Healing Prayers

The offering of healing prayers is a widespread and ancient tradition within the Episcopal Church, and one that has long been part of the Wednesday morning Eucharist at St. Andrew's. We are eager to extend the reach of these prayers by making them available at our 8am and 10am Sunday services.

The way healing prayers will be offered is as follows. During the time people are receiving communion at the front altar rail, one of the clergy will be on duty at the transept altar to offer healing prayers for anyone who wishes to be prayed with. If you want to have healing prayers, go to the communion rail at the transept altar after you have received communion at the front rail. You are welcome to kneel or stand at the rail.

The clergy person will ask you quietly and discreetly what you wish to pray for. To be clear, requests for healing prayers are not just for health issues. In fact, they are usually for non-physical challenges that an individual may be facing: family, work, relationship difficulties, etc. You can request a prayer for yourself or for someone else. For example, someone might say, "please pray for my husband facing a difficult time at work," or "please pray for my mother facing an operation," or "please pray for my son having a tough time at college." In response, the clergy will quietly and discreetly offer a healing prayer for the situation. One point I do wish to make is that the introduction of healing prayers will not add any time to the length of the service. Once everyone has received communion the service will continue as normal even if there are still people receiving healing prayer at the Transept Chapel.

Again, healing prayer is an ancient Episcopal tradition, and by making it more widely available at St. Andrew's we will be joining Christians down through the ages who have prayed in this way for God's healing presence to be with them. If you have any questions about healing prayer please do not hesitate to speak with me or one of the other clergy.

About the Readings

Jeremiah 4:11-12, 22-28 In today's reading, true to his prophetic call, Jeremiah announces the devastating reality of God's judgment on the kingdom of Judah. God looks down upon the people and their land, and foresees the inevitable consequences of their evil ways. Judah will be destroyed because it replaced the covenant obligations of fidelity and obedience with idolatry, infidelity, apostasy, and disobedience. It forgot its first commandment obligation to center its life on God and instead organized life around objects which it thought it could control. Since the covenant has not been kept, God's destructive and punishing judgment is irrevocable.

Psalms 14 This lament psalm divides the world into two categories: the foolish and the wise. Although the foolish and wicked now persecute the wise and good, the psalmist envisions a time when God's judgment will make the appropriate rewards and punishments.

1 Timothy 1:12-17 This selection begins a seven-week series of readings from two letters traditionally attributed to St. Paul. 1 and 2 Timothy, along with Titus, are called the pastoral epistles because of

their emphasis on the proper ordering of the administration and worship of the Church. Many scholars today believe that these letters were not written by Paul himself but by a later follower. Such an author may have pieced together some of Paul's personal letters and added material that presented oral Pauline teaching which addressed later situations. Today's reading is a thanksgiving for Paul's conversion, especially as it serves as a paradigm of God's mercy in the conversion of all "sinners." A phrase characteristic of Paul's emphasis on tradition is "the saying is sure" (v. 15) indicating a quotation from familiar teaching or hymns.

Luke 15:1-10 The two parables in today's reading make the same point. They answer those who criticized Jesus for having any dealings with the outcast and despised. It was a strong ancient principle, especially among the Pharisees, that one should not associate with sinners. "Sinners" were both those who led immoral lives and those whose occupations were considered sure to lead them into immorality — tax collectors, shepherds, etc. "Sinners" could not hold office or act as legal witnesses. Jesus turns this atti

tude around by using the unwearied search of a shepherd for a lost sheep or of a poor woman for a lost coin as an image for God's unchanging love toward the sinner. God's constant seeking-out of the

lost is manifested in Jesus' redeeming ministry. God's love takes the initiative; the sinner's response is repentance. But rejoicing is the central note of these parables, for there is no mention of penitence.

Why do we pass the Peace? Many parishioners were startled by the institution of the Peace, and many still claim that it is disruptive, that it breaks one's train of thought, that "you greet your friends at coffee hour—not here." The Peace is not a casual social thing, but rather a formal liturgical act. It is the final action of the Liturgy of the Word, (the first half of the service), acting as a bridge to the second half, the actual Communion rite. We act out symbolically what we have been enjoined to do in the Confession from the Rite One service: "Ye who do truly and earnestly repent you of your sins, and are in love and charity with your neighbors..." In the Peace, we are greeting other parishioners, but also symbolically making ourselves at peace with the world. In shaking the hands of those around us, we can pray for peace, reconciliation in other relationships in our lives, and in the world. 1992

The Learning Center hallway is brightened with a mural drawn by the 5th grade class. The title "Who Touched Me?" is based on Mark 5:21-43. 1992

Gertrude Cronk, a longtime member of St. Andrew's and faithful historian of the church for many years, died on September 5 at the age of 97. Gertrude took over the job of historian from her husband, Corydon, when he became ill. According to our present historian, Libby Cotton, she gave a great deal of time and energy to researching and writing about the history of the Children's Chapel and the Harvey Room. In 1983 she wrote the booklet "The Memorial Windows in St. Andrew's Church", which she dedicated to the parishioners "to enable them to better see what they look at." 1992

Coventry suppers: Parishioners say that St. Andrew's is such a big parish, they wish there were a way to get to know parishioners better. The membership committee has heard that desire and offers this simple opportunity: you can be part of a small group of St. Andrew's people who will meet once a month for six months, for a simple meal in each other's homes. The groups will be put together by drawing names at random from the sign-up sheets. The emphasis is on simplicity, both in meals and format; there will be no agenda except people getting to know each other better. I encourage you to join a Coventry Supper group (the name acknowledges the place the idea got started 40 years ago—Coventry Cathedral in England).
