

RECTOR'S LETTER: The Holy Spirit Will Remind You

Jesus said, "The Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid."

— John 14:24 ff.

Say you're in a meeting and someone you don't know well says something puzzling or even alarming. Your instinct is to make eye contact with a close associate in the room. The eye contact says: "What do you make of this? Let's talk." Later you seek each other out and try to make sense of what you heard.

Something like this often happens when we are trying to make sense of the scriptures, of the stories of Jesus' rising, for example. There is more to these stories than meets the eye, and we instinctively look for help to interpret them, to make sense of them.

We rightly turn to each other, to scripture scholars whom we trust, to spiritual directors and other wise guides. Jesus has some words of wisdom for us also, originally for his disciples at their last supper together before his death: "God will send the Holy Spirit to you," he said, "to help you remember what I have told you, to help you discern the truth." As we approach the Feast of Pentecost, we think of this essential resource, guide, and interpreter. Pentecost is our time to celebrate the presence of the Spirit among us, to give thanks for the Spirit's guidance, which is available always to those who ask.

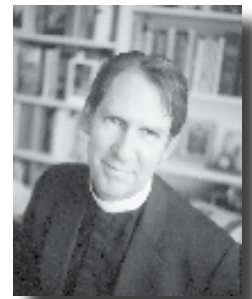
When things don't make sense to us, we feel disturbed, uneasy, agitated. When the Spirit comes to our aid, and helps us to make sense of things, there comes over us the great gift of peace, which Jesus also promised: "Peace I give to you, my own peace I leave with you."

As the Easter season flows into Pentecost, let's try saying this prayer from our hymnal:

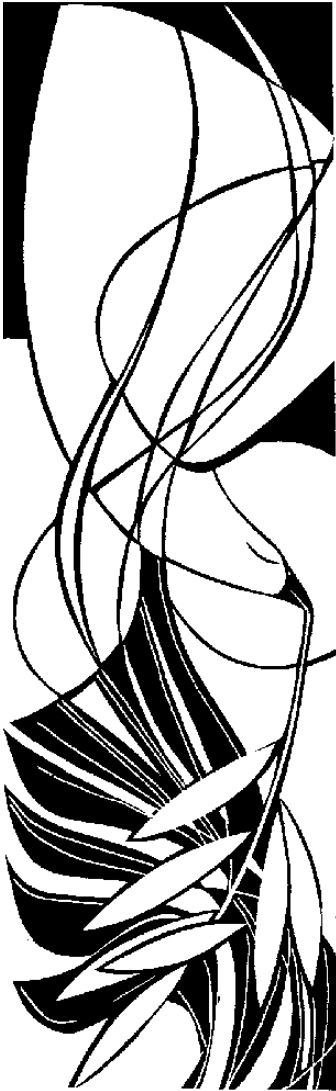
O Holy Spirit, by whose breath

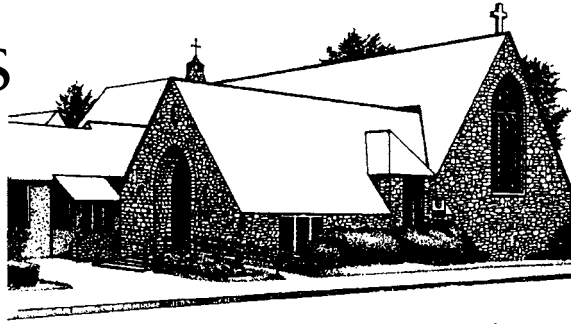
PARISH NEWS

Parishioners' Report from the Special Diocesan Convention March 10, 2007

Responding to the controversies amidst which the Episcopal/Anglican Church currently finds itself, The Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts held a convention at Boston University's Sherman Student Center on Saturday, March 10, 2007. The expressed purpose of this meeting was quite different from that of the annual Diocesan Convention held in November during which legislative process and business matters of the church are the prime focus. The purpose of this meeting was to give parishes the opportunity to consider their individual levels of vitality and viability and to share their findings with people from other parishes in the diocese, to cross-pollinate experiences and ideas in an effort for parishes to serve one another, to do what they can to help make the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts vibrantly thriving.

