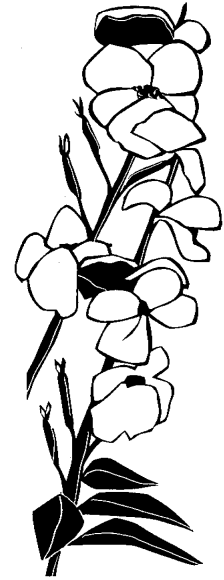

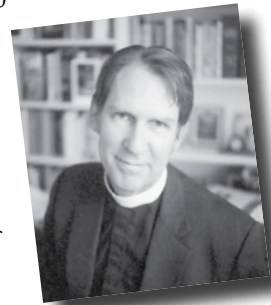

RECTOR'S LETTER: God Is Love

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit.

—First Letter of John, 4:7-9

This is the first New Testament text that I translated from Greek. Its language is profoundly simple, and simply profound. It lends itself to translation by the novice, because its vocabulary is limited and repetitious, and because many of its verbs are in the present tense. This is a wonderful text not just for the beginning translator, but also for any Christian, veteran or novice, who wants to remember a simple and condensed form of the good news that we treasure and proclaim.



"No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us." As the Easter season moves toward Pentecost, we are reminded of Jesus' promise of the Spirit, who will come in Jesus' absence to renew the faith of the community. We know the presence of the Spirit in a great variety of ways, but in none more powerfully than in the love that people have for each other. I often think that for the skeptical, the most persuasive evidence of a loving God comes through contact with a loving person, or even better, a community of loving people. That's where we come in, assisted savingly by the Spirit of God.

The letters of John were written to a community of believers who struggled, as we all do, with the practical requirements of living lovingly. They had been trying sincerely, and trying long enough to know how challenging it is to follow Jesus' new commandment, "to love one another". They knew their need to forgive one another; to hope for change and improvement, and to depend on God to supply their deficiencies.

This is our lifelong challenge, as individuals and especially as a community: to find ways to let the Spirit work among us, and to risk the hope that we can learn and re-learn the ways of living for other people, taking other people seriously, taking on other people's burdens. I give thanks for the evidence that we are trying sincerely to meet this challenge through Bargain Haul, the Fire and Heat campaign, and in the many offerings of outreach and inreach ministries at St. Andrew's. I give thanks for the presence of the Spirit among us, and for the renewal of hope and energy that the Spirit brings us.

WARDEN'S LETTER

From the "Fire" of your Support to the "Heat" of the new Boilers

As we write this letter we are basking in the joy of a fulfilling Holy Week and beautiful Easter Day. We are tremendously heartened and grateful for the many members of the parish who contributed in countless ways to the spirituality and meaning of this special church season – the altar and flower guilds who lovingly ensured the beauty of the sanctuary; the clergy who creatively presented the many liturgies of the week in ways to deepen our spirituality; Wardie and the choir who enriched the services with spectacular sound; the ushers, lay readers and chalice bearers who enhanced our sense of welcome and comfort – all these and many more helped to build the spirit of joyfulness that enabled us to proclaim: "Jesus Christ is risen today."

It is not only in the church services that we have been able to feel the power of God working among us. Those of us who have been involved in "O Ye Fire and Heat," St. Andrew's effort to address its challenges of replacing the heating and cooling system and meeting other deferred maintenance needs, have been, in this perplexing economy, overwhelmed and humbled by the initial outpouring of commitment and generosity that we have received from many members of the church. Almost universally, people with whom we have spoken already, have been supportive of the careful planning and analysis of the Property Task Force and have recognized that we are doing what we must do to maintain our church building in which and upon which all of our ministries depend. In spite of the uncertain economy of 2009, parishioners have made generous gifts and have said over and over: "Here is what I can do now...."

And all those gifts of "what I can do now" have enabled us to undertake the first and most critical phase of our infrastructure plan this summer: the replacement of the heating and cooling system. Three months ago, we worried that we would not be able to replace the old heating equipment in 2009 and that we would have to accept another winter of unpredictable and expensive repairs. So, this accomplishment, the accumulation of many gifts from many members of the parish, is a small miracle for which we are extremely grateful, yet another blessing of our life at St. Andrew's. Our work is not finished; as you know we have a variety of additional needs from new carpeting in the parish hall wing to resurfacing the parking lot, but our work is well begun, and for that we are deeply grateful.

