History from our Archives

The church school is initiating a new almsgiving project for Lent! Each classroom is adopting a parish church in the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, and students will be collecting alms and praying for their adopted parish each week. All our donations will be collected on Palm Sunday and sent to the Diocese of Jerusalem which covers five countries and is home to almost 30 parishes, dozens of schools, hospitals, and humanitarian institutions. 2013

We are grateful to everyone who participated in our almsgiving project for the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem. Thanks to our church school families and the generosity of a "mystery donor" we raised \$3,883. This money will be sent to Jerusalem for use in parish churches, providing prayer books, Bibles, art supplies, instruments, medical supplies and many other ministry needs.

Thanks to everyone who contributed food to the Wellesley Food Pantry on Brown Bag Sunday! We took 60 bags to the Food Pantry on June 2. Special thanks also go to Susan Jackson for coordinating the food drive with the Sunday school, to members of the outreach committee who delivered the full bags to the Food Pantry, and to Roche Bros. for donating the paper bags. Thank you to everyone who helped us celebrate our third annual All Hallows’ Eve vigil. We had over 80 parishioners in attendance, and a bevy of creative costumes to help us remember that All Hallows’ Eve is a Christian celebration of the blessed union of

heaven and earth in Christ Jesus. We thank the children for dramatizing our reading from I Samuel, and to Susan Jackson for helping our angels fly through our worship space! 2013

The Wellesley Food Pantry has sent us two letters of thanks. One is for the donation of \$524 from the collection at the multi-church service held here in August and one is for the donation of more than 60 bags of groceries, toiletries and household products, which were collected and blessed on October 19. The generosity of our parish is very much appreciated by the Food Pantry. 2014

This year Bargain Haul raised a record \$33,000 plus! Proceeds go directly to the church’s operating budget, including a portion to ministries in outreach, Christian education, and adult formation. The treasures found during the day are countless. 2015

We are experimenting with a new way of maintaining the St. Andrew’s prayer list (the list of those individuals we are asked to pray for). Right now, we have an “opt-out” system: Once you have put an individual on the prayer list, we do not remove that person from the list unless you request that we do so. This has led to the list getting longer and longer. As a result, we are going to try an “opt-in” system. In this way, we will become more actively engaged in making sure the prayer list reflects actual need. We are very happy to keep your loved ones on the list for as long as you feel they need our prayers.

Healing Prayers

The offering of healing prayers is a widespread and ancient tradition within the Episcopal Church, and one that has long been part of the Wednesday morning Eucharist at St. Andrew's. We are eager to extend the reach of these prayers by making them available at our 8am, 10am, and 5pm Sunday services.

The way healing prayers will be offered is as follows. During the time people are receiving communion at the front altar rail, one of the clergy will be on duty at the transept altar to offer healing prayers for anyone who wishes to be prayed with. If you want to have healing prayers, go to the communion rail at the transept altar after you have received communion at the front rail. You are welcome to kneel or stand at the rail.

The clergy person will ask you quietly and discreetly what you wish to pray for. To be clear, requests for healing prayers are not just for health issues. In fact, they are usually for non-physical challenges that an individual may be facing: family, work, relationship difficulties, etc. You can request a prayer for yourself or for someone else. For example, someone might say, "please pray for my husband facing a difficult time at work," or "please pray for my mother facing an operation," or "please pray for my son having a tough time at college." In response, the clergy will quietly and discreetly offer a healing prayer for the situation. One point I do wish to make is that the introduction of healing prayers will not add any time to the length of the service. Once everyone has received communion the service will continue as normal even if there are still people receiving healing prayer at the Transept Chapel.

Again, healing prayer is an ancient Episcopal tradition, and by making it more widely available at St. Andrew's we will be joining Christians down through the ages who have prayed in this way for God's healing presence to be with them. If you have any questions about healing prayer please do not hesitate to speak with me or one of the other clergy.