Representing St. Andrew's at this convention were the Reverends Addison Hall, Edie Dolnikowski, and Julie Carson, Vestry Warden Pam Henrikson, and parishioners Jane Andrews and Nora Tracy Phillips.

Bishop Thomas Shaw set the tone for the Convention in his opening remarks wherein he suggested that in 2007, the Anglican/Episcopal church finds itself in a state not unlike that of the Christian Church of the 1st Century. Now, as then, God seems to be calling his church to a new place. According to Bishop Shaw, it is essential that churches be accepting of change and renewal in order for the necessary growth to occur and for God's will to be done. Bishop Shaw admitted that he does not know exactly what the new place God is calling the church to will look like and he reminded us that none of us, individually, can know that either. It is only by working in concert with one another, both individually and



as parishes, that we can hope to discover that "brave, new world" to which God is calling his church.

To this end, Bishop Shaw revealed research that shows that within the diocese of Massachusetts, the most thriving parishes—those that are experiencing the most growth—are those that have a strong sense of mission, that are mostly in the newer suburbs and in the downtowns of our central cities, that count families as a large percentage of their membership, and which give children active roles to play in worship. Churches that actively seek out new members and those that have proven themselves open to change are the ones that are growing and prospering most. Bishop Shaw reminded us that no parish can afford to be passive or self-satisfied in its worship; the more dynamic a church is in all the works that it undertakes, the more viable it will be.

It was at about this point that we were introduced to the document entitled "Viability, Vitality and Mutuality: A Covenant and Characteristics for Congregations Growing in Mission" that was prepared for and introduced to those of us attending this convention. This document is designed to be a self-diagnostic tool to help parishes of the diocese assess the degree to which they have created and sustained an atmosphere of mutual interdependence between itself, other congregations of the diocese, and with the diocese as a whole, the ways in which they are most vital (defined as a parish's strengths in Inviting all to join them; Forming ourselves as Christians by acts of work, study, and prayer; Sending ourselves and each other, in the power of the Spirit, into "the ministries of our daily lives;" and Serving God by our actions), and

their state of viability (defined as "the stability and strength of a congregation's finances, property, and administrative functions"). Giving a test-run to this new diagnostic tool, the St. Andrew's contingent agreed that while we feel quite confident in our vitality, we recognized that we could do more to work in collaboration with neighboring parishes and that there are aspects of our business life that could be attended to in order to make us more viable.

Finally, having taken at least a speed read on the state of St. Andrew's overall health (and having found it to be quite strong), each of us was asked to join into mini discussion groups with members of other parishes to ask them for advice or to advise them on questions that had arisen during the parish self-diagnostic exercise. To engage in conversation with parishioners of other churches in the region on matters of mutual concern was comforting, both in that it made us feel very good about so much of what St. Andrew's is and relieved to find that we aren't alone in having our shortcomings. All of us share a desire to make whatever adjustments need to be made in order to prepare ourselves for that new place to which God may be calling his church. This conference reminded us that we do have each other to lean on and that the journey toward self-improvement needn't be a lonely one.

Lenten Series On Climate Change

The Lenten Series on "The Theology of Creation and Climate Change" presented five thought-provoking Wednesday evenings on a timely subject. After dinner, adults had a speaker in the Parish Hall, and children worked on projects in Room 2, followed by a brief gathering of all for reflection, prayer and song.

On February 28th, David Staelin, MIT scientist and Denton Rd. neighbor, discussed the scientific evidence for global warming. He showed the group graphs of temperature change, sea level rise and carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere. He discussed the range of opinion and models on these topics and the disagreement about the rate of change. He argued that, even if the rate of change is lower than expected, it is imperative that America decrease its carbon emissions as well as dependence on oil.

On March 7th, presenters from the Union of Concerned Scientists discussed the human role in climate change. On March 14th, Bishop Steven Charleston, Dean of the Episcopal Divinity School, discussed the theology of ecology and the meaning of our love for the earth.