We give thanks for all your gifts and we wish each family a happy and restorative summer. From the "Fire" of your support, we look forward to the "Heat" of the new boilers in the fall!

Church School TEACHER SIGN-UP for NEXT YEAR!

Our Church School is one of the largest ministries of our parish, and one that touches over 200 people every year! It is a ministry of the entire parish, and we invite anyone in the congregation to participate as a teacher/assistant, whether or not you have (or have had) children in the programs. Teaching in the Church School is a rewarding experience for the teacher, as well as for the students. It is an opportunity to reconnect with some of the Bible Stories that may have faded, and to think about your own Christian discipleship, as you help in the formation of our community's children.

Unlike regular school, Church School is a co-operative, meaning that everyone shares in the work. As a reminder, parents with children in the church school are expected to volunteer to teach/assist at least every-other year. The Church School Committee and the Clergy pledge to make the teaching experience formative for the teacher, through providing training, fellowship opportunities, mentoring, good curriculum resources, time for retreat, and classroom management support. We ask you to pledge your time and effort. Each grade level needs a teaching cohort of five teachers to trade off lead teaching and assisting responsibilities.

Teaching our children about God's love for them as the unique and wonderful people they are is probably the most important give we can give our children! Please consider becoming part of this ministry offering this special gift next year.

To sign up as a teacher/assistant for next year, please contact Rev. Chris Wendell, Susan Jackson Roer, or any member of the Church School Committee. This year, to comply with state law, St. Andrew's will begin requiring CORI checks for teachers in the church school. These are the same confidential record checks that are required for school volunteers, scout leaders, coaches, and other folks who work with kids. "Other Sheep I Have": Christians Encountering Other Religions Easter Christian Learning Series at 9:00 a.m. in Room 2 Sundays April 26th, May 3rd, and May 10th

In a pluralistic age, many Christians have family members, close friends, spouses, and children who practice and find meaning in other religions. This reality of the 20th and 21st centuries has given fresh urgency to the question of how do Christians think about and relate to people who practice other faiths. On the individual level, many Christians have found a pathway to interpersonal respect

for those whose faith practices differ, but what about on the institutional level? Can Christianity maintain its own integrity as a Gospel faith, while offering a coherent and generous account of other religions? WORSHIP

As a function of its charter, the Worship Committee is charged with acting as a liaison between the Clergy and Members of St. Andrews to address topical and important issues. Members also serve as a conduit for questions and opinions as they apply to worship. One such question arose in late 2008 involving "inclusive language" within the liturgy. A study group has been formed to explore 3 major questions:

1. What is inclusive language?
2. Is this important to St. Andrew's?
3. If it is important, where in the liturgy is it appropriate to incorporate such language?

Members of this newly formed study group have met a few times and have agreed on the following:

1. Our focus will concentrate on male/female references in liturgical language.
2. Members would research where "inclusive language" is currently being used in Episcopal service which we shared with each other (whether from the web, experiential, or other sources) and discussed them at our most recent meeting on March 26th.

One reference that we found readily available is The Book of Common Prayer, 1979—modified by Paul Huber (HuberPal@aol.com) in January 1999 and as an experiment we incorporated this inclusive language into the 8:40am morning prayer services during Lent.

Our next meeting is scheduled for April 30th where members will present other versions of Inclusive Language Liturgy that we can use during Morning Prayer. We encourage you to participate in these services and welcome any thoughts and comments.

July 13-17th Help needed for our Partner Week with the B-SAFE Program

St. Andrew's week of partnering support for the kids in the B-SAFE program at St. Stephen's comes midsummer during the week of July 13-17. We will be preparing lunch and snacks for two groups of 75 children all week and accompanying them on a field trip to the Peabody-Essex Museum and Salem Willows Park on Friday, so we need a big team of helpers.

