Icon of the Week

St. Hildegard of Bingen, 1098–1179

St. Hildegard was the tenth child of a noble German family. She was promised to the church and raised from the time she was eight years old in a hermitage that later became a Benedictine monastery.

From childhood she had mystical visions, which she kept to herself until her teen years. Her writings speak of the divine feminine and the dignity of women. She believed that every woman who gave birth helped clothe God with humanity. She composed music for her nuns to sing and spoke of Christ as God's song. She taught that music recreated the original harmony that once existed between God and humankind, and that the human soul was a musical instrument on which God played music.

She carried out four preaching missions in northern Europe, unprecedented activity for a woman. She practiced medicine, focusing on women's needs; published treatises on natural science and philosophy; wrote a liturgical drama, *The Play of the Virtues*, in which personified virtues sing their parts and the devil, condemned to live without music, can only speak. For Hildegard, music was essential to worship. Her liturgical compositions, unusual in structure and tonality, were described by contemporaries as "chant of surpassing sweet melody" and "strange and unheard-of music."

Her feast day is September 17.

God of all times and seasons: Give us grace that we, after the example of your servant Hildegard, may both know and make known the joy and jubilation of being part of your creation, and show forth your glory not only with our lips but in our lives; through Jesus Christ our Savior, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.



About the Readings

Jeremiah 8:18–9:1 Jeremiah introduces us to the personal anguish of a spokesman for God. He proclaimed God's way of life to a community on its way to death. They were unwilling to listen and had no desire to hear and heed God's word. His powerful poetic images and personal prayers match the unimaginable and devastating reality of God's judgment on the kingdom of Judah. In today's reading, Jeremiah's sadness overwhelms him because he knows the people's idolatrous affront to God admits of no easy solution. There is no quick fix, no medicine that can restore the people to health. God's judgment is certain and will be devastating.

Psalms 79:1-9 The psalmist invites the people to reflect on their history and learn from their mistakes in relation to God. Though God chose to make a covenant with them, the people have forgotten God's commands and rebelled. They cannot afford to do this any more so they must be more dedicated to learning God's ways.

1 Timothy 2:1-7 Today's reading begins a section on Church order (2:1–3:15), focusing on prayer. First, prayer is to be offered for all people. The assertion of the universality of God's grace may be aimed at those who taught that only the enlightened few would be saved. Second, prayer is to be offered for civil leaders. Prayer for

pagan authorities was part of Jewish worship and the early Church prayed for the civil authorities as guarantors of the social structure within which the Church's mission could be pursued in tranquility. Finally, prayer is to be offered as an outgrowth of unity in the community.

Luke 16:1-13 The parable of the dishonest manager has often puzzled interpreters. Many scholars teach that the main point is the steward's quick and resolute action in establishing a new life for himself. Thus it is a parable of crisis, stressing the need to make a decision about Jesus and to act on it. Recently another approach has been taken, based upon the economics of the time. The bills probably represented goods received by the debtors on credit. The amount by which the steward reduced the bills may have been interest on the cost of the goods. Such interest was illegal, but was common in commercial transactions and justified in such cases by some rabbinic interpreters. Or the amount may have represented the steward's own commission on the transaction. Thus, the steward gives up the profit (his own or the rich man's) in return for the debtors' gratitude. In verses 10-13, Luke supplies three sayings of Jesus that give clues about how to unravel this parable. These guidelines reflect the attitudes of fidelity and trust that

servants ought to display in their commitment to service of their master.

New Transept Icon Prayer Station

Many of you are familiar with the spiritual practice of lighting candles in personal prayer before icons. There is a long tradition of this practice in the Episcopal, Roman Catholic, and Orthodox tradition and we are introducing this practice to St. Andrew's.

The icon prayer station is at the transept altar where, before or after services, parishioners can light a candle and say a prayer.

There are two icons at our station. One is a permanent icon of Christ. The other represents the diversity of the Christian faith down the ages and across the globe. This icon will be changed frequently and will have a card describing the saint or image. Our aim is to build up 52 icons so we can have a different icon each week.