On March 21st, Dan Ruben from Boston Green Tourism and Green Decade in Newton, spoke on global warming strategies for cities and towns. He pointed out the work of citizens' energy action committees in getting towns such as Newton, Cambridge and Brookline to write local Energy Action Plans to promote targeted reduction of carbon emissions. Among actions for towns recommended are: using energy efficient street lights and town vehicles; increasing energy from solar and wind sources; building or renovating buildings to be more energy efficient; and setting goals to decrease solid waste. Among the interesting organizations he discussed was the Massachusetts Climate Action Network (massclimateaction.org), which one can join.

On the final night of March 28th, co-founders of Massachusetts Interfaith Power and Light, Steve MacAusland and Tom Nutt-Powell, spoke on what we

can do at home and at church. Among their suggestions were: (1) get a free home energy audit by calling 1-866-527-5283; (2) track your utility costs by using a program on their website (MIPandL.org); (3) purchase clean energy and appliances that meet Energy Star standards. Much more interesting detail is available on their website.

As we all seek to learn more and converse with one another about this important aspect of stewardship, this series provided a valuable beginning. Jane Andrews & Lane Johnson

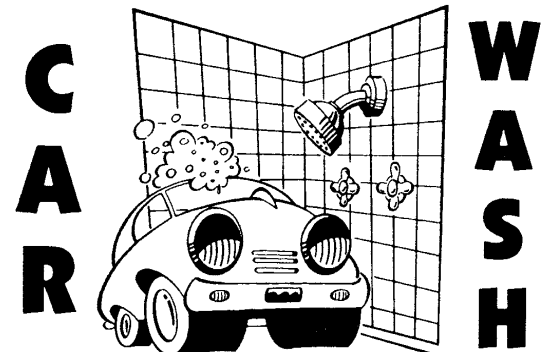

From the Treasurer's Office

Recently enacted Federal tax legislation amended the rules for charitable contributions to require all cash contributions, regardless of amount, to be substantiated by either a bank record (e.g. bank statements, cancelled checks, or credit card statements) or written communication from the charity showing the name of the charity, the date of the contribution, and the amount of the contribution. Additional substantiation requirements continue to apply to contributions (of cash or property) of \$250 or more.

Please use your church envelopes if you make any charitable contributions in cash (other than by check) of less than \$250 to Saint Andrew's Church and we will provide the necessary written communication in your annual Record of contributions to substantiate your tax deduction.

First Communion Preparation Offered for 1st and 2nd Graders

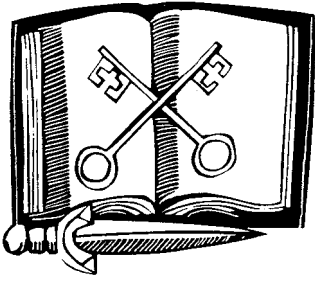

**Parishioner and U of M Student
Returns to JamaicanTown**

Following a recent journey to Hagley Gap, Jamaica, St. Andrew's Parishioner John Prensner and Students for Jamaica, a University of Michigan Medical School humanitarian group, report that their service trip was a great success. The group, comprised of John, eleven U of M medical students, an attending U of M physician and an engineer, spent the week of March 2 – 9, 2007 working in the health clinic at Hagley Gap, which was the site of the 2005 St. Andrew's Senior High Youth Group service project.

While in Hagley Gap—where the average income is \$100 per month and unemployment rates can range from 25% to well over 50%—Students for Jamaica provided free health care to over 160 patients, as well constructing a shelving system for the clinic and reorganizing all of the clinic's supplies. Common ailments included hypertension, diabetes, STDs, arthritis and asthma. In addition, members of the group spent a day hiking several miles to the homes of patients who were unable to travel to the clinic themselves, and as a gift to the clinic, the group donated approximately \$10,000 worth of medicines and medical supplies.

Students for Jamaica, newly formed by John last fall, plans to return to Hagley Gap next spring in order to make the medical service trip a tradition at U of M. The trip, which was coordinated through the nonprofit organization, Blue Mountain Project (www.bluemountainproject.org), was partially funded by a grant from the University of Michigan through its Global REACH program (www.med.umich.edu/med-school/global).
