THE RECTOR'S LETTER: Why Do You Look For the Living Among the Dead?

On the first day of the week, at early dawn, the women came to the tomb, taking the spices they had prepared. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in, they did not find the body. While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again."

—Luke 24

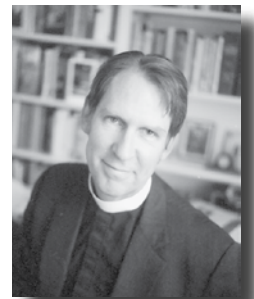


Not long after Easter I will return to the place traditionally associated with the story of Jesus' burial and rising, the Church of the Resurrection (or Church of the Holy Sepulchre) in Jerusalem. The tradition is a strong one. The followers of Jesus have gathered at that place for worship continuously through the centuries, beginning soon after the visit to the tomb described above. When the Emperor Constantine commissioned the building of the first great church on the site in the late 4th century, the tomb itself was cut free from the limestone quarry face into which it had been built, and a special small edifice was built around it.

That church has been destroyed and rebuilt many times, and very few remnants (if any) of the original tomb remain, though the position of the present memorial is within feet of the original tomb. Unfortunately the present memorial is a hideous 19th-century chapel; when I saw it for the first time I was dismayed. However, the place has been made holy by the visits and prayers of untold millions of pilgrims, and whenever I have been there I have been moved by the devotion of pilgrims present and past. I am sure that I will be moved in the same way, or perhaps an unexpected way, when I return there in April.

Important as the tradition of worship at Jesus' tomb has been for the church through the ages, we are reminded by the account in Luke's gospel that Jesus' rising liberated him from a particular place on earth. "Why do you look for the living among the dead?" the angel says to Jesus' friends. In the days that follow, Jesus, risen from death and mysteriously alive, appears to his friends outside the city, in the city at the upper room, and then in Galilee by the lake. Jesus has been available to his followers everywhere on earth ever since, and no place on earth has a special claim upon his presence.

Wherever we are, we give thanks for the presence of Jesus to us, liberated from suffering and death, alive and enlivening. In the Easter season especially, we rejoice in his living presence, and share our joy with any who will receive it. The one who gave his whole life for us gives his whole life for us still, wherever we are, whenever we turn to him. Alleluia!

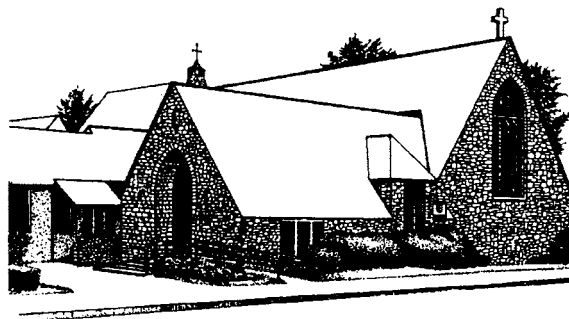
We can rejoice and give thanks also for our gifted clerical leaders. Few parishes enjoy the stability of inspired lead-

Rev. Dr. Laura Ahrens

The Rev. Dr. Laura Ahrens, former parishioner; and current rector of St. James' Episcopal Church in Danbury, Connecticut, was elected bishop suffragan for the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut at a special convention in Hartford on March 10. She was elected on the fifth ballot from an initial slate of seven candidates. Rev. Ahrens will begin work this spring as a bishop suffragan-elect. She received her Master of Divinity from Yale Divinity School/Berkeley Divinity School in 1991, and a Doctorate of Ministry from Hartford Seminary in 2000 (the theme of her doctoral work was "Engaging a Generation, Adult Education for Baby Boomers"). She was ordained as a priest in 1992. Since 2000 Laura has been serving as rector of St. James' Episcopal Church in Danbury, CT. She worked with the city of Danbury in creating the Overflow Homeless Shelter; began a relationship in her parish with Habitat for Humanity, and strengthened her parish's relationship with Covenant to Care. She is also currently an associate of SSJE (Society of St. John the Evangelist).

E.F.M. Study Opportunity for Women

St. Andrew's EFM (Education for Ministry) Study Group is recruiting for next year. The goals of the four-year program are to immerse students in the entire Judeo-Christian tradition, teach them to reflect theologically on their faith and actions, and encourage them to be intentional about their spiritual growth and ministry in daily life. While the curriculum is challenging, the group discussions are supportive and fun. Year 1 students study the Old Testament. Commitment is made one year at a time.

Cuba Revisited by St. Andrew's by Daniel Viggiani

Four years have passed since the St. Andrew's Senior High Youth Group did what seemed so unlikely to us all at that time: a visit to the mysterious and controversial Republic of Cuba. During the past four years, this adventure has been taken on by an increasing number of churches, Episcopalians and others, throughout the Commonwealth. Even the Episcopal Divinity School sent a delegation of seminarians and professors to the island not too long ago. Our own Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts (Diomass) has taken special interest in the possibilities of deepening our relationship not only with the people of Cuba in general, but with the Episcopal Church of Cuba in particular.



Indeed, a few of our fellow parishes have received diocesan support for short term mission projects, and these have helped to make each visit from this Diocese to the Cuban Diocese better organized, more fruitful, and more promising of a fluent and productive communication going into the future. Our second mission crew to Cuba is hoping to benefit directly from these new bonds and the enthusiasm that all this has inspired on both sides. Our hosts this time around, rather than a non-profit organization with religious and political partners, will be the Episcopal Church of Cuba and the Cuban Council of Churches, and their own help networks (including governmental partnerships).