Here are our ‘Top Ten’ volunteer needs, arranged in chronological order through the week:

1. We need **Snack Food Purchasers** to shop during the preceding week and deliver items to the church on Friday or Saturday July 10th or 11th for packing into snack bags Sunday July 12th right after church.
2. Join the **Snack Packing Team** on Sunday, July 12th, right after church. We stuff the snacks in brown bags, and last year's crew finished in record time.
3. We need **Food Purchasers** in advance for **Tuesday and Thursday lunches** when we provide sandwiches.
4. Dot Reed and her lunch team will welcome you to **sandwich preparation and lunch bag assembly early Tuesday, and Thursday mornings, July 14th and July 16th** in the church kitchen. There's unsurpassed camaraderie as the sandwiches pile up.
5. We need volunteers to **purchase food in advance and prepare the hot meal on Monday, June 13th, and Wednesday, June 15th**. This major responsibility requires purchasing the food and a commitment of time from very early to later morning on the day of preparation. Our cooks most often prepare lunch in the church kitchen **and then deliver the food to St. Stephen's and serve it**, seeing the kids' enjoyment of their feast. (an ~ 8:00 am to 2:00 day)
6. We need **delivery folks to carry in the lunches and the snacks for Tuesday and Thursday and stay to serve the lunches** and meet the kids.
7. Be an **advance food purchaser for the big Field Trip on Friday, July 17th**, when Chris Wendell will head the team accompanying our two St. Stephen's groups to the Peabody-Essex Museum and Salem Willows Park.

8. Join the **volunteers who will accompany the group up to Salem**. Plan now to take a day off and participate in what one of last summer's volunteers described as “the best day of the summer”.
9. We need **assemblers for the Field Day, advance and last minute**, to gather and organize all the food and other necessities for a well coordinated send off on Friday morning.
10. And, **new this year**, we need **1 or 2 drivers (depending on car size) to pick up pre-ordered and packaged breakfast food from Costco for a one time delivery to St. Stephen's**. Those who deliver and serve midday lunches Monday through Thursday are also invited to stay an extra half hour and enjoy DEAR (Drop Everything And Read) TIME with our elementary children.

After many years as the Director of Youth Music Jane Money left St Andrew's last year to devote her time and talent to Boston City Singers where she is the Artistic Director. This extraordinary youth chorus unites children and families from all neighborhoods, ethnic, and socio-economic groups through the power of music. BCS was founded in the spring of 1995 as the Dorchester-based satellite division of Newton's Youth pro Musica, Greater Boston Youth Chorus. After eight years of substantial growth BCS became a separate nonprofit agency in July 2003, demanding more and more of Jane's time. Some 300 young people, ages 5-18 from the City of Boston's inner city and neighboring communities receive comprehensive music training, performance opportunities and develop leadership and teamwork skills. No child is refused participation on financial grounds and, in fact, 90% of singers receive financial aid.

Recently, the excellence of the BCS Concert Chorus was recognized - they have been invited to participate in the prestigious Festival 500 this summer, in Newfoundland. In celebration of Jane's ministry with the young singers of St Andrew's (some of whom are now

singing with BCS) St Andrew's is hosting a benefit concert to support travel scholarships for singers to attend this.

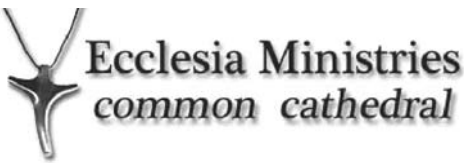

On Saturday, June 20th a group of housed and unhoused people will set off on a teambuilding and fundraising 7-mile hike in Boston's Blue Hills to support Ecclesia Ministry's open art studio program, common art. The hike has grown out of the need to find funding to keep common art going. But it is about more than money. The common art hike is part of the community-building work which Ecclesia has long practiced in all that they do – working to enhance relationships between men and women from all walks of life to enrich the lives of us all. Together, the common art hiking teams hope to deepen relationships and to raise \$20,000 to save common art.

