughter: "This is the country of the free, God is gone from twelve to three."

First Lesson: Jeremiah 2:4-13

Hear the word of the LORD, O house of Jacob, and all the families of the house of Israel. Thus says the LORD: What wrong did your ancestors find in me that they went far from me, and went after worthless things, and became worthless themselves? They did not say, "Where is the LORD who brought us up from the land of Egypt, who led us in the wilderness, in a land of deserts and pits, in a land of drought and deep darkness, in a land that no one passes through, where no one lives?" I brought you into a plentiful land to eat its fruits and its good things. But

when you entered you defiled my land, and made my heritage an abomination. The priests did not say, "Where is the LORD?" Those who handle the law did not know me; the rulers transgressed against me; the prophets prophesied by Baal, and went after things that do not profit. Therefore once more I accuse you, says the LORD, and I accuse your children's children. Cross to the coasts of Cyprus and look, send to Kedar and examine with care; see if there has ever been such a thing. Has a nation changed its gods, even though they are no gods? But

my people have changed their glory for something that does not profit. Be appalled, O heavens, at this, be shocked, be utterly desolate, says the LORD, for my people have committed two evils: they

have forsaken me, the fountain of living water, and dug out cisterns for themselves, cracked cisterns that can hold no water.

Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them; those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured. Let marriage be held in honor by all, and let the marriage bed be kept undefiled; for God will judge

fornicators and adulterers. Keep your lives free from the love of money, and be content with what you have; for he has said, “I will never leave you or forsake you.” So we can say with confidence, “The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can anyone do to me?” Remember your leaders, those who spoke the word of God to you; consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their

faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. Through him, then, let us continually offer a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that

confess his name. Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the sabbath, they were watching him closely.

When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host; and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he

may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

Healing Prayers

Starting next Sunday, September 8, we will offer parishioners the opportunity to receive healing prayers at the 8am and 10am services. The offering of healing prayers is a widespread and ancient tradition within the Episcopal Church, and one that has long been part of the Wednesday morning Eucharist at St. Andrew's. We are eager to extend the reach of these prayers by making them available at our Sunday services, as is the practice at many Episcopal churches.

The way healing prayers will be offered is as follows. During the time people are receiving communion at the front altar rail, one of the clergy will be on duty at the transept altar to offer healing prayers for anyone who wishes to be prayed with. If you want to have healing prayers, go to the communion rail at the transept altar after you have received communion. You are welcome to either kneel or stand at the rail. The clergy person will ask you quietly and discreetly what you wish the clergy person to pray for with you. To be clear, requests for healing prayers are not just for health issues. In fact, they are usually for non-physical challenges that an individual may be facing: family, work, relationship difficulties, etc. You can request a prayer for yourself or for someone else. For example, someone might say, "please pray for my husband facing a difficult time at work," or "please pray for my mother facing an operation," or "please pray for my son having a tough time at college." In response, the clergy will quietly and discreetly offer a healing prayer for the situation.

Again, healing prayer is an ancient Episcopal tradition, and by making it more widely available at St. Andrew's we will be joining Christians down through the ages who have prayed in this way for God's healing presence to be with them.

About the Readings

Jeremiah 2:4-13 In today's reading, Jeremiah wonders about the behavior of the people in their covenant relationship with God. As Jeremiah struggles to find an answer, the people's response to God's generosity seems inexplicable. Their stubbornness and indifference has rightfully provoked God's wrath. As Jeremiah realizes, forsaking the true God, who is the source of genuine life, and following false Gods leads only to destruction.

Psalms 81:1, 10-16 This psalm first recalls how God rescued the people. Then today's verses challenge the people to renew their efforts to be faithful to God alone and to live by God's commandments in order to avoid God's just judgments and enjoy God's generous rewards.

Hebrews 13:1-8, 15-16 This final chapter of Hebrews rather abruptly changes style from the earlier discursive mode of argument to a series of terse ethical exhortations characteristic of the ends of letters. The admonitions all flow from the first one, which urges perseverance in love, one of the most highly regarded virtues among both Jews and Gentiles. Hospitality, especially to fellow Christians, was a practical way of showing love, since one's

fellow guests at ancient inns were likely to be thieves. Hospitality was especially a duty for leaders of households. The responsibilities and rewards of such hospitality could be unexpected. Prisoners and the ill-treated were to be helped. Christians should be able to be compassionate concerning the sufferings of others. The marital state is to be honored. Adultery and immorality will be judged. Love of money also disrupts relationships in the community and with God. Everyone is to be content, trusting in God's care and adopting Psalm 118:6 as a watchword. The recipients of the letter are urged to remember the example of their own leaders, as previously they have considered that of the Old Testament saints (chap. 11). These leaders appear to be those who originally proclaimed the gospel to them (2:3c), and who have now died. Whereas mortal leaders die, Jesus Christ is always available as model and mediator.

Luke 14:1, 7-14 The particular sequence in Luke 14:1-24 of a healing, a teaching and a parable has been shaped by Luke around the theme of supper in the home of a Pharisee. The teaching on humility in verses 7-11 is, at one level, an illustration of simple worldly wisdom (Proverbs 25:6-7). But it takes on meaning for the whole

Christian community when related to the community meal or eucharist. In verse 11 the passive verbs indicate that God is the one doing the action. The future tenses point to the humbling of the proud and the exaltation of the lowly on the last day, already implicit in the coming of the Messiah proclaimed in Mary's Magnificat prayer (Luke 1:52). The related teaching on table fellowship serves as a practical application of the parable of the great supper, which follows it. It speaks both specifically to the exclusivity of the

Pharisees and generally to the ethic of reciprocity widely accepted. The maimed, the lame, the blind were excluded from worship at the Jewish temple, and thus would have also been unacceptable dinner guests for the Pharisees. None of those mentioned would have been able to repay this hospitality. Jesus' challenge to inclusiveness at the Christian eucharistic banquet continued to haunt the early Church (James 2:2-4; Romans 12:16) and remains just as much a challenge today.