Our Service/Learning Mission begins June 21 when we board a Gulf Stream Airlines craft leaving Miami for Habana. For the first seven days of our twelve-day mission, we will be transported eastward by bus to the city of Matanzas, home to the Evangelical Theology Seminary where we will be based. By request or suggestion of the Episcopal Diocese of Cuba, we will be dedicating much of our volunteer efforts to make some improvements to the buildings and grounds of the Fieles a Jesus, or the Faithful to Jesus Episcopal Church, there in Matanzas. The immense historical

value of this location lies in the fact that Fieles a Jesus was the very first protestant church established and built on the island in 1883, once the resistance of the local Roman Catholic Church reluctantly ended. This establishment actually had ties to the Episcopal Church of the US, as the first lay missionaries and Cuban-born clergy were trained in the States.

While in Matanzas we will have the opportunity to learn about a number of very interesting ministries that target a wide variety of social and religious issues, such as the involvement of women in religious leadership, service and outreach to youth, and a special partnership with the Cuban Government to minister to the HIV positive and those living with AIDS. We will also branch out into the community of Matanzas to experience and learn about other cultural and social aspects of Cuban life, such as the arts, education, and health care.

During the final four days of our mission, we will be guests at the Episcopal Cathedral in Habana. This will be our opportunity to learn more about the history of Cuba in general and the last 48 years in particular, as a number of guided tours and workshops await us. An outreach project, yet to be defined, will also be included in our Habana itinerary. One special highlight of this final stage in our mission will be to pay a visit to the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Center for Community Organizing, the host of our 2003 mission.

Once again this year, we have made room on our mission team for representatives of the St. Stephen's youth programs. Our thirty-two person team includes four teenagers and one young staff member from our sister parish, who have already become very comfortable among us after only our first pre-mission workshop. St. Stephen's will be very busy raising the funds they need to contribute to the mission costs, although some financial assistance from St. Andrew's is also factored in. In addition, the

whole group hopes to be able to raise enough funds overall to not only help St. Stephen's further, but to carry enough cash with us to Cuba to fund our work projects and leave behind some gifts for our hosts. For this purpose we will soon be announcing in detail a system through which we hope to be able to match up parishioners and neighbors in need of assistance with various domestic chores, with Cuba missionaries who would be willing to perform those tasks in exchange for donations to our cause. So, once all the details are in place, please think of requesting the help of our young travelers for the mowing of your lawn, the walking of your pet, the delivery of your groceries, or the care of your children while you enjoy an evening out.

FEDERAL TAX LEGISLATION

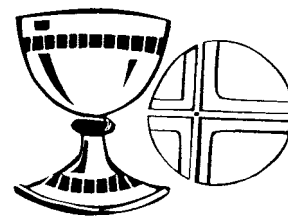
Recently enacted Federal tax legislation amended the rules for charitable contributions to require all cash contributions, regardless of amount, to be substantiated by either a bank record (e.g., bank statements, cancelled checks, or credit card statements) or written communication from the charity showing the name of the charity, the date of the contribution, and the amount of the contribution. Additional substantiation requirements continue to apply to contributions (of cash or property) of \$250 or more.

Please use your church envelopes if you make any charitable contributions in cash (other than by check) of less than \$250 to Saint Andrew's and we will provide the necessary written communication in your Annual Record of Contributions to substantiate your tax deduction.

OUTREACH

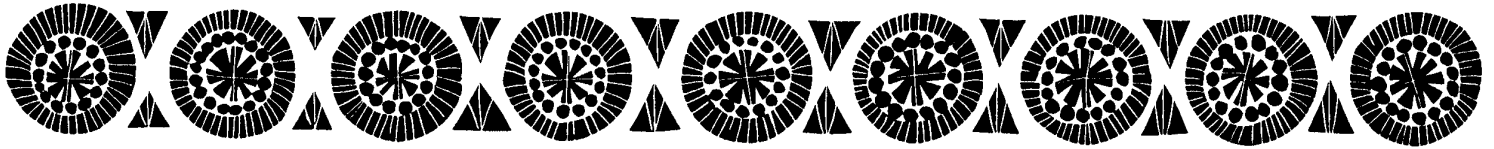
It is not uncommon to come across writings about how so much of what happens at a church goes on beyond the Sunday services.

When most people see a house of worship, the first thought that probably comes to mind are those few weekly gatherings of faith, not taking into account all the activity that happens between those services. And just as we do not put our faith away on a hanger at the end of the Sabbath, to be pulled out seven days hence, the activities that make a church a living body are taken out and exercised every day. And we see the results in good works that go on at St. Andrew's.

There are letters on the bulletin boards expressing gratitude to our parish for supporting orphans in Honduras and for knitting prayer shawls for hur-

ricane victims in Bay St. Louis. There are boxes brimming with collections for food pantries and school supplies for the needy children in youth programs at St. Stephen's. There are petitions to sign to raise awareness of basic human needs in Africa, and there will be donation jars in March for the Heifer project to turn our pocket change into valuable livestock in far corners of the world. We have more people signed up on a list to serve dinners at the Salvation Army than can be accommodated in one of the near corners of our world. There are months of man- and woman-hours that go into raising money for Outreach through the Bargain Haul and the Silent Auction. We had a collection of hats blessed and then taken into Boston to help the homeless stave off the cold weather.

There are plenty of projects at our parish, needing a full array of skills to execute. Each program we have has dedicated people stepping up to make St. Andrew's a vibrant hive of activity seven days a week. If you have considered what it takes to be a part of the action, the only thing you need to offer is time. Right now we need people with technical ability to help with electronic Outreach communications; we need adults to help tutor disadvantaged children at Epiphany School; we need help tracking down items for an upcoming raffle to benefit our sister parish, Christ Church in Bay St. Louis; and we need people to volunteer with our summer commitment to St. Stephen's Camp. If any of these or other Outreach programs appeal to you, then please take the time to get involved. (Peter Lull)