Since the summer of 1994, Ecclesia Ministries has been engaging unhoused and privileged people, service providers, church communities, artists, students and professionals of all kinds to work together to meet the spiritual and practical needs of poor and unhoused people in Boston. As a part of this work, Ecclesia has maintained **common art** as an open art-studio for poor **common art**:

- Provides a safe place for the poorest of the poor to renew themselves in a diverse, supportive and welcoming environment.
- Creates the opportunity for real

beauty making by everyone.

- Provides the opportunity for common artists to earn a little much needed money through the sale of their art.
- Deepens and strengthens community between people from all socio-economic, cultural, ethnic and racial groups.

Sustaining our Parish – 2009 Stewardship Update

Our pledge campaign for calendar year 2009 is now six months old, but we have only received 296 pledges and gifts to date, compared to our goal of 340. To those who have already made pledges, we are very grateful for your continued support of our parish.

Our pledges and gifts for 2009 are running below our goals and needs: \$686,000 pledged or gifted vs. our goal of \$735,000. To reach these goals, we need 44 more pledges for \$49,000. As a result of this gap, and a similar shortfall in 2008, the wardens, clergy and vestry have taken some unusual and painful steps to reduce our 2009 budget and balance against projected revenues, including:

Our clergy have agreed to serve for 2009 at flat salaries from 2008.

We have made some hard choices and reduced our annual allocation for Outreach.

We have cut our budget for maintenance and repairs, meaning more deferrals.

While our situation is challenging, it is not dire. Pledges through March 24 have closely followed the trend lines from 2008, both in number of pledges and in dollars (see charts below). We can meet our 2009 goals if we receive sustaining pledges from those who pledged in 2008 but have not yet pledged for 2009, plus additional new and returning pledges. We really need everybody's support to make it!

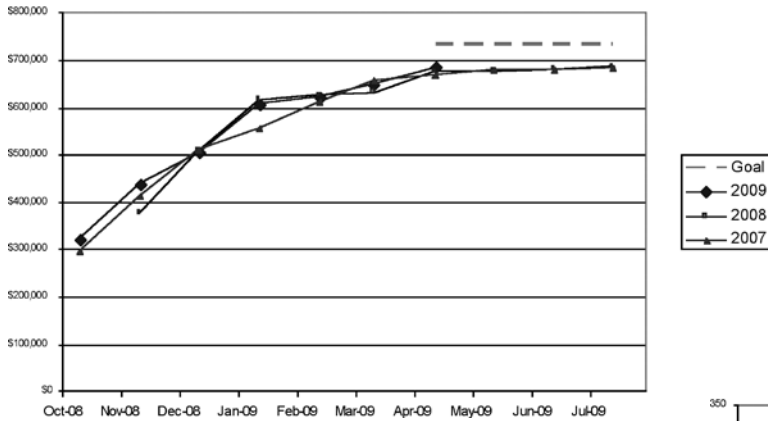

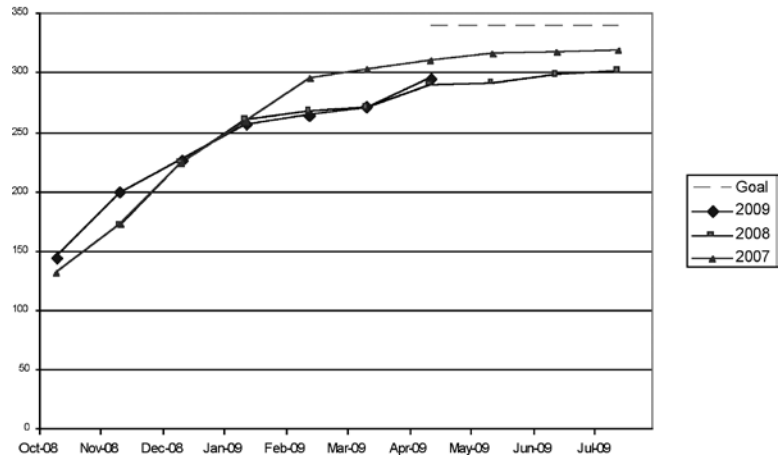
